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Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

As we go through the liturgical year, the colors of the paraments that hang on the pulpit and are laid on the communion table change. How different groups define the meaning of the various colors is not always consistent. In one of the searches I did the meaning of the colors were given as follows. Purple is associated with repentance from sin and the sovereignty of Christ. This is the color used during the seasons of Advent and Lent. White represents purity, joy and the brightness of day. White is the color used between Christmas and Epiphany and between Easter and Pentecost. Green symbolizes growth and life. This color is used from Epiphany to Lent and from Pentecost to Advent. The time of year in which the color green is used is often referred to as ordinary time. You will notice in our bulletin we do not refer to the nth Sunday of Ordinary Time but rather to the nth Sunday after Pentecost.

As we go through the church year we normally think of the seasons of purple as times of preparation and self-examination, the seasons of white as times of celebration, and the seasons of green as times of growth.

Growth, that is spiritual growth, is an important part of the Christian life. There are parallels between physical growth and spiritual growth. When a baby is born we understand that there are certain things that a baby needs to progress from infancy to childhood, to adolescence, and ultimately to full adulthood. These things include a healthy diet, exercise, and a proper amount of rest. We know

that there are also environmental and social factors including love and affection that are also important to physical development.

In the same way there are important factors in our spiritual growth. We begin as spiritual infants at the time of our new birth. In John 3 Jesus speaks of the need to be "born again" and of being "born of the Spirit." Ephesians 2 speaks of the fact that we were once dead in our trespasses but now we have been "made alive together with Christ." Having been born again or born of the Spirit, the goal is now to grow spiritually until we reach full spiritual maturity. Romans 8:29 says that God predestined us to be conformed to the image of His Son. The goal of our spiritual growth is to become more and more like Jesus. Our understanding is that we will never reach this full maturity, this full Christ likeness, in this life, but this is the direction we want to be moving.

In order to mature spiritually there are certain things we need. In 1 Peter 2:2 we read, "Like newborn infants, long for the pure spiritual milk, that by it you may grow up into salvation." What is the pure spiritual milk that Peter is referring to? It is likely a reference to God's Word. In Hebrews 5 the writer of Hebrews seems a bit frustrated by the lack of spiritual growth among his readers. In Hebrews 5:12 he writes, "For though by this time you ought to be teachers, you need someone to teach you again the basic principles of the oracles of God. You need milk, not solid food." Here milk appears to be the basic teachings of the Christian faith. God's word is a key element in what is needed for Christians to

grow spiritually. It is like the healthy diet a child needs to mature physically.

There are additional things we need to aid our spiritual growth including prayer, worship, and fellowship with other believers. We do not want to be stuck in spiritual infancy as the believers in Corinth apparently were when Paul wrote, "I fed you with milk, not solid food, for you were not ready for it" (1 Corinthians 3:2). As we enter the sanctuary during "ordinary time" and see the green paraments on the pulpit and Lord's Table, may they remind us that we have new life in Christ and that we need to continue to grow in our Christian faith.

Meet Our St. Stephen's Family Dennis Bryley

Dennis was born in Memphis, Texas. His mother Severa unfortunately died when he was only four years old. He never knew his father.

Dennis has seven sisters. Four sisters live in Oklahoma: Jean, Elizabeth and Alberta in OKC and Ollie Mae in Norman. When Dennis was only six years old, he and Alberta were sent to live with Aunt Birdie and Uncle L.C. in Los Angeles, CA. Alberta soon moved out on her own leaving Dennis alone in a strange new city. It was a difficult adjustment for a young boy. He endured bullying in school and frequent nightmares. However, Aunt Birdie and Uncle L.C. made good "parents". Aunt Birdie taught Dennis to cook and Uncle L.C. taught him how to work on cars and develop mechanical skills.

After many years of the single life, Dennis married our own Linda Merriweather on May 20, 2023. Pastor Mark presided over the ceremony. They met through Dennis's niece, Lisa, who knew Linda while serving as a police officer at the school where Linda was a teacher.

Dennis has a son, Dennis Junior, in Anaheim, California. He and Linda are planning a trip this summer so that Linda can meet him, and while in CA also visit with Linda's son.

Dennis recently found out about the identity of his birth father. He was a highly respected land owner, who managed his own auto shop. He was known in the town of Memphis to be an amiable "storyteller". Dennis believes he has inherited some of his father's traits. Once during a visit to a local café in Memphis, people thought that Dennis bore a remarkable resemblance to a "Mr. Wheeler", well-loved and known in their town. Dennis discovered later that "Mr. Wheeler" was indeed his real father.

Dennis graduated from George Washington High School in Los Angeles. He went on to study nursing and became a medical assistant and a certified nurse assistant. He worked in the medical field for 25 years: in the E. R., medical surgical patient care floors of a hospital, in a nursing home and with patient transport. Most recently before relocating to OKC, Dennis worked as a supervisor for a company called "Urban Alchemy" a social enterprise working with the homeless on the streets of Los Angeles. His responsibility was to send daily claim reports to the L.A. mayor's office. He visited homeless sites helping with the needs of the homeless, directing them to resources. He had to utilize his medical training, delivering emergency treatment to drug victims, even performing CPR on at least five persons. One of his rescues was later able to rehabilitate and go on to work for Dennis. The demands of this job were emotionally draining and living in L.A. was becoming increasingly stressful and even dangerous. Because of his love for Linda, and a desire to be close to his sisters and their families, Dennis relocated to OKC on December 4, 2022. He finds life here much "happier and so much more peaceful". Using the mechanical skills Uncle L.C. taught him, Dennis now works for H.T.C. Drivetrain, rebuilding motors and transmissions for car dealers. He believes God had directed his steps, and he tries to offer Christin support and guidance to fellow workers.

Dennis is a former bachelor turned "dream husband." Growing up in Aunt Birdie's kitchen, he learned to cook and clean, and now prepares most of the meals and cleans house for him and Linda.

The couple love road trips and watching mysteries on T. V. especially "Brit Box" and Father Brown mysteries. Dennis is a Thunder fan, follows the L.A. Rams in football and the Dodgers in baseball.

Dennis's favorite Bible verse is John 3:16: "For God so loved the world that He gave His only son, that

whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life."

When asked about heroes in his life, Dennis says: "Linda is my hero! She has changed my life and made me a better man." He also considers Aunt Birdie and Uncle L.C. heroes, for they raised him as their own.

As a school boy Dennis attended the Village Baptist Church in Los Angeles. However, for over 30 years Dennis did not attend church at all. Our own Linda brought him to us here at St. Stephen's when he first moved to OKC. He said for the first time in his life when he heard Pastor Mark preach, he felt the "Holy Spirit." He says he feels he has "missed out" on so much and is seeking to learn and grow as a Christian. Dennis says he loves our "St. Stephen's family" and "all the good here all through the church." He is currently serving as a Deacon, is active in Sunday school and the men's prayer breakfast (he serves as the substitute cook). Dennis says he has searched for years for happiness and fulfillment, and he has found it in his new life with Linda, and his newly found faith. He believes he is now a different person, and that it is all part of God's plan for his life.

Dennis's story is one of double blessings. He is a blessing to St. Stephen's Church, and his church is a blessing to his life. God sends people to make a positive difference in His church. Dennis is one of those people. He brings to our St. Stephen's family encouragement, service, Christian example, love and a spirit of unity.

To quote A. W. Tozer: "Unity is necessary among the children of God if we are going to know the flow of power to see God do His wonders."
