To the Saint at First Presbyterian:

Greetings. The lectionary Old Testament text for Oct. 1 is from the prophet Ezekiel. It is very relevant in light of what's happening in our country today. Let me share a few verses of Ezekiel 18: 23-35.

"Hear now O house of Israel: Is my way not just? Is it not your ways that are not just? When a righteous man turns away from his righteousness and commits iniquity, he shall die for it, for the iniquity which he has committed he shall die. Again, when a wicked man turns away from the wickedness he has committed and does what is lawful and right, he shall save his life." Ezekiel has more to say but I think we get his drift!

God demands righteousness from His people. The nation of Israel was turning away from God and God sent the prophets to try and bring them back. Israel didn't listen so they fell as a nation. Civil war divided Israel and the Northern kingdom fell and finally the Southern kingdom fell. They ceased to exist as a nation.

As a nation, we seem to be following in their footsteps. The corruption, dishonesty, lack of morals and personal greed has become overwhelming. The acquittal of Paxton, when the evidence was overwhelming, is a clear message, it really doesn't matter to the people who vote to keep putting these kinds of people in office. Morals, honesty, integrity, decency seem to no longer be important to so many in our nation. What happens to a nation that has begun to be corrupt? Tyrants are put in place to govern the nation and the nation falls into decay. History has shown this over and over.

We have been a nation that has claimed to be a nation under God, yet there is very little shown that justifies that statement.

I'm not talking about a theocracy. Theocracies and bad historically. You can't force people to adhere to one religion and ultimately have a nation for all people. Many came to this country to escape that kind of forcing.

A nation under God would be a nation where good moral people would be the leaders of the nation, a nation where mortality and honesty were qualifications for office. Where all people were respected and life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness, for all was important.

Turning against the expectations of God is a fatal mistake. Just read scripture. Cities and nations have fallen because of the corruption of its leadership.

The hope is that those who are corrupt will do as Ezekiel writes, will turn away from corruption and live. It's also a hope that good people will be elected to govern this great nation. God forgives. It's not God bless America, but America, bless God.



King James Version of the Bible, the one that many of us grew up reciting, says, "the valley of the shadow of death." The shadow represents the uncertainty in our lives. The uncertainty of floods, tornadoes, hurricanes, earthquakes — climate change. The uncertainty of aggression through war, gun violence, human trafficking and international tensions. The uncertainty of employment, inflation, illness — a global pandemic. Yes, the shadow of death is all around us. Yet, in Christ, we can boldly proclaim, "You are with me. Your rod will protect me from uncertain foes who wish to do me harm, and your staff will guide me on the right path for your name's sake. I fear no evil." In so doing, you proclaim God's presence of peace — peace amid uncertainty — in your own life. As a community of faith, we receive the Peace & Global Witness Offering, and as we do, we extend Christ's peace throughout our community and world even in these uncertain times. Twenty-five percent of the gifts we receive will stay right here in our church to work for peace and reconciliation alongside (share how your congregation will be using its portion of the offering). Another 25% will support the peacemaking efforts in our mid council, and 50% will go the Presbyterian Mission Agency for its ministries of peacemaking and global

witness all around the world. In just a little while, we will celebrate the Lord's Supper on this World Communion Sunday. Luke's Gospel tells us on that very first Easter as Jesus was walking down the road to Emmaus, he met two disciples who were unknown to him. When they invited him to join them for a meal, Jesus took bread and blessed it. When he did, their eyes were opened, and their hearts were strangely warmed. They were in the "real presence" of their Risen Lord and Savior. Our hope this morning is that when we share this holy meal, our eyes will also be opened, our hearts will be strangely warmed, and we will recognize the presence of the Risen Lord

among us. Then, we can boldly proclaim, "You are with me."




