To the Saints at First Presbyterian,

Greetings! This month is the month in which we celebrate Thanksgiving. While it formerly was a Christian celebration, that changed with time to a national holiday so all people could celebrate. Churches still have thanksgiving services to remember all that God has done to bless us.

To share a quick history of thanksgiving, we go back to 1621. The English colonist, called pilgrims, shared a feast with the Wampanoag Indians who were the natives surrounding Plymouth where the colonist lived.

History tells us the colonist went out "fowling" possibly for turkeys but maybe easier game like geese and ducks. They reportedly killed enough game for a week. They began the feast when 90 or so Wampanoag Indians showed up. The colonist were surprised and a little unnerved but they invited the Indians to join in the feast which lasted a few days. The Indians brought venison, fowl, fish, eels, shellfish, stews, veggies, and beer. The feast was held outside since Plymouth had few buildings.

The men fired guns, ran races, and drank liquor, struggling to speak in broken English and Wampanoag. This sealed a treaty between the two groups until King Phillips war of 1675-76 in which hundreds of colonist and thousands of Native Americans were killed.

New England colonist regularly celebrated Thanksgivings, days of prayer thanking God for blessings. The Continental Congress proclaimed a national Thanksgiving upon the enactment of the Constitution, yet after 1798, Congress left Thanksgiving to the states. Didn't want government involved in a religious observance. Southerners were slow to adopt a New England Custom. It has been said Thanksgiving didn't become a national holiday until Northerners dominated the government.

Sarah Hale campaigned for a national Thanksgiving Day to promote unity and finally won support of President Lincoln. On Oct.3, 1863 Lincoln proclaimed a national day to be celebrated on Thursday, Nov. 26. Roosevelt in 1942 designated the fourth Thursday in November as Thanksgiving Day.

As families began to move away from each other as society expanded, Thanksgiving became a time for reunion and family gatherings. The holidays moved away from its religious roots so immigrants of every background could participate in common tradition.

Football games began with Yale vs. Princeton in 1876. In he late 1800's parades began. In 1920, Gimbel's department store staged a parade of about 50 people with Santa Claus at the rear of the procession. Since 1927, Macy's department store added huge balloons.

The meal is usually around Turkeys and more food is eaten during Thanksgiving than any other time. People often consume 3-4,000 calories during the course of the dinner.

Food has a lot of variety, a lot after Native American dishes. Many different foods have been served. Here is a menu of the White House Cookbook of 1887: oysters on half shell, cream of chicken soup, fried smelts, tartare sauce, roast turkey, cranberry sauce, giblet grave, mash potatoes, baked squash, boiled onions, parsnip fritters, olives, chicken salad, venison pastry, pumpkin pie, mince pie, almond ice cream, lemon jelly, hickory nut cake, cheese, fruit, and coffee. The dinner obviously can be anything you like. It is the second most popular holiday after Christmas.

Thanksgiving has come to symbolize interculture peace, opportunity for newcomers, and the sanctity of home and family.

With so much division in our country today I wonder if we can make Thanksgiving what the origins of the holiday meant?

We thank God for all God has done and how we have been blessed even with all the situations that have challenged us over the year.

It was meant to be a time of peace and accepting others. That can be something for which we can be thankful.
