#### The Four Attitudes in Membership Conversations (Continued)

n July, I introduced acceptance, indifference, objections, and skepticism. We started with acceptance in July and moved on to the most difficult attitude, indifference, in September. To summarize these:

- For acceptance: Close.
- For indifference: Introduce features and turn them into benefits.

This month let's talk about skepticism.

The best way to respond to skepticism is to offer proof. It sounds simple, and it really is.

Recognizing this attitude is clear, they will use words like "I doubt," "Are you sure?," or "That doesn't sound right." Sometimes skepticism is wrapped in an attitude of objection. Try not to confuse the two. Learn to recognize them both and be prepared to handle each.

Take an example: someone says, "Does anyone even attend your events?"

If you handle this as an objection, you might reinforce or even introduce a new objection. If you treat it as skepticism, you recognize that they already like what you are saying they're just not convinced. This is an opportuni-

tv!

Skeptical people are often on the edge of acceptance. You are one step away from success. They want to believe you; they just need to see the evidence. That's where you "bring the receipts."

#### **Examples of Skepticism and How to Handle Them**

- "I doubt people my age would feel welcome." Response: Share specific stories of members in their age group or mention an event where different generations connected.
- "Are the dues worth it?"

  Response: Show what their dues support: scholarships, veteran support programs, community projects, or a calendar of included activities.
- "I've heard these groups don't really do much anymore."

Response: List recent accomplishments, such as fundraisers, local partnerships, or a packed events calendar.

"Do you actually help veterans, or is it just meetings?"
 Response: Share direct proof: hours volunteered, funds

donated, or a testimonial from a veteran helped by the Post.

These are powerful benefits. Share them in real, personal terms because while skeptics want receipts, sometimes the strongest "proof" is the testimony of people living it.

**Pro Tip on Skepticism:** Don't argue - demonstrate. A skeptic doesn't need persuasion; they need proof. The faster you can show real examples, the faster skepticism turns into trust.

#### **Preserving a Legacy:**

#### Caring for Your or an Ancestor's Military Uniform

ilitary uniforms are much more than fabric and thread. They are a tangible reminder of service and sacrifice.

Each uniform is woven with countless stories of courage and determination. If you are the custodian of one of these precious artifacts, special care should be taken to preserve this physical piece of history.

We are often asked for advice on how to properly care for a military uniform. To ensure we provide the best guidance, we consulted with our colleagues at The National WWII Museum. They have generously shared some expert tips. Here are their recommendations:

#### Cleaning a Uniform:

- **Inspect**: Before cleaning a military uniform, inspect the garment for damage.
- Dry Cleaning: Dry cleaning is recommended for

the most stable and sturdy wool uniforms only. Dry cleaning can potentially damage the garment due to the use of solvents and the tumbling action used to clean them. When dry cleaning a uniform, choose a reputable cleaner that specializes in vintage clothing, luxury items, or costumes. Delicate fabrics such as silk should not be cleaned to avoid color bleeding or structural damage. Remove all metal decorations beforehand. Uniforms should only be hand-pressed with a pressing cloth to prevent damage.

• Hand Washing: Some durable fabrics, such as vintage fatigues, may tolerate gentle hand washing if they are structurally sound. Use only cool water and a mild, pH-neutral soap specifically designed for delicate textiles. Support the uniform when wet, as wet fibers become weaker. Rinse thoroughly and lay flat to dry in a well-ventilated area, away from direct sunlight or heat. Avoid a washing machine, as the agitation

can damage the uniform.

- Gentle Vacuuming: Remove surface dust from the uniform with a hand-held vacuum on the lowest setting. Avoid using suction on loose threads, insignias, medals, and decorations. Vacuum all seams and pockets (inside and out) to remove debris that might harbor pests. Vacuuming can also remove insect eggs and larvae. Avoid using mothballs, as the naphthalene can cause health issues. Cedar is a deterrent to pests, but its effect is not long-term. Cedar should be sanded regularly to help refresh the aroma.
- Soft Brushing: A small, soft brush, such as a clean makeup brush, can remove dust from medals and decorations.
- Contact a Professional Textile Conservator: When the uniform is fragile or unstable, it is recommended that you consult or hire the services of a professional, certified textile conservator.
- Storing a Uniform: Store your uniform in a cool, dark, and dry place. Wrap it with acid-free tissue paper, with extra tissue paper used to pad the folds and prevent creasing. Lay the uniform flat

- with as few folds as possible—stuff hats or other dimensional items with acid-free tissue to help them retain their shape. Finally, place the uniform in an acid-free archival box. Acid-free tissue paper and boxes are available at several online retailers.
- Displaying a Uniform: Uniforms can be displayed temporarily with padded hangers. However, we don't recommend hanging uniforms in the long term, as this can stress the fibers in the fabric.
- Regular Inspections: Inspect your uniform for any signs of pest damage, such as holes, webs, or dead insects.

Following these tips can help you preserve your ancestor's military uniform, allowing their service and stories to be passed down to the next generation.

than two baskets to any family, regardless of the number of people in the household, severely constrains the number of area families we are able to assist.


As we move forward, let's unite as One Legion Family, under one flag, promoting progress and making a lasting, positive impact. Together, we are stronger.

as the list changes every year. The requested information is critical in the event we have more nominations than baskets.

Regardless of the size of a household, please do not nominate a family to receive more than two baskets. The amount of funds we have for this annual project is limited and if we give more than two baskets to a single household, that results in the Post serving far fewer than our goal of 72 families. In the past, we've had some households nominated to receive a basket for every adult and child in the home, which depletes the number of baskets we are able to provide the needy. We want to serve as many as possible.

Grocery distribution is on a first requested received basis and **you may nominate only two households.** So get your nomination in early. We may attempt to contact nominees who did not make the lists if there are no shows. All information is kept confidential. **Sponsors, please be sure to include your name and phone number** to do any necessary follow-up. Nominations without a number may be disqualified.
