Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

The title of Chapter VI of the Westminster Confession of Faith is "Of the Fall of Man, of Sin, and the Punishment thereof." The chapter begins with these words, "Our first parents, being seduced by the subtlety and temptations of Satan, sinned, in eating the forbidden fruit. This sin, God was pleased, according to His wise and holy counsel, to permit, having purposed to order it to His own glory." Most of us are familiar with the sin of Adam and Eve in Genesis 3 that resulted in the Fall. There are a few things of note in these first two sentences of Chapter VI. One is that God permitted the fall according to His wise and holy counsel; the other is that God purposed to order it to His own glory. We could spend a lot of time discussing how the Fall could possibly bring glory to God. Here are a few ways. First, God is glorified by the salvation He has provided for those whom He has called. Second, God is glorified as a result of the mercy and grace He has shown to those who have been saved. God is also glorified by those who have been called out of darkness into His marvelous light.

The Confession goes on to discuss the effects of the fall on humankind. Too often we lose sight of the extent of the effects of the Fall upon us. Consider what we lost: righteousness and communion with God. As a result we also became dead in sin and completely defiled. The Reformed faith speaks of total depravity. The apostle Paul in Ephesians 2 says, "And you were dead in the trespasses and sins in which you once walked..." The emphasis here is on "dead". As a result of the Fall we are spiritually

dead and totally helpless when it comes to doing anything towards our own salvation. Romans 3:10-18 also stresses the sinfulness of humans. It begins. "There is none righteous, no, not one."

It is from this original corruption of our nature that all of our sins proceed. I am indebted to Martin Lloyd-Jones for recently reminding me that Sin is the disease of which sins are the symptoms. We sin because we are sinners.

The Confession makes another good point when it states that even after we become new creatures in Christ Jesus this corruption of nature remains in us during this life. The good news for those who God has made alive with Christ is that we have been pardoned and we have received the Holy Spirit which is doing a sanctifying work in our lives. John says, "If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us." (1 John 1:8) Paul in Romans 7 discusses the struggle the Christian continues to have with sin in this life.

We come now to the last part of the title of Chapter VI, "and the Punishment thereof." Because God is holy, righteous and just, there has to be a penalty for sin and for the transgression of God's law. All have sinned and are therefore guilty before God and subject to His judgment. Scripture tells us that "the wages of sin is death." Paul says that before God made us alive together with Christ we "were by nature children of wrath, like the rest of mankind." That is, children who are subject to the wrath of God. But the good news is that we have been saved by grace so that we are no longer children of wrath but children of God.

There are a number of questions and answers in the Shorter Catechism that deal with this whole topic. Let me just mention a few. Q. & A. 14. "What is sin?" "Sin is any want of conformity unto, or transgression of, the law of God." Q. & A. 19. "What is the misery of the estate whereinto man fell?" "All mankind by their fall lost communion with God, are under His wrath and curse, and so made liable to all the miseries of this life, to death itself, and to the pains of hell forever."

This is a terrible place to leave ourselves. Question #20 asks the question, "Did God leave all mankind to perish in the estate of sin and misery?" The short answer to that question is a resounding, "No!" Which will lead us into the topic for next month, Westminster Confession, Chapter VII: "Of God's Covenant with Man."

Kaleb was born in OKC, grew up in Norman and is a graduate of Norman High. He attended the University of North Texas in Denton and studied abroad in Hungary. After

graduation with a music education degree, he returned home and in May 2018 received a master's degree in conducting from OKC University.

He currently resides in NW OKC, working as our choir director. He is also music director of the Sooner Sinfonia Orchestra, assistant conductor of the Enid Symphony, and director of the concert band at the University of Science and Arts of Oklahoma in Chickasha. An accomplished musician himself, he continues trumpet performances, rehearsing currently for the Haydn Festival at Casady School. In spite of being discouraged by High School music teachers, he is especially proud of his successes as a conductor. (Boy, were they wrong!)

Immediate family includes: both parents who work for Norman Public Schools, a younger brother Kelby who is pursuing an EMT career, and a little Dachshund named "Lenny' (after Leonard Bernstein). He and his fiancé, Ashley, are planning to marry in the Fall of 2020.

Kaleb and Ashley are Dallas Stars hockey fans and Kaleb still cheers for the North Texas' football team, as a former member of the marching band.

Favorite leisure activities include: cooking, movie nights with Ashley, and watching reruns of "The Office." He is also learning Tai Chi.

Shine, Jesus, Shine, #431 in our hymnal This is a church member-requested hymn.

Born in 1950, composer Graham Kendrick is a British singer, songwriter, and worship leader from Laindon, Essex. He is the son of M.D. Kendrick, a Baptist pastor, and resides in Tunbridge Wells, England where he is a member of Holy Trinity with Christ Church, and the Ichthus Christian Fellowship, a neocharismatic Christian Church movement and Apostolic network based in London. Kendrick began writing songs in 1960. Most of his songs are popular in Great Britain. In 1983 he founded the March for Jesus movement with Roger Forster, Gerald Coates, and Lynn Green. In 1995, he received a Dove Award for his international work. He worked for "In the Name of Jesus" as a member of the mission team. In 2000 and 2008, he was awarded honorary doctorate of divinity degrees from the London School of Theology and Wycliffe College in Toronto, Canada.

"Shine, Jesus, Shine" was composed in 1987 and is Graham Kendrick's most famous composition to date. It regularly achieves high marks on hymn popularity polls. A former bandmember and songwriter, Stuart Townsend, said about the popularity of "Shine, Jesus, Shine" and Kendrick, "I have no doubt that in 100 years the name of Kendrick will be alongside Watts and Wesley in the list of the UK's greatest hymn writers." The hymn was voted 10th in a UK 2005 survey of favorite hymns by the BBC. However, it has also been described as "the most loathed of the happy-clappy hymns." It was performed by the Department of Social Welfare and Development staff and students from the Mary Immaculate Parish Special School at Villamor Air Base at the departure of Pope Francis from his tour of the Philippines.
