Glutton and Drunkard. Called this but little evidence in Bible to justify this title. Couldn't be very flattering.


We have always wanted to create God in our own image. We have wanted the

- Limiting the amount of money spent on food buying less
- Eating less food because of low money
- Inability to participate in a Food Assistance Program
- Using coping mechanisms when food is scarce:
 e.g., buying cheaper, lower nutritional quality food
- Two-thirds of food insecure households have an adult with a full-time job

This year the youth will be participating in the SouperBowl of Caring!

The canned goods will be donated to our local Alvin/Manvel Community Food Pantry.
