

From Rev. Haydie

Break out your ruby slippers—it's Pentecost! It's traditional to wear red on Pentecost Sunday, after all. (There's a red boa in the rummage sale this year—maybe you can get it in time?) This Sunday, we'll remember the Holy Spirit's coming to Jesus's followers in wind and fire. It's the "birthday of the church" and one of the greatest feasts of our church year. The Alleluia Choir will join us. Many of us will indeed wear something red to symbolize that fire—the arrival of the Spirit in our lives.

We'll hear how the disciples had waited for that arrival. Jesus told them to: we heard him in John's gospel a week or two ago. We heard his promise that "the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you. "So they've been praying for the Spirit's coming... the Spirit's guidance... ever since they saw Jesus leave them for the last time.

Finally, on Pentecost, the Spirit shows up. Sparkly red flames hover over their heads and they find themselves praising God in languages they've never spoken before. The Spirit gives them new ways to share their experiences and sends them out in to the world to do so. The church, we often say, is born.

But honestly? I wonder if there's a sense in which the disciples, like Dorothy in *The Wizard of Oz*, were waiting for something they already had. At the end of the movie, you may remember, the good witch Glinda tells Dorothy that she's **always** had the power to go home to Kansas. The ruby slippers will take her there. She never told Dorothy that before, she says, because she wouldn't have believed her. She had to learn it for herself.

I wonder if that's the same thing the Spirit teaches Jesus's followers. They **already** know about Jesus. They've **always** been able to go out and share the good news of God's power and love. Perhaps they just had to learn that for themselves? (cont.)



Our current book is *Barking to the Choir*, Jesuit priest Gregory Boyle's funny, touching, and thoughtful account of his decades-long gang-intervention ministry. We had a lively discussion of chapters 1-5 in early June and are looking forward to exploring chapters 6-10 at 7 pm on **Tuesday**, **July 1**. Join us! And for more about Fr. Loving the Questions

Also in the first week of July, we'll be following up on our May session of Loving the Questions. What, we asked in May, do we see when we look at the Bible? Where do the books and letters in it come from, and how do we respond to them? We'll continue that discussion in July, exploring one story in particular: that of the Gentile woman who begs Jesus to heal her daughter in Matthew 15: 21-28 and Mark 7:24-30.

Also looking ahead...

- July 4 Parade. As in several past years, Trinity will walk in Pocatello's July 4th parade—complete with New Orleans Jazz Band! This year's parade is even going to be a led by the Budweiser Clydesdales. So buy some sunscreen, mark it on your calendar, and stay tuned for more details.

Whether or not you walk with the brass ensemble in the parade, you'll get to hear it (weather permitting) at Morning Prayer in the courtyard on July 6th. What a great way to celebrate the best of our nation's past, as we continue to pray for its future.
- July 26 Deanery Day. We'll join friends from around the deanery at Good Shepherd Fort Hall on this Saturday for fellowship and food... a few service projects... and some shared worship. It's a great opportunity to visit this lovely little church, and we'll wind up before the day is at its hottest.

Leaving Gracefully

In May, Trinity hosted "Leaving Gracefully: Planning for the End of Life," and the workshop was a great success! Over twenty people attended, and speakers included experts from legal, medical, and financial fields. Lunch and lovely snacks were provided. Thanks to Diane Nelson, chief organizer and caterer; Scott Bouman, chief baker; and the Idaho Episcopal Foundation.

Introducing the program, Rev. Haydie also provided an overview of end-of-life rituals and guidance available through the Episcopal Church. She's since been asked if she could offer time to meet individually with congregants making plans for their own burials and burial services. The answer is that of course she can! If her regular office hours (Mondays and Fridays 10 am-2 pm) work for you, you can drop by or call ahead to set up an appointment. If some other time would work better, let her know and she'll be happy to work something else out.

And if you already know what kind of end-of-life, funeral, or burial rituals you're hoping for, we hope you'll tell us. Is there a hymn you want sung at your service? A particular reading? Go ahead and write that down—perhaps in a planning book like those distributed at the workshop—and let the church make a photocopy of those pages. It's your best shot at being remembered the way you want to be, and it's a real kindness to the people you'll be leaving behind.
