FROM THE POST CHAPLAIN

"... by the Grace and Mercy of God, The United States of America has prevailed."

would like to share with you all the words of John Adams, as he wrote to his wife, that we all can cling to for our challenges of today and tomorrow and remember where it all started.

On July 3, 1776, following the signing of the Declaration of Independence, John Adams wrote to his wife, reflecting of what he had shared in Congress concerning the importance of that day:

The second day of July 1776 will be the most memorable epoch in the history of America. I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival. It ought to be commemorated as the day deliverance, by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty. It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires, and illuminations, from one end of this continent to the other, from this time forward forever. You will think me transported with enthusiasm, but I am not. I am not. I am well aware of the toil and blood and treasure that it will cost to maintain this Declaration and support and defend these States. Yet through all the gloom I can see the rays of ravishing light and glory. I can see that the end is worth more than all the means; that posterity will triumph in that day's transaction, even though we (may regret) it, which I trust in God we shall not."

Through the 249 years since that Declaration, there most certainly has been bloodshed and toil to preserve our independence and liberties. We have faced many challenges from foes, both here and abroad, and still do. But, by the grace and mercy of God, The United States of America has prevailed. From that first declaration, through the Constitution and Bill of Rights we still stand strong in the world for freedom and democracy.

It hasn't been, and still is not perfect, but there is no other country as close to the values of liberty and freedom of its people as the U.S.A. Was this accomplished for personal gain and self gratification? Most certainly not! But, it has been through the Blessing of God upon our actions.

Within the American Legion, we still affirm where our allegiance lay when we state our Preamble to the Constitution of the American Legion, beginning with: "For God and Country." When we forget, or do not follow those words we find ourselves in trouble. When we strive for self-gain, and not for our "Four Pillars," we are and will be unsuccessful.

Obviously, we all should take a step back and seriously examine why we are here; what it is that we truly want to aspire to. Are we here to help ourselves, or with Gods sanctifications, together help others? Personally, I truly believe that the vast majority of us do, and it will be with our unified voice that we can get back to that glory that we once had. But, it must be without the human evils that can creep in.

So, not just as a Chaplain, but as a citizen and veteran, I ask each of you to look into yourselves and ask, "What is **my** 'Why'?" Are you here for "God and Country," helping others, to "Be the One," and to help maintain our freedoms and democracy – OR is there another reason more about "self?" We can get away from the gloom and again "see the rays of ravishing light and glory," as John Adams once foresaw. All we have to do is to put others before self, put God first, and to truly love our neighbors.

I wish all of you God's blessings with a safe and glorious Independence Day, and to not forget what *can be*.

As it says in James 1:25 "But he who looks into the perfect law of liberty and continues in it and is not a forgetful hearer but a doer of the work, this one will be blessed in what he does." May God Bless America!

Post holds flag destruction ceremony on Flag Day

<u>Virginia Legacy Run Raises Money Again for Veterans and Children Foundation</u>

Annual fundraising ride explores Blue Ridge and has surprise ending

he weather was hot and the roads were twisty for this year's Virginia Legacy Run, held at Natural Bridge, Va., June 19-21. This year's event was the eighth time riders have gathered to raise money by riding their motorcycles.

Riders from all over Virginia converged on Natural Bridge and rode scenic byways across the Blue Ridge mountains in Virginia and West Virginia over two days to raise money for The American Legion Veterans and Children Foundation. The historic Natural Bridge Hotel served as the headquarters for the ride activities.

Seventeen SVALR members represented Post 284 during this year's run. All of the Post's participants were assigned to F Flight, and Sammy Granderson served as road captain for the group. Assistant road captain was Past SVALR Director Randy Grenier and

tail gunner for the group was Past SVALR Director Brad Harter.

The first day's ride lasted a little over four hours and covered nearly 200 miles of curvy road with hairpin turns, and switchbacks—every rider's dream. It went through the Blue Ridge mountains of western Virginia and into West Virginia a couple of times during the ride. Although it was quite warm, the roads were frequently covered in shade by tall trees, which made for a pleasant ride.

The riders departed the Natural Bridge Hotel riding first to a cemetery in Buchanan for a wreath laying ceremony. They then proceeded to a rest stop in a funeral home parking lot and then on to lunch at Moose Lodge 610 in Covington. After lunch and more twisty roads, the riders stopped for fuel at a Love's Truck Stop in Covington. Then it was back to the Natural Bridge Hotel for a dinner provided by Mission BBQ.

The Saturday ride went first to a park and ride lot

in Waynesboro for a rest stop, then on to lunch at Devil's Backbone Base Camp in Roseland. There was another rest stop after lunch at a Food Lion supermarket in Madison Heights. Then the bikers returned to the Natural Bridge Hotel. Dinner on Saturday evening was provided by Siler Trucking, which also provided a chase vehicle for the riders in case any of them ran into mechanical difficulty.

There was also video and still photography accomplished of this year's ride by a drone operated by Steve Stover and LSS Drone Photography. He even managed to put the drone in follow mode where it was able to follow the bike formation and capture some dramatic video of the long line of bikes making their way through the mountains. Some have been posted to the Virginia Legacy Run Facebook page and more have been promised.

The big surprise that ended the ride on Saturday was the wedding of SVALR Post 284 member and Department ALR Director Randy Gunn and Liz Alley by Department ALR Chaplain Mark Grapin in front of the Natural Bridge Hotel. They had succeeded in keeping the whole event secret throughout the Legacy Run schedule.


A quick reminder to all riders, our monthly meeting is the first Tuesday of every month. Hope to see you all on July 1st at 6:30pm.



My decision to step away was driven by the need to care for my great-grandchildren during the difficult period of COVID-19. Today I am still caring for them. They are now 10 years old. Veterans, Gold Star Families get free lifetime pass to national parks, wildlife refuges, other public lands

Pass provides free lifetime access and waived recreation fees for Veterans

n Veterans Day 2022, the National Park Service unveiled a lifetime pass providing free entrance to national parks for Veterans and their families. The Interagency Military Lifetime Pass waives entrance fees for the National Park Service and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and standard amenity recreation fees for the Bureau of Land Management, Bureau of Reclamation, U.S. Forest Service and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers sites for current military service members and their dependents, Veterans and Gold Star Families.

Veterans and their families have free access to approximately 2,000 public locations spread out across more than 400 million acres of public lands, which host activities to fit any lifestyle—from serene to

high octane, including hiking, fishing, paddling, biking, hunting, stargazing, camping, and much more.

The Military Pass has been expanded to include a pass that does not expire for Veterans and Gold Star Family members. The National Defense Authorization Act of 2022 authorized a free lifetime pass to national parks and other federal recreational lands for eligible Veterans and Gold Star Families. In recent years, they were able to receive annual passes.

Are you eligible?

For purposes of this program, a Veteran is identified as an individual who has served in the United States Armed Forces, including the National Guard and Reserve, and is able to present one of the following forms of valid (unexpired) identification:

Department of Defense Identification Card

- Veteran Health Identification Card (VHIC)
- Veteran ID Card
- Veterans designation on a state-issued U.S. driver's license or identification card

Gold Star Families are next of kin of a member of the United States Armed Forces who lost his or her life in a "qualifying situation," such as a war, an international terrorist attack, or a military operation outside of the United States while serving with the United States Armed Forces.

The America the Beautiful – the National Parks and Federal Recreational Lands Pass (Interagency Pass) Program

The Interagency Pass Program includes a free annual pass for active-duty members of the U.S. Military and their dependents. Current Military service members must show a valid (unexpired) Department of Defense ID. Dependents of current service members must show a valid (unexpired) DD Form 1173 AD or DEC.

Other free or discounted passes, including some lifetime passes, are available for persons with permanent disabilities, fourth grade students, volunteers and senior citizens age 62 years or older.

How to get your Interagency Pass

Interagency Passes can be obtained in person while visiting a participating site. Visit <u>Places to Get Interagency Passes</u> for a searchable list and be sure to contact the site before you go, to make sure they are open and have passes in stock. In addition, Military passes, as well as those for seniors and persons with permanent disabilities, are available online through the <u>USGS Online Store</u> with an additional processing fee. Existing passes remain valid. You do not need to obtain a new pass if you already have a Lifetime Senior or Access Pass.

For more information about eligibility and passes, visit <u>Free Entrance to National Parks for Veterans</u> and Gold Star Families (U.S. National Park Service) (nps.gov).

The participating agencies also offer several fee-free days for everyone throughout the year to mark days of celebration and commemoration. Examples of feefree days include the birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr., National Public Lands Day, Veterans Day and the signing of the Great American Outdoors Act.

Fee-free days and fee policies vary among the agencies, so it's best to check the agency website or contact the site you plan to visit in advance of your trip.

If you are interested in applying for a veteran ID card, you can do so <u>here</u>.

A Veteran Health Identification Card (VHIC) is a photo ID card you'll use to check in at your VA health care appointments. Learn how to get a VHIC in person or online—and how to replace a lost or stolen card here.
