



In Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, the Catholic bishops of the U.S. identify the four main principles of the Church's social teaching—Dignity of the Human Person, the Common Good, Solidarity, and Subsidiarity—and apply them to concrete issues. This entry focuses on the Common Good.



The Common Good is "the sum total of social conditions which allow people, either as groups or as individuals, to reach their fulfillment more fully and more easily." Human rights (to life, freedom of religion, and access to necessities for decent standards of living) must be protected, and basic responsibilities (to ourselves, our families, the larger society, and to earth) must be fulfilled to foster the common good.

In response to Pope Francis' call to build a "culture of encounter" in which those most in need receive our greatest concern and all people can flourish, we must:

- Support and strengthen marriage and family as the central institutions of social life and the primary school of virtue.
- Respond to climate change to protect our common home and vulnerable populations now and in generations to come.²
- Accept and care for the entire world, including our bodies, as gifts from God.³
- Protect religious liberty as a fundamental human right and crucial for the common good.⁴
- Prioritize the needs of the weak, vulnerable, and impoverished by advocating for policies that support a robust social safety net, decent jobs, affordable housing, and childcare.

Pope Benedict XVI writes in *Caritas in Veritate* (Charity in Truth): "To desire the common good and strive towards it is a requirement of justice and charity." We must be attentive to the common good "juridically, civilly, politically and culturally" in the life of society. "The more we strive to secure a common good corresponding to the real needs of our neighbors," he writes, "the more effectively we love them."⁵

Faithful Citizenship: Solidarity

In Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, the Catholic bishops of the U.S. identify the four main principles of the Church's social teaching—Dignity of the Human Person, the Common Good, Solidarity, and Subsidiarity—and apply them to concrete issues. This entry focuses on Solidarity.



Solidarity is "a firm and persevering determination to commit oneself to . . . the good of all and of each individual, because we are all really responsible for all." We are one human family, whatever our national, racial, ethnic, economic, and ideological differences. Human beings are social in nature; we develop and flourish within a community. As baptized members of the community of the Church, we are part of one body in Christ and one global human family.²

Solidarity requires that in our prayer and in our political engagement, those who are weak, vulnerable, and most in need receive preferential concern. We are called to practice "radical solidarity" by:

- Accompanying women to choose life and supporting new mothers and their children.³
- Advocating for families and individuals affected by poverty, unemployment, sickness, mental illness, addiction, the elderly, and those with disabilities.
- Aiding victims of war and supporting peace initiatives, particularly in Ukraine, West Africa, and the Middle East.⁴
- Seeking policies that "welcome, protect, promote, and integrate" migrants and refugees who arrive at our borders and which aid development in countries of origin.⁵
- Confronting racism as an obstacle to solidarity, examining our hearts, policies, and institutions.⁶
- Critiquing a culture that prioritizes accumulation of wealth over human dignity and integral development.⁷

As we seek to foster solidarity in hearts and policies, let us pray with Pope Francis:

Lord, Father of our human family... Move us to create healthier societies and a
more dignified world, a world without hunger, poverty, violence and war. Amen.⁸
