

As we prepare for the Peace and Global Witness offering which will be taken on October 7, 2018, it's important to remember

that this offering makes a difference right here in the United States. Last year, many people in our area received help following Hurricane Harvey. We read with great interest about the dirty water in Flint, Michigan. The below was taken from the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance website. Their mantra is year is "Small Gifts – Big Impact."

"Presbyterian Ministries Provide Water and Hope in Flint, Michigan For years, citizens in Flint, Michigan, have been trying to bring awareness to high levels of lead leaching into their water supply from aging pipes. In late 2015, news broke nationally of just how bad the crisis was—stories of the thousands of residents who have already experienced health issues due to lead poisoning —stories of government corruption and cover-up. But also. there are stories of citizens coming together to help one another and stories of relief pouring into the city of Flint as organizations provide water supplies, filters, and crisis counseling centers. With a long history of community involvement, First Presbyterian Church of Flint (FPC) has become a trusted refuge for community members seeking relief from the crisis. With support from Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, members from FPC and the Lake Huron Presbytery have been on the ground assisting in distributing emergency water supplies, representing their community on the local recovery committee, and supporting the spiritual care and reconciliation in a community that feels betrayed. The news cameras have all pulled out, but the crisis is expected to continue for years while the government updates the city's water system. With continued support from fellow Presbyterians and the Presbyterian Mission Agency, FPC intends to play a key role in restoring their community." Any gift, no matter the size, is important.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

August Meeting

The Stated Session meeting was held Monday evening at 6:30 p.m. on August 20, 2018 in the church library.

Treasurer's report: All records have been reconciled and are in good order.

Session heard reports from committees and on projects that are in the works. 148 contacts were made to the congregation by the Congregational Care Team over a 2 month period. The Mission Sale made \$ 1, 049. Congregational Life will host a Chili Cook-off on October 28. The Session voted to recommend a change in the church's Policies and Procedures Manual regarding the term served by Trustees. The Board of Trustees has the responsibility for the preservation and maintenance of the land and buildings (including the church manse) and its preservation and repair, and recommendation for policies for the use of property which the church holds. The Board of Trustees also fill the roles of President and Vice-President of our corporation. Traditionally, Trustees have served 3 year terms, which is similar to Session members. The Session feels the 3 year term should be waived and Trustees be allowed to serve an indefinite period. This will be presented to the congregation at the next congregational meeting. Session approved several building usage requests, and approved the erection of a wall in the mission room (in the Education Building) in order to create more storage for the Mission and Outreach Team, along with the Education Team.





