MISSION

The Consortium's mission is to ensure that small and midsize federal contractors have input on policies generated by the Congress and federal agencies. Two ongoing initiatives beg for additional industry engagement – implementation of Section 88g and DoD's Cybersecurity Maturity Model Certification (CMMC). Guidance surrounding these initiatives show the need for a more organized industry approach to implementation, especially among small companies. The Consortium seeks to provide constructive input to decision-makers who are tackling these difficult problems.

WHY NOW?

Federal agencies and Congress have increasingly turned their attention to the security of the federal government's supply chain. As security breaches in government and private system reach a record high, there is general agreement that uniform measures must be taken to better secure the supply chain. The Consortium advocacy team organized a hearing and had a witness in the House Small Business Committee on CMMC in June 2021.
