Why do we...


Keep changing the color of our vestments and altar hangings? The traditional church year is divided into six major "seasons" that invite us to explore different aspects of our relationship to God. The church's decorations and vestments act as signs of these seasons, marking our place in the church year.

Two of the church's seasons are festive. The first begins with Christmas, and the second begins with Easter. These are the high points of our year and we celebrate them with white and gold vestments, hangings, and streamers. We also use white for funerals, marriages, and a few other celebrations during the year.

Two other seasons are solemn: they're times of spiritual reflection in which we prepare our hearts for the Christmas and Easter feasts. The first is Advent, which begins around December 1 and ends at Christmas. The second is Lent, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends with Holy Week. The traditional color for these seasons is purple, symbolizing repentance and re-turning towards God. No flowers are on the altar during Lent, and brass crosses and candlesticks are replaced with simple wooden ones.

The last two seasons are... ordinary. They mark the time between the end of one festive season and the start of the next solemn one. The first is Epiphany, which follows Christmas, and the second is the-season-after-Pentecost, which lasts for most of the summer and fall. These are the ordinary weeks of our lives, weeks of doing our best to love God and our neighbor. Their color is green.

The basic pattern, therefore, is purple-white-green, purple-whitegreen. But there are also just a few special times throughout the year when we use red, instead: these are days so special that they don't really fit into the pattern. Look for red next month at Pentecost!

Feeding the 5,000 Families

Pocatello and Chubbuck have been blessed by another successful "Feeding the 5,000 Families" campaign this year. Final numbers for the communitywide campaign aren't in yet, but here at Trinity we collected 442 items for the giveaway bags at My Brother's Table. On the day before Easter, moreover, Trinity volunteers staffing the entrances at Ridley's raised just about \$900 for the Idaho Foodbank.

The campaign's closing concert will be held on Monday, April 22, 5:30 p.m. at Good Shepherd Lutheran/First Presbyterian church at 18th and Clark, and will be followed by a Mulligan soup supper.
