Greetings! As we move into November, we approach Thanksgiving, that time that we celebrate the coming together of the pilgrims and the Native Americans that were present in the land the pilgrims settled.

The pilgrims were in dire straits. Many of the ones who came over from England had died, many that were still alive were sick without the proper medications and starvation was closing in on all who remained. Hope for survival was fading.

Then something happened. The Native Americans came to their rescue. They taught them how to plant and how to survive. On what we celebrate as Thanksgiving Day, the pilgrims and native Americans came together and had a feast. Friendships were established and the pilgrims survived, and their numbers grew. History tells the rest of the story.

I bring this up because the two things that threatened the pilgrims are still with us today: food and health care. The S.N.A.P. program feeds millions of Americans; men women, children, the elderly. Medicaid helps pay millions of people to have medical insurance from the Affordable Care Act, or as it known, Obama Care. These programs are for the lower and poorer class of folks in our society. These are the people whom Jesus would call "the least of these" from Matt. 25, struggling to just get by. Many cant even afford any insurance. The food program feeds millions including children and the elderly who have little income. These programs are in danger of being eliminated Nov. 1 from the government shutdown. It will devastate millions who depend upon these programs for their literal survival. Our own Meals-On-Wheels program we have here at the church will lose the money it takes for this program to continue. Medical insurance premiums will triple and many will have to drop it, meaning they will not have any insurance for their families or themselves.

To me this is not a political issue. It's a moral issue. Politics can argue about their differences, but I would hope all politicians would not withhold food or medical coverage from people who need it. We are a very rich country and no one should suffer from hunger or sickness when so much of this could be avoided or helped.

In the medical area, it's not just individual people who will suffer but rural hospitals, clinics and nursing homes will close due to the cut off of funds that keep these places open. What will become of all these millions of people whose lives literally depend upon these places?

Let the politicians argue over whatever issues they want to argue about but tend to the "least of these" as we say in our pledge of allegiance, we are "one nation under God". If that be the case, let's continue to be that nation of care and compassion for those who cannot fully help themselves. It will define us as to what kind of people and nation we want to be. As we do it to the least of these we do it to Christ himself!
