Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

Chapter XV of the Westminster Confession of Faith is "Of Repentance unto Life." Most of us have an understanding of what it means to repent. The New Bible Dictionary says, "In the New Testament the terms 'repent' and 'repentance' refer basically to a change of mind. It is all-important to note this signification. For repentance consists in a radical transformation of thought, attitude, outlook, and direction." Repentance is more than merely being sorry for our sins, although it includes this. The phrase "repentance unto life" used by the Westminster Confession comes from Acts 11:18 in the King James Version of the Bible. Acts 11:18 from the English Standard Version reads, "When they heard these things they fell silent. And they glorified God, saying, 'Then to the Gentiles also God has granted repentance that leads to life." "Repentance that leads to life," makes more sense to our 21st century ears than "repentance unto life."

It should also be noted that in Acts 11:18 we are told that it is God who has granted repentance. In many ways repentance is a gift from God. It is the Holy Spirit working in a person's heart that brings the conviction of sin. It is the Holy Spirit working in our lives that causes us to have the "sense not only of the danger, but also of the filthiness and odiousness of" our sins. As a result we come to hate our sin and turn from all our sin unto God. Would that we would hate our sin more than we do. It is our sin that made it necessary for Christ to suffer and die on a cross. In Joel there is a wonderful call of God to His people for heartfelt repentance. "Yet even

now,' declares the LORD, 'return to Me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; and rend your hearts and not your garments.' Return to the LORD your God, for He is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love." (Joel 2:12-13)

Paragraph III of Chapter XV of the Confession makes an important statement regarding repentance. "Although repentance is not rested in, as any satisfaction for sin, or any cause of the pardon thereof, which is the act of God's free grace in Christ, yet it is of such necessity to all sinners, that none may expect pardon without it." In other words, repentance is not the means of our salvation. We are not saved because we repent. Salvation is the free gift of God's grace. All... "are justified by His grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus." (Romans 3:24) But repentance is the fruit of or a sign of the fact that God's Spirit is at work within us and that we have become new creatures in Christ Jesus. The Westminster Confession can speak of the necessity of repentance, because indeed Jesus says that unless we repent we will perish. Luke 13:3 says, "unless you repent, you will all likewise perish."

I also really like what paragraph IV says, "As there is no sin so small, but it deserves damnation; so there is no sin so great, that it can bring damnation upon those who truly repent." The first part may seem harsh, but the reality is, we know that we have all sinned and fallen short of the glory of God and that what we deserve for our sin is death. However, the second part is glorious, there is no sin, no matter

how great, that cannot be forgiven by God if we sincerely repent. "Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts; let him return to the LORD, that He may have compassion on him, and to our God, for He will abundantly pardon." (Isaiah 55:7) "There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus." (Romans 8:1).

Matthew describes the preaching of John the Baptist in this way, "In those days John the Baptist came preaching in the wilderness of Judea, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.'" (Matthew 3:1) Notice that Matthew describes the preaching of Jesus in the exact same way, "From that time Jesus began to preach, saying, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." (Matthew 3:17)

The proclamation of the church still needs to include a call for people to repent. As Lent comes to an end, let us learn to hate sin and to love the holiness that God alone can give. As we approach Holy Week let us remember that Christ died to pay the debt we owed and that in His Resurrection He defeated death and has assured us of our future resurrection.


Ancient Guidance on Prayer

Matt was born in Amsterdam, NY, one of six boys. As a child he also lived in Connecticut and Ashaway, Rhode Island, where he graduated from high school. He went on to Northeast School of Broadcasting in Boston. After graduating, he worked in radio and T.V. as an announcer, newscaster, doing commercials, etc. He worked for stations in RI, Cumberland, Maryland, Keyser, West Virginia and Ft. Lauderdale, Florida. When the Ft. Lauderdale station closed down, he worked as a police dispatcher. He also was a D. J. at an 'oldies' bar there in Florida.

Through a Florida friend here in Oklahoma, he was offered his current job as Director of Public Safety Communications for Edmond, OK. He and his family relocated to Edmond in 2006 to take on this position. He oversees the 911 call center and emergency management for Edmond. He feels God made a clear path for him to make a difference in the lives of others through his work.

Great Is Thy Faithfulness It is #139 in our hymnal

Typically sung during Holy Week, "Great Is Thy Faithfulness" is a hymn based in the realization that God is at work in our lives daily. Thomas O. Chisholm, author of "Great Is Thy Faithfulness," had the following to say, "My income has not been large at any time due to impaired health in the earlier years which has followed me on until now. Although I must not fail to record here the unfailing faithfulness of a covenant-keeping God and that He has given me many wonderful displays of His providing care, for which I am filled with astonishing gratefulness." Through reflection on the text of this hymn, we are reminded that God's work is not only done in miraculous or glorious ways, but in everyday, simple ways. We recall that Jesus never failed us in the past, and therefore have no reason to doubt his faithfulness in the future.

The text was written by Thomas O. Chisholm. Born in Kentucky in 1866, Chisholm was a school teacher and newspaper editor. He converted to Christianity at the age of 26, and was made business manager and office editor of the Pentecostal Herald in Louisville, Kentucky. He entered the seminary of the M. E. Church South in 1903. His pastoral career lasted only one year as a Methodist Minister before having to resign due to poor health. In 1909 he became a life insurance agent. He took it as his personal mission to incorporate as much scripture as possible in writings, taking care to avoid flippant or sentimental themes. He retired to the Methodist Home for the Aged in New Jersey, where he passed away in 1960. He is credited with writing over 1,200 sacred poems during his life.

The composer of "Great Is Thy Faithfulness" is William Marion Runyan. Runyan was born in 1870 in Marion, New York, to Methodist Minister William White Runyan. The family moved to Marion, Kansas in Runyan's childhood, where he became a church organist. He became a Methodist Minister at the age of 21, and serve several congregations throughout Kansas. From 1895-1898,

he attended Northwestern University near Chicago. He began composing gospel songs in 1915 at the suggestion of D.B. Towner of the Moody Bible Institute. From 1924-1926 Runyan worked at John Brown University in Arkansas, where he pastored the Federated Church, and edited the Christian Workers' Magazine. He then moved back to Chicago to work at the Moody Bible Institute where he worked as editor for Hope Publishing Company, co-editing "The Service Hymnal" with Gordon Shorney. He retired to Galveston, Texas and passed away in 1957 in Pittsburg, Kansas. He was on faculty at four universities and wrote a large number of hymns. His family was able to establish a scholarship solely on the royalties from "How Great Is Thy Faithfulness."
