To the Saints at First Presbyterian,

Greetings! As we move from October into November, we end the month on some important days in the life of the Christian year: All Hallows Eve (Halloween) and All Saints Day.

The event of Halloween comes from the Celtic tradition of Samhain. It was an important celebration at the end of summer harvest and the beginning of the dark and cold winter. It was a time of the year they associated winter and darkness with death.

The Celtic new year was November 1. They believed that on the eve of new year's, the boundaries between the living and the dead is blurred. On October 31, the ghosts of the dead return to earth. This event made it easy for the Druids, who were the Celtic's priests, to predict the future.

The Celts would put out the fires in their hearths and gather for the huge sacred bonfire built by the Druids. The bonfire would burn crops and animals as a sacrifice to Celtic gods. The bonfire would drive away evil spirits. People would wear costumes usually consisting of animal heads and skins. Often there was a lot of drunkenness and running around naked. After the bonfire celebration, they would relight their hearth fires from the fire from the sacred bonfire.

When Rome overtook the Celtic lands, they added a few customs of their own and when the Church got involved, they Christianized the Celtic events. Since the Celts believed the dead returned on October 31, the Church made Halloween a sacred time, called it All Hallows Eve, a time to remember those who died in the faith. All Saints Day was dedicated to November 1. In some traditions, Christians will decorate the graves of loved ones and will even leave food for the spirits. This happens in Louisiana and in other states.

On Sunday, November 6, we will honor those who came before us and who played a part in our spiritual journey. A table will be set up in the front of sanctuary with candles on it and you will be able to come up and light a candle in that person, or persons memory. You may say who its for or just light candle.

The book of Hebrews tells us we are surrounded by a cloud of witnesses. We honor those who have helped us to have the faith we have. We are never alone and look to the "saints" to help us persevere in our faith journey. Their lives give us strength for our witness today.






