Life Together

Greetings:

Recent world and national events have been disturbing. Maybe you are also dismayed by some of the things that you have seen or read recently in the media. There is an atmosphere of distrust, discontent, and anger. I have found myself drawn into the drama – alarmed by the lengths at which people will go to express their prejudices and anger. I have been captivated by the near constant stream of bad news broadcast through the various news outlets.



I would like things to be different, wouldn't you? I would like to see less anger and more understanding – less bitterness and more forgiveness – less prejudice and more understanding – less hate and more ... well... more love. It occurs to me as I think these thoughts that there has to be a way forward.

I believe the way forward is through being the change we want to see.

Maximilian Kolbe (1894 -1941) was a Polish priest who provided shelter for thousands of Jews in his monastery and was an active voice against the Nazi violence. He was arrested by the German Gestapo and imprisoned at Auschwitz. When a fellow prisoner escaped from the camp – the Nazis selected 10 other prisoners to be killed in his place as a deterrent to future escapes. As they were lined up to die – 1 of the 10 began to cry: "My wife! My children! I will never see them again!" At this, Maximilian stepped forward and asked to die in his place. His request was granted – and he led the other men in song and prayer as they awaited their deaths.

Chances are, you may never be called upon to display your faith in so overwhelming a way as Maximilian – but you can still model your faith through the way you live your life. As a person of faith, you can step forward to help out in many situations in which others are being mistreated. You can use your voice to speak out for peace and against hate. You can use your actions to bring light into dark places – and you can forgive as you have been forgiven.

I believe the way forward is through Christ.

Through Christ we are given the example of perfect love and are also given a mandate to love one another (Matt 22:37-39). We cannot say that we love God and hate our brothers and sisters. In his book, *Come Thirsty*, Max Lucado suggests that every person from cabbies to presidents – from preachers to truck drivers should be required to begin the day by standing beneath the cross to receive God's love. What a change we would see! Max says: "Less honking and locking horns, more hugging and helping kids...God's love can't be legislated – but it can be chosen. Choose it, won't you? For Christ's sake, and yours, choose it."

"I pray that you will have the power to understand ... the greatness of Christ's love – how wide and how long and how high and how deep that love is" (Ephesians 3:18).

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The Stated Session meeting was held on Monday evening at 6:30 p.m. on June 18, 2018 in the church library.

Treasurer's report: All records have been reconciled and are in good order.

Session heard reports from committees and on projects that are in the works. Brandi Bowers shared that the second draft of the new church directory still has many mistakes. Additional corrections have been made and forwarded to LifeTouch. 71 contacts were made to the congregation by the Congregational Care Team, including memorial lap quilts made and given to the families of the Santa Fe shooting victims. Project reports: The video from CGI was reviewed and approved by the Session. Pastor Craig advised that CGI made all the necessary corrections. The video should be on the City of Alvin website soon, along with our website and Facebook page.

The Session also discussed a possible change to the church's Policies and Procedures Manual regarding the term served by Trustees. The Board of Trustees has the responsibility for the preservation and maintenance of the land and buildings (including the church manse) and its preservation and repair, and recommendation for policies for the use of property which the church holds. The Board of Trustees also fill the roles of President and vice-President of our corporation. Traditionally, Trustees have served 3 year terms, which is similar to Session members. The Session feels the 3 year term should be waived and Trustees be allowed to serve an indefinite period. The rationale for this is, each year, when the church looks at prospective service providers for electricity, phone, internet, etc., or to change signatures on church bank accounts, we have to present a list of officers. It has become increasingly difficult and tedious to constantly change names and other information.

The demographics of our church have become more diverse (and younger) over the past few years. New leadership must be cultivated from this new influx of people if we are to continue our various missions and ministries. Our current Session is comprised of folks who have a wide range of experience in a Presbyterian church. 2 have less than 6 years as members of the PCUSA, 2 have 20 years as members of the PCUSA, and 5 have 35 plus years. Since the Trustees are charged with the care, preservation, acquisition and/or selling of church property, it would be in the best interest of the church to have "more mature" members who have been a part of this congregation for a long time. We need their knowledge of church history and tradition as these issues are discussed. This may have proved helpful when we discussed the sale of the church manse last year, and prevented some hurt feelings and acrimony.

It also provides a way for some folks to continue to serve and offer their expertise without the constant responsibility of the day-to-day operations of the church.

At their next meeting, the Session will decide whether or not to present this proposal to the congregation at the next congregational meeting.

- * Get the whole family involved in "serving others" in need
- * Make a difference in a child's educational experience by setting them up for success

The date for this event is Saturday, August 11, from 9 am until 12 pm. We will "pre-load" the supply packages starting in mid to late July, so make plans to help.


SUMMER MISSION SALE


