

From Rev. Haydie

Well, THAT was a couple of weeks! A car accident devastating our sister congregation in Idaho Falls. A face-first tumble down the stairs leaving me concussed and homebound. Rainclouds opening on the city's Fourth of July Parade, Trinity's jazz ensemble ringing out between the drops. The same music, praising God in bright sunlight at our Sunday courtyard service.

I'm immensely grateful to Geoff Friedley for all the hard work he did to coordinate both those musical events—as well as to the congregants and musicians (both Trinity and guest) who worked together to make them happen. It does, indeed, take a village. I'm also deeply grateful to everyone who has reached out to me with cards and prayers and offers of help. My office hours are likely to be a little erratic over the next few weeks, I'm afraid, but I'm doing much better.

It takes a village. These weeks have reminded me how much we need community—our families and church families, our friends and colleagues and neighbors. They remind me how crucial it is to have that village; how crucial it is to be that village for the people around us. And not for just the people we know.

Last Sunday brought us Jesus's parable of the Good Samaritan. That passage starts with a conversation in which Jesus reaffirms the greatest law of all: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself."

But you know what happens next. The lawyer he's talking to asks him: "Who is my neighbor?" And Jesus responds with the story of a Samaritan who went out of his way to help a seriously injured man. A Samaritan: a member of the community most disliked and despised by faithful Jews. Someone from whom Jesus's listeners would expect nothing—not even a drink of

cold water. Someone, I suspect, whom they themselves would quickly pass by, were the tables turned.

I kept thinking about this parable last week as I read news reports of Mexican rescue teams joining the flood relief efforts in Kerr County, Texas. "When it comes to disasters, especial natural disasters, there are no borders," a spokesman for one team said. But those reports were sandwiched between others about ICE raids on California farms and the opening of a migrant detention center in the Everglades. Like Jesus's Samaritan, these rescuers were true neighbors to people who might not see them the same way.

Under those circumstances, I can't believe that I would have had the rescue teams' courage—or their grace. But I know this is what Jesus calls us to: "Go," he says, "and do likewise."

Miffy's Message

Haydie tells us we have begun "the ordinary time" and the color is green. The annual flower planting and clean-up, rummage sale and Independence Day parade are in the past. I looked to the Church Year Guide (calendar) for interesting events in July. July is the month in which four of our favorite Bible characters are celebrated: Mary Magdalene on July 22, James the Apostle on July 25, Mary and Martha of Bethany on July 29. We are well acquainted with them since we read about them every year in our Bible lessons.

The day I find the most interesting is July 26, the feast day of the parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary of whom I knew nothing. Who was this couple from Nazareth? We don't read about them in our lessons because they are not mentioned anywhere in the canonical gospels. Mary's parents, St. Joachim and St. Anne are recounted in apocryphal texts like the *Protoevangelium of James*, written about 150 AD. If you Google them you can view their many depictions found in paintings and icons. James describes them as a wealthy couple from Nazareth who were infertile for many years. Joachim is said to have fasted 40 days and nights in hopes of having a child. Mary's birth was announced by an angel. The story also explains that Mary was consecrated to the Lord and went to live in the temple at the age of 3. We have no way of knowing if the story is completely true, but there is most likely some truth there. Now we know who Jesus's maternal grandparents were.



Trinity Reads

After a lively discussion of the second half of *Barking to the Choir*, Fr. Gregory Boyle's account of his gang-intervention ministry, we're moving on to Tish Harrison Warren's *Prayer in the Night: For Those Who Work or Watch or Weep*. Evoking a prayer that many of us know and love from the Compline service, this book focuses on the experience of praying through times of loss and distress. A *Christianity Today* Book of 2021, its author is an Anglican priest and former *New York Times* religion columnist. We'll discuss the first half of *Prayer in the Night* at 7pm on August 5—consider joining us or reading along!

Loving the Questions

This weekend, we'll be following up on our May session of Loving the Questions. What, we asked in May, do we see when we look at the Bible? Where do the books and letters in it come from, and how do we respond to them? We'll continue that discussion on **Saturday**, **July 19**, at 10 am, and we'll explore one challenging story in particular: that of the Gentile woman who begs Jesus to heal her daughter in Matthew 15: 21-28 and Mark 7:24-30.

Residents use these traditional notebooks as spiritual journals and more, and Trinity has long been one of the local faith communities providing them. When in doubt, please contact the alleged sender (or the parish office) directly. Don't reply to those emails that solicit for money; do feel free to delete and report them as spam.
