Dear Parishioners,

In recent weeks, I have been contacted by a number of parishioners asking that I provide a letter or sign a form supporting their requests for an exemption from a requirement for a COVID-19 vaccination based on religious grounds. Thank you for reaching out but I am unable to sign such documents. The Bishop has made it clear that it is morally permissible to be vaccinated against COVID-19. As stated in the diocesan guidance, vaccinations are encouraged for the faithful of the Diocese of Toledo.

The Bishop has also noted that members of the faithful are not obligated or mandated to receive the COVID-19 vaccination. While vaccinations are encouraged, individuals may choose not to receive a vaccination based on either medical reasons or matters of conscience. With this in mind I realize it is important to remember that some persons may struggle with compromised health and underlying medical conditions. Furthermore, Catholic teaching demands that a person's conscience may not be violated. Because of this I personally believe that no one should be forced to receive the vaccine and should not be fired from a job for refusing to do so. I PERSONALLY believe no business or company should violate the sanctity of conscience by forcing a person to act contrary to his or her well-formed conscience. But even though I may not personally agree with businesses forcing employees to become vaccinated ... the Church has reiterated that it is morally acceptable to receive the vaccine.

For those who choose not to receive the vaccine ... the question is not so much one of RELIGIOUS EXEMPTION but of objection based on IN-DIVIDUAL CONSCIENCE. This being said I can not give out religious exemptions because the question is not so much one of religious exemption but of objection based on individual conscience. Thus it would not be appropriate for me to issue documentation supporting either a religious exemption or an exemption regarding the conscience of another. The Bishop has made it clear that I am not able to provide support for requests based on religious exemption or conscience objection. In short I will not be involved in signing any document concerning the conscience of another.

The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

NOVEMBER 21, 2021

Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

On the last Sunday of each liturgical year, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, or Christ the King.

Pope Pius XI instituted this feast in 1925 with his encyclical *Quas primas* ("In the first") to respond to growing secularism and atheism. The recognized that attempting to "thrust lesus Christ and his holy law" out of public life would result in continuing discord among




people and nations. This solemnity reminds us that while governments come and go, Christ reigns as King forever.

During the early twentieth century, in Mexico, Russia, and some parts of Europe, militantly secularistic regimes threatened not just the Catholic Church and its faithful but civilization itself. Pope Pius XI's encyclical gave Catholics hope and—while governments around them crumbled—the assurance that Christ the King shall reign forever. Jesus Christ "is very truth, and it is from him that truth must be obediently received by all mankind" (*Quas primas*, 7).

For Christians, when our faith is repeatedly marginalized in public life, we can fall into the habit of compartmentalizing our lives. We love Jesus in our private lives, but we shrink from acknowledging the kingship of Christ in social life. When we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King, we declare to the world and remind ourselves that Jesus is the Lord of the Church and of the entire universe.

e all depend on workers in America's meatprocessing plants and animal-feeding operations, who are essential to the food supply chain. Many of them are immigrants facing language barriers that leave them at a disadvantage when they advocate for safe working conditions, just wages, and fair treatment from employers. The Rural Community Workers Alliance (RCWA) in Missouri helps these essential workers by advocating on their behalf for safe working conditions and by promoting gatherings to address racial divisions in the community as a way to help immigrants and nonimmigrants discover similarities and share their experiences.


The COVID-19 pandemic revealed working conditions at a pork-processing plant that placed workers at risk of infection due to shoulder-to-shoulder work areas and a lack of protective gear. Workers brought their concerns to RCWA and ultimately filed a lawsuit demanding that the company follow health and safety guidelines established by the federal government. Even before the court ruled

on the lawsuit, the company took action to protect workers by installing protective barriers, sanitizing stations, providing masks, and conducting temperature checks. When you support CCHD's mission of working on the margins, you help groups such as RCWA advocate for the health and safety of the essential workers that we all depend upon.
