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Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We regularly recite the Apostle's Creed during our worship services as a public profession of what we believe as Christians. We say that we believe "in Jesus Christ, His only begotten Son, our Lord; who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary." This statement is an important doctrine of the Christian faith: the incarnation, God becoming a man. This is what we celebrate during the Christmas season as well as during Epiphany. Though John does not tell the story of the birth of Christ the truth of the incarnation is clearly stated in the prologue to his Gospel. John 1:1, says, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." John goes on to tell us that "the Word became flesh and dwelt among us." (John 1:14) Thus we are reminded that Jesus was both fully God and fully man.

The Heidelberg Catechism states it this way: "What does it mean that He 'was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary'?" "That the eternal Son of God, who is and remains true and eternal God, took on himself, through the working of the Holy Spirit, from the flesh and blood of the virgin Mary, a truly human nature so that he might become David's true descendant, in all things like us his brothers except for sin." The New Testament speaks of both Jesus' human nature and His divine nature.

Paul speaks of Jesus' divine nature in Colossians 1:15, "He is the image of the invisible God, the first born of all creation." And in Hebrews 1:3 we read, "He is the radiance of the glory of God and the exact

imprint of his nature, and upholds the universe by the word of his power."

The Catechism speaks of Jesus' human nature when it says, He "took to himself, through the working of the Holy Spirit, from the flesh and blood of Mary, a truly human nature". The angel told Mary that "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born will be called holy – the Son of God." And when an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream he was told "that which is in her is from the Holy Spirit." Paul tells us in Philippians 2:6-7 that "though he was in the form of God... (he) emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men."

That Jesus was descended from David was also viewed as an important fact by the New Testament writers. It was important first in order to fulfill God's promise to David, and second to fulfill the prophecies of the Old Testament. That Jesus was descended from David is seen in the genealogies of Matthew and Luke. Paul makes one of the clearest statements of this in Romans 1:3 where he says that Christ Jesus was "descended from David according to the flesh."

We are also told that in all things He was like us. "Therefore he had to be made like his brothers in every respect, so that he might become a faithful high priest in the service of God, to make propitiation for the sins of the people." (Hebrews 2:17). Jesus was like us in every respect. He grew tired, He got hungry and thirsty, and He was tempted with the same things that tempt us. However, there

is one exception, one way in which He differed from us. He was without sin. "For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weakness, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin." (Hebrews 4:15)

The Heidelberg Catechism then asks the question, "How does the holy conception and birth of Christ benefit us?" The answer is, "He is our mediator, and with his innocence and perfect holiness he removes from God's sight my sin – mine since I was conceived."

We often hear, "Jesus is the reason for the season". But what is it that we are actually celebrating? As we finish celebrating the Christmas season and as we celebrate Epiphany, let us remember that we are celebrating Jesus' birth, we are celebrating the fact that He was born of the Virgin Mary, we are celebrating the eternal Word becoming flesh, we are celebrating God's incarnation. Let us never forget the wonder of it all. And as we begin a New Year let us remind ourselves that He is Emmanuel, "God with us."

“As the Deer,” #548 in our hymnal is a church member request.

“As the Deer” is a popular praise and worship hymn by contemporary musician Martin Nystrom. This hymn was composed in 1984, with text based on Psalm 42:1, which says “As the deer pants for water, so my soul pants for You.” Nystrom took this simple line and expanded upon it to write a moving hymn

of three verses. The hymn is meant to be a devotional to the Lord. The composer related the following in depicting the story behind the hymn:

In 1984 I was a school teacher in Seattle. Since I had the summer off, I decided to go back to bible school at Christ For the Nations Institute in Dallas, TX. My roommate at CFNI challenged me to go on a fast, a period where one gives up solid food in exchange for giving more time to the bible and prayer. On day 19 of the fast, I was trying to compose a song. I was sitting at the piano and noticed a bible opened to Psalm 42 on the music stand. My eyes fell to the first verse and I sung its message right off the page. I wrote the first verse and the chorus of the song straight through – the whole song was composed in a matter of minutes. I then repeated the song so as to seal it in my mind. I didn't intend on sharing the song with anyone, but before I left for Seattle I did share it with one person, my colleague David Butterbaugh. David shared the song with the students of CFNI and it instantly became a favorite. Since this time, it has been translated into many languages and has been performed across many mediums.

Martin Nystrom is a songwriter based out of Seattle, Washington. He was born in 1956 to a mother who was raised in the Christian Reformed Church, and a father who was brought up in the Evangelical Covenant Church. He is a music education graduate of Oral Roberts University in Tulsa, OK. After college, he worked as the Music Director for the New York campus of Christ For the Nations Institute. In recent years, he has served as a song development manager for Integrity Music, for which he has composed more than 70 songs. Nystrom is the featured Worship Leader on five Integrity “Hosanna” tapes. He lives with his wife and two children in Seattle.

#### ENTER IN

Tired of making small talk at church about the weather or sports? Then follow Edward Welch's advice to "enter in" to the lives of your fellow worshipers.

A churchgoer once asked Welch, author of *Caring for One Another* (Crossway), two simple yet profound questions: "What was the best thing about your week, and what was the worst thing about your week?" About a month later, when some issues were weighing heavily on Welch's heart, he wondered who'd be willing to pray for him. Immediately, the person who'd asked him those two questions came to mind.

When worshipers are willing to enjoy one another's blessings and be burdened by one another's difficulties, Welch says, the body of Christ gets built up.

#### RECOGNIZING A STROKE

*Ran this article over a year ago so thought to re-print.* Thank God for the sense to remember the '3' steps, "STR". Read and Learn!

**Now doctors say a bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three simple questions:**

**S** \*Ask the individual to SMILE.

**T** \*Ask the person to TALK and SPEAK A SIMPLE SENTENCE (coherently).

**R** \*Ask him or her to RAISE BOTH ARMS.

If he or she has trouble with ANY ONE of these tasks, call an emergency number immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher.

New Sign of a Stroke -----Stick out Your Tongue!  
NOTE: Another 'sign' of a stroke is this: Ask the person to 'stick' out his tongue. A tongue that is 'crooked' (if it goes to one side or the other) is also an indication of a stroke.



#### Kingfisher Faith

In a video on his publisher's website, Eugene Peterson tells of watching a kingfisher repeatedly dive for fish in a lake. Peterson counted 37 dives before the kingfisher caught its supper! "And he's the king fisher!" Peterson chuckles. From that bird-watching episode, he gleaned a ministry lesson: It may take a long time and many attempts — maybe dozens! — before something works out.

God calls us to live out his love faithfully, even when we don't seem to be accomplishing anything. Maybe we extend 36 invitations to worship, work 36 monthly shifts at a food bank or utter 36 prayers without seeing results. "What's the point?" we wonder. But the kingfisher urges us on: "Maybe number 37 is the charm!"

In the words of St. Paul (and mixing fishing and farming metaphors): "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up" (Galatians 6:9, NIV).

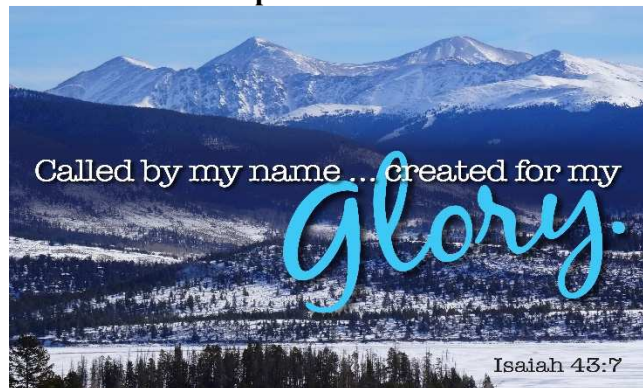
