FROM THE POST CHAPLAIN

Where did the word chaplain come from?

ast month, I wrote about the American Legion's "Service to God and Country" program and touched a little on whether Americans believed in God. I also discussed a little of my duties as the Post Chaplain. I thought this month it might be good to explore a little of the history and development of the American Legion's chaplaincy.

When the word "chaplaincy" is either seen or heard, most think of the military. That is true because of the significance and historic role the chaplaincy has long played in the military. That is still true. However, there are many types of chaplain's service, including that of The American Legion, available to those willing to serve in such a capacity. Each type of chaplain's service is distinct depending upon its purpose and those being served.

The chaplaincy has a long and honorable history, For it is as old as the story of military operations. The term goes back to a legend of the fourth century about Martin of Tours. It is said that on his way home from battle he met a shivering beggar. He cut his cloak into two parts and gave one to the beggar. Legend says that night he had a vision of Christ wearing the part given to the one in need. His part known as a "cappa" was kept in a shrine called "cappella," becoming an object of veneration. French kings applied the term "chappelains," which meant "keepers of the cloak," to those clergy who ministered to them.

In the years that followed, chaplains were found wherever men went to war. In Colonial America, the tradition was continued. The legal origin of the



Martin of Tours (c. 316–397 AD) was a Roman soldier turned monk and bishop who founded monasteries and churches. He is famous for cutting his cloak to give half to a freezing beggar, a selfless act that became a symbol of his generosity and is still celebrated on his feast day, November 11th. He is the patron saint of soldiers and conscientious objectors, and the words "chapel" and "chaplain" derive from the story of his cloak.

chaplaincy as part of the American military service dates from July29, 1775, when the Continental Congress recognized the chaplaincy as being part of the army. From that date, the role and mission of the chaplaincy has grown. Now the chaplaincy plays a significant role in all branches of service.

One might well ask, "Is The American Legion chaplaincy important?" Our founding fathers must have thought so because an office of chaplain was established. From that day until now, the chaplain has been an integral part of the total program.

Why do so few volunteer at a Post of nearly 800 members?

've been a member of Post 284 for more than six years. I transferred to this Post from Post 177 in Fairfax, Va., after moving to Chester in early 2019. I specifically transferred to this Post because it was the seventh largest in the Department of Virginia, and was a consistent award winner for the quality of its programs.

What I discovered after becoming a member here is that there is a core group of less than 20 volunteers out of more than 800 who are the ones actively getting things done in Post 284.

These individuals are the committee chairs, Post officers, Legion family leaders, workers at every event, working in the kitchen every time food is served, are members of the color guard, or the people always working Bingo. Nearly all of these individuals have been doing these activities steadily for five to 10 years or more.

Why, out of a membership of more than 800 to we always have to rely on the same 20, or so, people to keep Post 284 running to the benefit of so many?

I was unable to make it out to assist with the food deliveries to first responders on Patriot's Day this year. I had a situation at home that I simply couldn't get away from. I wasn't the only one. It was true of several other members who, traditionally, have assisted with this event every year. The result? There were three individuals—the Post commander, and one other Post member and the President of the Auxiliary—who delivered all the food to two Police Departments, five fire stations, the Colonial Heights Emergency Communications and Sheriff's Departments, and five area schools. Three volunteers. Three.

Last year, the Southern Virginia Chamber of Commerce selected Post 284 as the Best Community Support Organization in the Colonial Heights, Prince George, Petersburg, and Hopewell area. We were nominated for this honor once again this year; however, the activities that have brought us to the attention of the SOVA Chamber of Commerce two years in a row are *always* accomplished by the same group of people.

We've run ads in the past couple of issues of the *News and Views* seeking people willing to be committee chairs. They are appearing in this issue as well. In nearly every instance, the committees needing new chairs have been chaired by the same person for at least the last five years or more and they are simply burned out. Each of them need to "take a breath," step away from their constant involvement

for such a long period of time, and reassess how much time they are presently able to dedicate to Post obligations in view of their other responsibilities to family, church, and home.

Why is it so hard to get people to volunteer in an organization with a large membership but few active volunteers? It is actually a common problem. The key is understanding why people don't volunteer and then removing those barriers while offering the right motivations and opportunities.

The key to getting volunteers in large organizations has four parts:

- 1. Engage and incentivize current and former members;
- Offer different types of opportunities;
- Implement a robust communication strategy; and
- 4. Build a culture of recognition and appreciation.

Lets take a look at each of these individually.

To engage and incentivize current and former members to volunteer works best when they are asked directly and personally.

Research shows the most effective recruitment method is a personal invitation from someone the member knows and respects.

Maintaining a database of past volunteers and their service history is a good way to find people with the necessary experience. Reaching out to them with a special message acknowledging their past contributions and highlighting new, relevant opportunities is a good recruiting tool.

It's also possible to attract new volunteers by providing unique perks. Examples include exclusive merchandise, discounted rates for events and volunteer appreciation events.

When offering different types of opportunities, it helps to offer a variety of roles. This could range from high-commitment roles to low-commitment tasks known as "micro-volunteering."

Accommodate busy schedules with evening, weekend, or even virtual and short-term assignments. Flexible scheduling makes it easier for people with limited time to participate.

For each need, create clear job descriptions. Clearly outline responsibilities, required skills, an d time commitment. This helps potential volunteers find a good fit and clarifies expectations.

Focus, too, on the volunteer's benefit not just how the organization will benefit from them volunteering. When making an appeal, emphasize what volunteers gain. Highlight opportunities for skills development, professional networking and connecting with a community of peers who share their passions.

One place where I've tried to assist Post 284 is with the implementation of a communications strategy. I'm trying to help spread the word through emails, newsletters, social media, our website, and online member communities.

I'm trying to use these tools to regularly showcase the tangible impact that volunteers have on the American Legion mission. Highlighting individual volunteers helps to make the experience more personal and inspiring. That plays into building a culture of recognition and appreciation. Featuring volunteers on social media, on our website and in the *News and Views* makes current volunteers feel valued, but also shows potential volunteers that their conditions will be appreciated

Personal thank yous are a core part of a good volunteer program. It can be as simple as an email or a personalized thank-you note.

Always solicit and implement feedback. Involve volunteers in the conversation by asking for their feedback on their experiences. Acting on their suggestions can make your program stronger and shows that you value their input.

I'm one of those people who tends to volunteer too much. I give up much of my personal time that could be spent on hobbies, making music, flying, or riding my motorcycle. I have always been a workaholic and enjoy staying busy when I can use my skills, knowledge and creativity; however, when I feel that my work, my time, my effort are no longer appreciated, I will not hesitated to back away.

I think it is a universal need for volunteers to be supported, not just used.

Let us see what we can do in Post 284 to better build a culture of support for our volunteers. Let's build friendships, work collaboratively to help our volunteers feel a sense of belonging and appreciation.

I certainly volunteer to assist with that!



Post Public Relations Officer records a song about the American Legion Riders

COLONIAL HEIGHTS, VA (Legiontown) — Richard M. "Dick" Cole, a 72-year-old member of The American Legion, Sons of The American Legion and American Legion Riders, was moved to write a song after participating in June's Virginia Legacy Run.

"I thought a rock song about participating in motorcycle rides with my Legion brothers and sisters would be a great way to bring attention to ALR and the efforts of the organization, nationwide, in fundraising for veterans' causes." Cole is a veteran of performing with several Virginia rock bands including "Point Blank," "OTR," "Riptide," "Fastrac" and "Four of a Kind."

His call sign while flying in the Air Force was "Cozy." "I sat in on the drums with a band performing at the Mather AFB Officer's Club while I was in undergraduate navigator training. One of my instructors knew of a famous drummer named Cozy Cole and gave me Cozy as a call sign. Now, I use it as my motorcycle road name with the American Legion Riders and the Combat Veterans Motorcycle Association," Cole said.

"Ride With the Wind" is being distributed by CD Baby and was made available to YouTube Music, Spotify, Pandora, and Deezer on Sept. 8. It is downloadable from Spotify here. It will soon also be added to Apple Music and iTunes. As of press time, the song has been played 4,614 times, added to 200 playlists, and downloaded 139 times just on Spotify alone.

"I thought it would be something great that could be used under videos from ALR events. Any monetization that comes from playing or downloading the song will be donated to the American Legion Veterans & Children Foundation through the Legion Riders at my Post," Cole said.

Cole has been a musician, photographer and writer since high school. He served 20 years in the Air Force in a variety of jobs, retiring as a major in 1992. He also served as a government supervisory public affairs specialist, retiring in 2013 as a GS-15.



Dick Cole serves as American Legion Colonial Heights Post 284's public relations officer and historian, and as the Southern Virginia American Legion Riders' historian. He's also currently the editor of the American Legion Department of Virginia's newsletter, Virginia Legionnaire. He also previously served as the Post's third vice commander.

"Writing music and serving as my post's public relations officer and historian allow me to continue to be creative and keep me pretty busy," Cole said. "I'm not in gigging bands any longer but do get together weekly to jam with friends in the Richmond area, and they assisted with getting this song recorded."

This is Cole's first original song, but not his last. "My friends and I have recorded other songs, including one about my Vietnam experience, which are presently working their way through the CD Baby distribution process."
