To the Saints at First Presbyterian,

Greetings. We are winding down the 40 days and nights of Lent. This coming Sunday is Palm Sunday, the day folks gathered by the roadside and welcomed Jesus into Jerusalem as he road on a donkey, coming as a "hero", so the folks thought. We will wave the palm branches as did those original folks.

The Holy Week then begins. We will have our Maundy Thursday service in the fellowship Hall around tables set in a square. We will try and duplicate, to a point, something of the original meal, the last supper. The service will consist of a meal of fruit, bread and cheese. We ask that all who are coming will bring either fruit, bread or cheese or all of the above. Lamb is optional if anyone would like to bring it. Wine is optional as well, if one wants to bring their own bottle. Water will be provided. The service will start at 6:30 pm. We will have communion around the tables. While this will seem like an informal service which it will be, it will carry a lot of history and importance. The last supper or communion, is still celebrated each month by a lot of churches and celebrated to some degree by almost all Christian churches.

The theme I want to examine that night is the theme of "betrayal." We all probably have experienced betrayal to some degree by others. Betrayal doesn't have to be by a person. It can be by a group of people, a business, institutions, elected officials, religious leaders or even a denomination. Spouses, family members and friends are always part of that too.

Jesus had a terrible betrayal since it came from one of his own disciples. He knew who it was as even told him to go and do what he must do. A kiss sealed the deal; an act of love identified him as the Christ to the guards.

Join us for this re-enactment of the supper and worship communion service. Look forward to seeing you.



On March 2, 2022 the Lenten season began with a short Ash Wednesday service here at First Presbyterian. We, as is custom, joined forces with other churches in town to provide a meal and short devotion each Wednesday night throughout Lent.
