To the Saints at First Presbyterian:

Greetings. There is a really good book written by Rabbi Kushner entitled, "How Good Do I Have To Be?" This is the same rabbi who wrote, "When Bad Things Happen To Good People"

This book is about growing up and expectations his father had on him to be good and follow all the rules set down by his parents. It was hard growing up for him to always having to be "good" so to speak. It deals with all the expectations placed upon him and what expectations we put on others.

When you think about it, we all had expectations put on us as we grew up. We have expectations of other people in our lives, even among others in society. We expect people to be as we think they should be.

I think one of the big problems we have today is we expect too much from each other. Everyone should be perfect we have been conditioned to believe. Mistakes aren't forgiven. The main problem is that we are never perfect and too often we cannot meet the expectations others place on us. This can affect all relationships, especially marriages, family and parent/child relationships, not to mention other people in society. The demand to be perfect I think drives us to drugs, depression, alcoholism, and all sorts of broken relationships, even violence and sometimes death.

A reason many people avoid church I'm told, is that they don't feel good enough to come, as if the church places goodness as a requisite to enter the sanctuary. Perhaps some churches do but the stigma is out there.

We will often carry this burden in our relationship to God. "I gotta be good for God to love me." We do all sorts of things to impress God. The church, no matter what denomination or major religion, has a pathway to God's heart. It's all about us or so we think.

Fortunately, or unfortunately, that's never been the way things work in the true meaning of Christianity. We are and always have been a religion of grace. We don't have to be good for God to love us. Our goodness isn't going to get us closer to God or into heaven. It is our relationship to Christ and our faith in him. Goodness (the Law) was replaced by Jesus who came to fulfill the law and open the door to God's grace that accepts us just as we are. Our goodness is from our love of Christ. We were first loved. Jesus came to redeem and save our fallen lives which could never be good enough. He loved sinners.

Remembering this I think what a great change we might have in our personal relationship with God, and others, if we didn't place so much emphasis on goodness or perfection on them and allowed them to just be human and imperfect. God does that for us and maybe we can do that for others. When the New Testament tells us to "be perfect" the Greek word actually means to "be fulfilled, made whole." That only comes from our Lord who loves us even with our imperfections! What an awesome God! No wonder our catechism tells us to enjoy God forever!

nearly tripled since the beginning of July TMC TEXAS from 3,076 to 8,431. The Texas Medical MEDICAL Center announced that more than one CENTER thousand people are being tested positive daily for COVID in Greater Houston, which

is seven times last month's daily average.

Athletes at the Olympic Games in Tokyo are residing in quarantined conditions, compete in empty stadiums and are being tested daily for COVID. On July 26, when my fellow Australian, Ariarne Titmus, beat reigning champion Katie Ledecky of Team USA in the 400-meter freestyle by two-thirds of a second, Titmus' coach, Dean Boxall, was her only fan in the



stands. Fear not, on July 28, Katie Ledecky bounced back to claim the first gold medal in the women's 1,500-meter freestyle. Even with this amount of precaution, Tokyo had 1,832 new cases of COVID. On July 21, the Tokyo Metropolitan Government reported 1,149 cases.



On July 21, we learned that the Bootleg Fire in Fremont-Winema National Forest of Oregon covered 617 square mile and had created its own weather system. By July 28, near Bly Oregon, a pyrocumulus cloud was spotted in the air. At least 2,000 homes had been evacuated during the fire and 5,000 were threatened. At least 70 homes and more than 100 outbuildings had gone up in flames.

On July 22, the residents in Zhengzhou, the Capital City of **ZHENGZHOU**


Henan Province in north central China, with a population of over twelve million people, were shoveling mud from their homes, and hauling away wrecked cars and piles of destroyed belongings following floods that killed at least sixty-three people, with five missing, and 8,876 homes There were memorable video images of collapsed.

know as soon as possible. What a joy and privilege to continue this vital ministry to our


