Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Chapter XIX of the Westminster Confession of Faith is entitled "Of the Law of God." Often when we read Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy we are confused by all the laws that God gave to His people through His servant Moses on Mt. Sinai. The question is always raised, should all of these laws continue to be kept? And if not, which ones should be and which ones not. To teach that because we are saved by grace and not by works these laws do not apply to us, would be to deny the clear teaching of the New Testament that there is a clear moral standard by which Christians should live their lives.

The Westminster Confession classifies the Old Testament laws into three different categories: ceremonial laws, judicial laws, and moral laws. As we shall see, the first two (ceremonial and judicial laws) no longer apply to us, but the third group, the moral laws, do.

With regard to the ceremonial laws the Confession says, "God was pleased to give to the people of Israel, as a church under age, ceremonial laws, containing several typical ordinances, partly of worship, prefiguring Christ, His grace, actions, sufferings, and benefits; and partly, holding forth divers instructions of moral duties. All which ceremonial laws are now abrogated, under the New Testament." Colossians 2:16-17 says, "Therefore let no one pass judgment on you in questions of food and drink, or with regard to a festival or a new moon or a Sabbath. These are a shadow of the things to come, but the substance belongs to Christ." We

know that because of Christ's sacrifice on the cross animal sacrifices are no longer needed. In fact, to offer any other sacrifice for our sins would be to deny the efficacy of Christ's sacrifice. Under the heading of ceremonial laws would also include circumcision and laws regarding clean and unclean animals.

Of the judicial laws, the Confession says, "He gave sundry judicial laws, which expired together with the State of that people; not obliging under any now, further than the general equity thereof may require." To seek to set up a theocracy based on the judicial laws of the Old Testament would not be wise. However, our law makers and judges could learn much from studying the judicial laws prescribed by God for His people. As I have read these judicial laws through the years they have always greatly impressed me.

With regard to the moral law, the Confession says, "The moral law does forever bind all, as well justified persons as others, to the obedience thereof; and that, not only in regard to the matter contained in it, but also in respect of the authority of God the Creator who gave it. Neither does Christ, in the Gospel, any way dissolve, but much strengthens this obligation." In other words, the moral laws of the Old Testament are still things we should follow. Jesus said, "Do not think that I have come to abolish the Law and the Prophets; I have not come to abolish them but to fulfill them. For truly, I say to you, until heaven and earth pass away, not an iota, not a dot, will pass from the Law until all is accomplished" (Mathew 5:17-18). What always needs to be made clear is that we are not justified or condemned by keeping or not keeping the moral law. We are justified by faith. The Confession stresses this as well. "Although true believers are not under the law, as a covenant of works, to be thereby justified, or condemned; yet is it of great use to them, as well as to others; in that, as a rule of life informing them of the will of God, and their duty, it directs and binds them to walk accordingly." So though we are not saved by keeping the law, the moral law does instruct us in terms of what is right and wrong and how we should live our lives. Jesus said, "Whoever has my commandments and keeps them, he it is who loves me" (John 14:21)

Paul says in 2 Corinthians 5:8-9, "Yes, we are of good courage, and we would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord. So whether we are at home or away, we make it our aim to please Him." This also should be our aim. Do you want to know what is pleasing to God? A good place to begin is in the keeping of the moral law.

Lora was born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. As a child she lived in the Dallas area, Bluffton, Limo and Cincinnati, Ohio, and Marion, Indiana where she graduated high school. She has also lived in Germany, and Lawton and Grandfield, Oklahoma in Tillman County. At age 12 she and her sister spent time in the Netherlands with her father's Dutch family. She now resides in Edmond (since 2006).

Lora was married for 21 years before divorcing her husband. She has a son, Marcos, and daughter-inlaw, Christina, in Tampa, Florida. A daughter, Kayla, and son-in-law, Rusty, live here in Oklahoma City. They are the parents of a precious 18-monthold granddaughter, Emma.

Lora's mother lives in Idaho along with her brother, Steven. She also has a sister, Patty, in Florida, and many nieces and nephews.

After graduating high school at only 17, Lora joined the Army. She served three years, spending 18 months in Germany, and then being stationed at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. After being discharged she remained in the Lawton area, working several jobs, including for two defense contractors.

While raising two children, Lora attended Cameron College in Lawton, receiving a bachelor's degree in Engineering Design Technology in 1996, and a master's degree in Behavior Science, completed in 2002. Her master's thesis "Calvinist Political Theory" was published. This book is still available on Amazon, and a copy is in the library at Princeton University. Having her own literature published was a longtime dream!

In 2006 Lora relocated to the Oklahoma City area to begin her current job as a Transportation Specialist for the Oklahoma State Department of Transportation. She also taught "night school" classes in Technology and Ethics from 2007-2016 at I.T.T. College here in Oklahoma City.

Lora once served as county chairman of the Republican Party of Tillman County, Oklahoma. She was once asked to run for the state house of representatives.

Lora enjoys reading, bike riding, playing piano, and painting with acrylics. Her own version of the Garden of Eden on canvas is on display in her home in Edmond.

She is a fan of classic rock music (The Eagles, Billy Joel, etc.). Her father was related to a cousin by marriage to the rock group Van Halen.

Lora came to St. Stephen's with a friend in 2009, after an unhappy experience at another church. She taught Sunday school for several years. Pastor Mark's sermons are especially important to her and she values the friendly members of our St. Stephen's family.

Lora's favorite Bible verse is Philippians 4:8, "Finally beloved whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things."

I Am His and He Is Mine It is #748 in our hymnal

The text for "I Am His and He Is Mine" was written in 1876 by George Wade Robinson, with the music being added to it in 1890. The text communicates a love and knowing of the Lord while speaking of Heaven. Robinson talks about this full and perfect peace which he obviously received from the Lord. The text is full of imagery, specifically in verse two which shares what a believer can see that Christ-less eyes can never experience, and in verse three where the image of a child of God is sheltered in the arms of the Father while the wild alarms of life are around. The words of the fourth verse are even more powerful when one realizes that the author was ill and just a year away from death but realizing that nothing could part him from the Lord.

George Robinson was born in Cork, Ireland in 1838. Very little is known about him. Records do indicate that he studied at Dublin's Trinity College and later at New College in London. In Dudley, UK he became a Pastor at St. John's Wood. He later had to resign this duty due to a mysterious illness that eventually led to his death in 1877. He contributed five hymns to J. Leifchild's Original Hymns (1842) and published two volumes of poetry; Songs in God's World and Loveland. His hymn, "Strangers and Pilgrims Here Below" (Jesus Only), from his God's World. Songs in is in Horder's Congregational Hymns, 1884, in an abridged form; and "Weary with My Load of Sin" (Contrition), is in the 1874 Supplement "When to the New Congregational Hymn Book - Exiled Seer were Given" (New Jerusalem).

The "WOW" Factor

After the final notes concluded at a recent symphony performance in Boston, the conductor hadn't yet lowered his baton when a child exclaimed, "Wow!" The break in protocol, magnified by excellent acoustics, didn't upset the participants or audience, however. Instead, several later said it brought them great joy. One even called the moment lifechanging.

The incident was especially meaningful because the child, a nine-year-old named Ronan, has autism and is generally nonverbal. Music, his family says, tends to attract his interest and make him happy. When symphony officials learned Ronan's identity, they arranged a private performance so he could meet some musicians.

How often do you shout "Wow!" — in a good way — at what you see and hear? You may tend to do so on vacation or while observing God's natural wonders, but what about during your day-to-day life? Think about the people you encounter and their talents — and your own. When have these sparked a "Wow!" of thanks to God?

Every blessing, large or small, is a wow-moment — a gift from God that warrants our praise.
