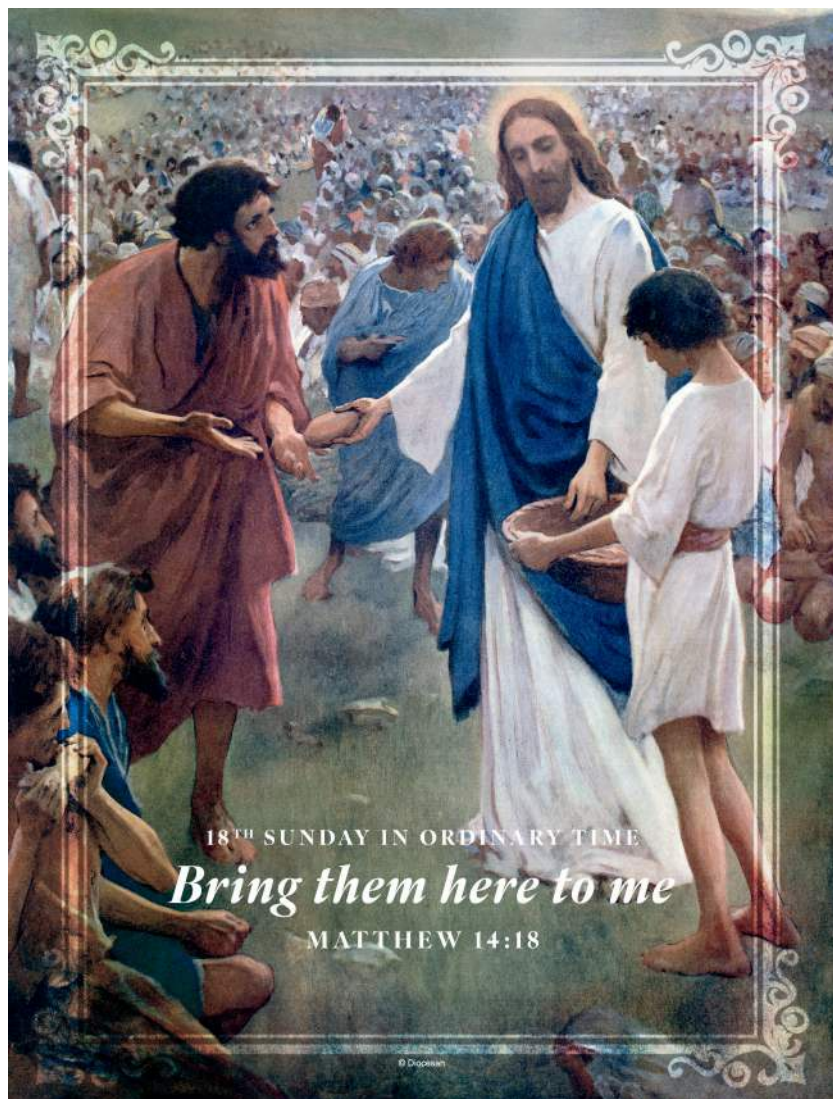

Letter From the Pastor

Greetings Parishioners,

It seems like we always get the word out to you during the busy holiday season.

So, I thought I would send this message now ... in the spirit of the approaching school year.

★ Did you know you can donate \$750 or \$1,500 to our schools and it cost you nothing? ★

This is through an Ohio SGO (Scholarship Granting Organization) which lets you help a child attend a Catholic school without increasing your Ohio taxes.

Here's how it works:

1.) You donate money to an approved SGO through (<https://www.dotsgo.org>) to either St. Joseph school in Crestline or Sacred Heart school in Bethlehem.

2.) Ohio gives you a state tax credit for your donation—up to the annual limit allowed by law (currently up to \$750 for an individual or \$1,500 for a married couple filing jointly).

3.) You turn the tax credit into your tax person.

Sound to good to be true? - Here is how it works.

- Say you owe \$800 in Ohio state income tax.

- You donate \$750 to an approved SGO.

- You claim the \$750 Ohio tax credit.

- Now you owe only \$50 in Ohio state income tax.

On the flip side... if you had already paid enough taxes through paycheck withholding, reducing what you owe can also increase your state tax refund.

Just something to plant in your head early and something that can incredibly assist our schools! Both our principals will be firing reminders about this to you throughout the year.

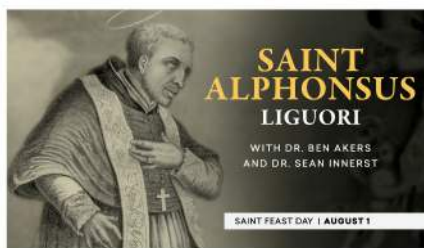

One Minute Meditations

St. Bernard of Clairvaux

Although born into wealth, St. Bernard desired a life of simplicity, holiness, and austerity. Born in 1090 in Fontaines, France, he entered the monastery at Cîteaux in his twenties, followed by most of his family. Recognizing his holiness and noting the overcrowding of the monastery, the abbot sent St. Bernard to establish a new monastery in Clairvaux. St. Bernard went on to found monasteries for nuns, worked for the Holy See, and preached the Second Crusade.

More than the mission

No matter our age, we all need to hear these words: "I love you without measure." At the Transfiguration, the Father declared of Jesus, "*This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased*" (Matthew 17:5). He means those words for us as well. Before all else, we are God's beloved children.

Significantly, the Father speaks these words before Jesus goes to the Cross, before His saving mission is complete. We often reverse that order, allowing our identity to depend on our accomplishments or faithfulness. We assume God will love us once we have fulfilled our mission. But the Gospel reveals the opposite. God's love is not earned but freely **given**. Our mission flows from our identity, not the other way around.

"For I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine" (Isaiah 43:1).

Be Like Christ. Love Like Christ.

What does it mean to "be like Christ" in the context of our everyday lives? The key is to love as He loves. Here are five practical ways to love like Jesus.

Learn His pattern. The Gospels show us how Jesus responded to the sick, the brokenhearted, the marginalized, and even His enemies. Scripture provides the pattern, while prayer and the Sacraments provide the grace to live it. The more we immerse ourselves in Christ's life, the more naturally His way of loving becomes our own.

Cultivate His heart. Jesus describes Himself as "*gentle and humble of heart*" (Matthew 11:29). His humility comes from His complete obedience to the Father's will. His gentleness is strength under perfect self-control, expressed in His patience, mercy, and compassion, even toward those who rejected Him. As we imitate His way of love, our own hearts are slowly transformed as His.

Show genuine interest. Jesus often asked open-ended questions, not because He lacked the answers, but to draw people out. "*What do you seek?*" (John 1:38). "*What are you discussing*

with each other?" (Luke 24:17) Genuine love begins with genuine interest. Asking thoughtful questions communicates that people are seen, heard, and valued.

Choose the charitable interpretation. St. Theresa Margaret of the Sacred Heart wrote, "If the actions of our neighbors have a hundred sides, we ought always to look at them on the best side." Love resists rushing to judgment and gives others the benefit of the doubt, creating space for understanding rather than

suspicion.

Always act out of love. St. Paul exhorts us, "*Whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do everything for the glory of God*" (1 Corinthians 10:31). Jesus lived every moment in perfect love for His Father and for us. Love was not merely one aspect of His life; it was the motive behind everything He did. Following Christ means allowing love to shape not only our greatest sacrifices but also our smallest daily actions.

Why Do Catholics Do That?

Formula prayers are not a substitute for personal prayer but a time-tested way of entering into it and deepening it. When the disciples asked Jesus how to pray, He gave them the Our Father (Matthew 6:9-13; Luke 11:2-4), a prayer to be prayed repeatedly. Scripture also contains many communal prayers, especially the Psalms, which

served as Israel's prayer book and remain the Church's today. By praying these inspired words, Catholics join generations of believers in worship. Whether at Mass or beside a hospital bed, formula prayers unite the faithful, expressing not only personal devotion but also the shared faith of the whole Church.

What to do when you don't feel like praying

Not feeling like praying is something even faithful Christians experience. In fact, seasons of dryness can be a normal part of spiritual growth. While they may have different causes, they do not necessarily mean something is wrong. Here are three ways to respond:

Pray about not wanting to pray. Bring your reluctance to God. You don't have to overcome your feelings before coming to Him. Honest prayer is still prayer, and God meets you with love exactly where you are.

Keep it simple. We value brief messages from those we love: "I love you," "Good luck today," or "Thinking of you."

Prayer can be that simple. The goal is relationship, not length. A heartfelt "God, help me," "Jesus, I trust in You," or "Come, Holy Spirit" is enough.

Choose presence over performance. Approach prayer the way you would spending time with a close friend. We don't cancel plans with someone we love simply because we're tired.

In the same way, keep showing up. God delights in your company (Proverbs 8:31). He is not looking for a perfect performance but for a heart that continues to seek Him, even when prayer feels dry or difficult.

from Scripture

Matthew 16:21-27, God's ways are not our ways

At first glance, this passage seems like bad news. Jesus predicts His own death, a revelation that must have stunned the disciples. They had just come to recognize Him as the long-awaited Messiah. Instead of leading a triumphant victory over Rome, Jesus spoke of suffering, rejection, and execution. To them, it looked like failure, not triumph.

Peter responded as many of us do when faced with suffering: he resisted the Cross. He wanted Jesus to avoid it and was sharply rebuked. Yet had Jesus turned aside, we would have remained

in our sins, separated from God. Instead, He freely embraced the Cross. He chose us. From the perspective of the Resurrection, what appeared to be defeat was in fact Christ's decisive victory over sin and death.

God desires our happiness, not merely our temporary comfort. He desires our eternal joy. The Christian life is not about avoiding the crosses God permits but embracing them with trust, as Jesus did. And we never carry them alone. Christ walks beside us, bearing the heavier end of every cross.

Q & A Can the Pope make mistakes if he's infallible?

Yes. The pope is human and, like anyone else, can make mistakes in his personal opinions, decisions, or everyday statements. Papal infallibility does not mean the pope is incapable of error. Rather, it means that, under specific conditions, the Holy Spirit preserves him from definitively teaching error in matters of faith and morals (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 891).

Papal infallibility applies only when the pope is:

Defining a doctrine of faith or morals. The teaching must concern divine revelation or truths closely connected to it. It does not apply to scientific claims, political views, interviews, homilies, or personal opinions. For example, in 1950, Pope Pius XII infallibly defined the dogma of Mary's Assumption into heaven.

Speaking ex cathedra ("from the chair"). The pope must speak in his official capacity as the successor of St. Peter and clearly intend to proclaim a doctrine that is binding on the entire Church. In *Munificentissimus Deus*, Pope Pius XII explicitly invoked his apostolic authority to "pronounce, declare, and define" the Assumption as a divinely revealed dogma.

Feasts & Celebrations

August 7—St. Cajetan (1547). St. Cajetan was born in Italy to a noble family. He went on to study civil and canon (Church) law at the University of Padua. He worked to reform the Church by founding the Theatines, a religious order modeled on the teachings of the Apostles.

August 9—St. Edith Stein (1942). Formerly Jewish, she was an atheist intellectual in Germany. After studying St. Teresa of Ávila, she converted to Catholicism, and became a Carmelite nun. Although her order tried to shelter her from the Nazis, she was taken to and executed at Auschwitz.

August 15—The Assumption of Mary. Declared a dogma of faith in 1950 by Pope Pius XII, the Assumption celebrates Mary's being taken up into Heaven body and soul at the end of her life. This feast highlights the Church's respect for the dignity of the body in view of our future resurrection. Note: This year, it is not a holy day of obligation.

August 24—St. Bartholomew (First Century). One of the Twelve Apostles and the son of Tolomai, Bartholomew is thought by some scholars to be the apostle, Nathanael, who went with Philip to see Jesus. After Jesus's Ascension, Nathanael spread Christianity to India and in Armenia, where he was martyred. He is the patron saint of Armenia and Belgium.

“Oblates of Saint Francis de Sales: an historic transition”

The Oblates of St. Francis de Sales, who have served here in the Diocese of Toledo since 1943, have announced that they will unite their two provinces, Toledo-Detroit and Wilmington-Philadelphia, to form one North American Province in January 2027. They have selected Toledo native and St. Francis de Sales School Class of 1999 alumnus, V. Rev. Michael Newman, OSFS, to serve as its first provincial. Because this is such a significant moment for the Oblates, I asked the present Provincial Reverend Joseph Newman, OSFS, to share with us information about this transition. I'm so glad to offer here, Father Joe's message:

“In his Apostolic Letter Totum Amoris Est, Pope Francis reflected on the enduring relevance of St. Francis de Sales, noting that the gentleman saint taught “there was no better place to find God, and to help others to find him, than in the hearts of the women and men of his time.” Throughout their ministry in the Diocese of Toledo, the Oblates have faithfully embodied this vision. As they form a united province, they will continue their ministries in the Diocese of Toledo, committed to their patron's conviction that “God is the God of the human heart,” bringing Christ's gentleness, hope, and love to all they serve.

The Oblates of St. Francis de Sales were founded in France in 1875 by Blessed Louis Brisson, who was inspired by the life and Salesian teaching of Venerable Mother Marie de Sales Chappuis, a Visitation Sister. Faithful to the vision of

St. Francis de Sales, Bl. Brisson established a community dedicated to proclaiming the Gospel through gentleness, humility, optimism, and the universal call to holiness. Today, the Salesian spirit is alive in Toledo and throughout the Diocese, where the Oblates embrace and share their patron's vision to “Live Jesus.”



The first Oblates arrived in the U.S. in 1893 to serve the Sisters of Divine Compassion in New York. The congregation's presence steadily grew, and by the 1940s, the American Province had extended its ministry into the Midwest, where Toledo emerged as a center of Oblate life and mission. Bishop Karl Alter invited the Oblates to come to Toledo in 1943 to teach at Central Catholic High School. The first Oblates

quickly gained a reputation for academic excellence, pastoral availability, and the distinctive Salesian approach to forming young people through gentleness, encouragement, and personal attention.

In 1953, the Oblates again answered the call to serve the Diocese of Toledo. At the invitation of Bishop George Rehring, they established St. Pius X Parish and became its first pastors while continuing their educational ministry. Later, the Oblates began ministry at Gesu Parish. Today, Fr. Craig Irwin, OSFS, serves as pastor of St. Pius X and Gesu, and the St. Pius rectory is home to the Oblate Novitiate, where future Oblates begin their formation.

The success of the Oblates' ministry at Central Catholic led Bishop Rehring to ask them to establish a Catholic college preparatory high school for boys. St. Francis de Sales High School was founded by the Oblates in 1955 and quickly became, and remains, one of the premier Catholic educational institutions in northwest Ohio. The school develops students academically, spiritually, socially, and physically in the spirit of Salesian Spirituality, guiding young men to know and love God and through St. Francis' invitation to "be who you are and be that well."



For generations, St. Francis de Sales School has fostered a brotherhood rooted in faith, tradition, and the commitment to transform boys into Christian gentlemen. The school continues to thrive with strong enrollment and an ambitious vision for the future. Led by Fr. Joe Newman, OSFS, President, the school is expanding athletic facilities, modernizing classrooms, and enhancing performing arts spaces. Alumni are leaders throughout the nation, embodying faith and Salesian values in their personal and professional lives.

The Oblates' commitment to forming young people extends beyond the classroom. For decades, Camp DeSales, located in the Irish Hills of Brooklyn, Michigan, has welcomed thousands of young people for retreats, camps, and faith-filled experiences. Among its signature programs are Salesian Leadership Camp (SLC) and Catholic Youth Camp (CYC), attended by students from parishes across the Diocese. Camp DeSales is also home to Charity on Fire, a community of full and part-time missionaries serving Catholic youth.

Another more recent Oblate apostolate for the youth of the Diocese of Toledo is Live Jesus Ministries, developed in partnership with the Diocese. This is an innovative approach to youth evangelization centered on small-group discipleship. Guided by trained adult mentors, young people regularly gather within their parishes to develop authentic friendships and meaningful relationships with Christ. Live Jesus Ministries is renewing youth ministry across the Diocese by forming young disciples who are rooted in Christ and equipped to share a lifelong relationship with Him.

While the Oblates staff St. Pius X Parish, Gesu Parish, and

Our Lady of Lourdes Parish, their ministry extends well beyond these communities. Throughout the Diocese of Toledo, they generously assist parishes by celebrating Mass, administering sacraments, preaching missions, and collaborating with diocesan clergy. They also maintain a longstanding and cherished ministry with the Sisters of the Visitation, serving as their chaplains by celebrating daily Mass, administering the sacraments, and providing spiritual direction, continuing the rich heritage shared by the Visitation Sisters and the Oblates.

The establishment of one province has been more than an organizational undertaking; it has been a profound journey of spiritual renewal for the community led by V. Rev. Joe Newman, OSFS, Provincial, Toledo-Detroit Province, and V. Rev. Jack Kolodziej, OSFS, Provincial, Wilmington-Philadelphia Province. "This spiritual renewal asks us to open our hearts to the roots of our congregation, recall our mission, and respond once more to Fr. Brisson's directive 'To reprint the Gospel on our hearts, so the Savior will be seen walking again on earth.' This effort will not only renew our own hearts, but also impact the way we lead, minister, and live," said Fr. Newman. When, in January 2027, Fr. Michael Newman assumes the role of provincial for the new North American Province, he will lead this refounding and reconfiguration effort."

The formation of the new Oblate North American Province is a grace-filled moment for the Diocese of Toledo. As the Oblates renew their commitment to this local Church, they do so with confidence in the Holy Spirit and a renewed faithfulness to their mission. Rooted in the Salesian virtues of gentleness, humility, and joyful optimism, they will continue to accompany God's people and proclaim the Gospel. I am so very grateful for their fidelity to consecrated religious life and look forward to our continued partnership in the mission of Christ and His Church. May God richly bless them as they begin this new chapter among us.

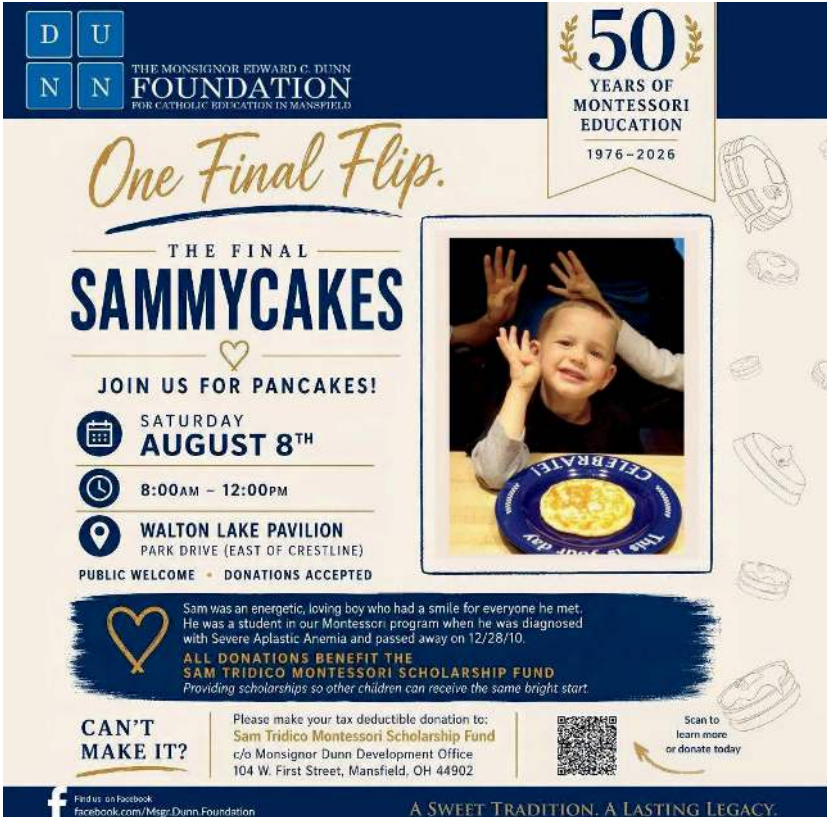
