Organist's Musings - Epiphany

On the evening of December 21, I joined with throngs around the world going outdoors in

search of the Great Conjunction. Andrea Leinfelder, a staff writer with the Houston Chronicle, wrote that on this evening, "Jupiter and Saturn have been inching closer together in the night sky. And on Monday, they'll put on a show humanity hasn't seen since 1226." On this evening, although Jupiter and Saturn were hundreds of millions of miles apart in space, they looked in our night sky as though they were next-door neighbors.



Some scholars have theorized that the original Christmas star, known as the Star of Bethlehem,



might also have been a great conjunction. Other theories aiming to explain this biblical phenomenon include a supernova explosion and

a <u>comet</u>. On January 6, in our church calendar, we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany, the twelfth day of Christmas. Christians believe "the star they [the wise men] had seen when it rose went ahead of them until



it stopped over the place where the child was" (Matthew 2:9). These wise men probably did not arrive on the scene until two years after the shepherds would have been long back in their fields.

Philo of Alexandria (20 BC - 50 AD), a Jewish philosopher wrote about a highly esteemed



Eastern School of Magi who were Persians, successors of the Babylonians. These "μάγος" (Greek: magoi) - – were astrologers, "wise men" in that sense. In the Western Christian tradition, they have been given names – Balthasar, king of Chaldea, Caspar, king of Tarshish, and Melchior, king of Nubia. Most likely, they were not even called kings. However, they followed a star to find lesus.

The Reverend Mark Woods, a Baptist Minister and a former Managing Editor of

"Christian Today," suggested that "what is important in the Epiphany story is that the magi represent the coming of the

Gentile nations to do homage to the Jewish Messiah, with all their wealth, power and wisdom. The magi symbolize His power over the wise and great just as the shepherds symbolize His care for the poor and humble."

On December 12, 2020, the Food and Drug Administration issued the first emergency use authorization (EUA) for the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine. On December 17, the Moderna COVID-19 vaccine was also granted EUA status too.

In the December 23rd edition of the Houston Chronicle, the front page headline read "Texas poised to be nation's next hot spot: latest forecast suggests trouble for Houston." We pray that these vaccines may be for us, "the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" (John 1:5).

Just as the Magi brought their gift to the infant Jesus our Lord, I pray that in 2021, we too may bring our unique gift to His Service.
