Lent: A New Beginning in humility – Christopher Lo

During the Christmas holidays, I was able to finally watch "Hamilton," a hip-hop musical by Lin-Manuel Miranda. In the first half of this musical, a character named Samuel Seabury sings a short song entitled "Farmer Refuted." Seabury was a lovalist to the crown and for



years through letter writing, carried on a vigorous debate with Alexander Hamilton.

In "Hamilton" the musical, Miranda paraphrases Seabury's warning to the revolutionaries. This same warning may even be relevant today:

"Heed not the rabble who scream revolution. They have not your interest at heart. Chaos and bloodshed are not a solution, don't let them lead you astray."

1775. November In Seabury was arrested and imprisoned for six weeks by local patriots of Connecticut. However. after the American



Revolution, this same Samuel Seabury became an American citizen and on March 25, 1783, went on to become the I first Episcopal Bishop of Connecticut. From 1789 to 1792, Seabury served as the Second Presiding Bishop of a new denomination which became autonomous from the Church of England.

On September 17, 1792, controversy over his tenure as Presiding Bishop led Samuel Seabury to concede the position to Samuel Provoost, the Bishop of New York. In doing so, Seabury wrote "I had no inclination to contend who should be the greatest in the kingdom of heaven, I thank God for his grace on this occasion, and beseech him that no self-exaltation or envy of others may ever lead me into debate and contention, but that I may ever be willing to be the least when the peace of his Church requires it."

Abraham Lincoln's first inaugural address echoed Seabury's ideal of On March 4, humility. 1861, Lincoln ended with these words, "We are not enemies, but friends. We



must not be enemies. Though passion may have strained, it must not break, our bonds of affection. The mystic chords of memory, stretching from every battle-field and patriot grave to every living heart and hearthstone all over this broad land, will yet swell the chorus of the Union when again touched, as surely they will be, by the better angels of our nature."

Food insecurity is a frightening fact of life for many in our community. On any given day, 66,000 people in southeast Texas experience the pain of hunger: 5,000 of which are children. Making the community food bank essential for so many in our community. With Covid-19 coming in to play, these numbers have increased exponentially.

What are common characteristics of food insecurity?

- Limiting the amount of money spent on , food - buying less
- Eating less food because of low money
- Inability to participate in a Food Assistance Program
- Using coping mechanisms when food is scarce: e.g., buying cheaper, lower nutritional quality food
- Two-thirds of food insecure households have an adult with a full-time job

This year the youth will be participating in the SouperBowl of Caring!

On Sunday, February 7th baskets will be placed in the Narthex to receive canned and nonperishable goods for the SouperBowl of Caring. The items will be donated to our local Alvin/Manvel Food Pantry. If you would like to make a monetary donation please note Souper Bowl on your check or envelope and place it in the offering during worship.

To continue helping the Food Pantry in the future, we will be placing the baskets in the Narthex each month on the First Sunday to collect nonperishable food on their behalf, as we have done in the past.

JANUARY 2020

The Session met on Sunday, January 24th just after service. Cindy updated everyone on the status of our Payte endowment fund, which is heading back in the right direction with a positive return for the 4th quarter of 2020. Education is planning on having Easter breakfast (that is a little different from years past) and Easter egg hunt on Easter morning. Mission team had some changes to their budget due to new information. Worship will have Lent information come out as soon as it is finalized. Congregational Care had 75 contacts since the last meeting. Buildings and Grounds asked for additional cameras to be placed around the Clothing Outlet, on their behalf, at their expense. Toilets in the education bldg. will be installed once we have the correct size. The Youth is meeting on the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays of the month, participation is slowly building. Congregational Life reported a complete success for the Chili Cook-off with 8 participants. They are considering a new category for 2022. Personnel also had changes to the budget to be approved by Session. After discussion, the budget for 2021 has been finalized and will be presented to the congregation February 21st for approval. In January, the Session nominate and vote on the new Treasurer and Clerk of Session. With the support of the Session, Cindy Waggoner and Martha Phipps will retain their positions.
