Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Last month we began a look at the Westminster Confession of Faith with a discussion of Chapter I, "Of the Holy Scripture." Chapter II is "Of God, and of the Holy Trinity." This is a broad subject, but the Confession treats it rather briefly. In presenting the topic of God it lists many of God's attributes without giving commentary on any one of them. And in discussing the Trinity the Confession does not try to prove or explain it but rather makes a statement about who the Trinity is.

The Confession states that "There is but one only, living, and true God...a most pure spirit, invisible, without body." These are the basic things we believe about God. Rather than making a list of all the attributes of God mentioned in the Confession, I will highlight a few that have always made a profound impression on me.

God is immutable. God speaking through Malachi in Malachi 3:6 says, "For I the LORD do not change." James 1:17 says, "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change." This is good for us to remember. Even in our day there are those who wrongfully teach that God does change, that God has and continues to evolve. We believe that "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever." (Hebrews 13:8)

God is incomprehensible. "Great is the LORD, and greatly to be praised, and His greatness is unsearchable." (Psalm 145:3) Isaiah 55:8 says, "For My thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your

ways My ways, declares the LORD. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are My ways higher than your ways and My thoughts than your thoughts." Our finite minds cannot comprehend our infinite and eternal God.

God is almighty. Nothing is impossible for God. God is again and again spoken of in scripture as the Almighty. In Revelation the four living creatures who are before the throne of God never cease to say, "Holy, holy, holy, is the Lord God Almighty." (Revelation 4:8)

God is most holy. The four living creatures before the throne of God have already made this clear. The seraphim in Isaiah 6:3 declare to us the same thing: "Holy, holy, holy, is the LORD of hosts; the whole earth is full of His glory!" In a world where people only want to hear that God is love we best not forget that God is also holy. If you want to read a good book on the subject, I recommend *The Holiness of God* by R.C. Sproul.

The Confession strings together a list of God's attributes that bring us great comfort and which we all love to hear. God is "most loving, gracious, merciful, long-suffering, abundant in goodness and truth, forgiving iniquity, transgression, and sin." But it also reminds us that God is "most just, and terrible in His judgments, hating all sin, and who will by no means clear the guilty." Both aspects of God are important for us to know if we are to have a better understanding of God and of His amazing grace.

We should rejoice in the fact that God is just and that He hates sins. How wonderful it is that He has

made a provision for our sins so that they can be forgiven and our guilt covered.

The Confession goes on to remind us that all life, goodness and blessedness come from God alone, that He knows all, and that worship, service and obedience are due Him from angels, humans and every other creature.

"Of the Holy Trinity" the Confession states: "In the unity of the Godhead there be three persons, of one substance, power, and eternity: God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Ghost: the Father is of none, neither begotten, nor proceeding; the Son is eternally begotten of the Father; the Holy Ghost eternally proceeding from the Father and the Son." Attempts to explain the Trinity always fall short. One of the important things for our understanding is that the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit are a unity that have always co-existed. The Son was not created, as some falsely teach, but has always existed.

God is incomprehensible and yet He desires and has made a way for us to have a relationship with Him. We can draw near to Him and He promises to reward those who seek Him. "And without faith it is impossible to please Him, for whoever would draw near to God must believe that He exists and that He rewards those who seek Him." (Hebrews 11:6) Yours in Christ, *Pastor Mark*



O Sacred Head, Now Wounded #316 in our hymnal

This month, Lent will begin. During this time of prayer and penance we reflect upon the life of Jesus, and look to Easter Sunday and His resurrection. To me, Lent is a very solemn time. Personally, I tend to pick music on the less virtuosic, showy side. Simple, less ornate music helps me to convey the mood and meaning of this time. This, in turn, makes the more celebratory, grandiose music of Easter seem all the more joyful and exuberant. Therefore, I felt as though *O Sacred Head, Now Wounded* was an appropriate selection as our March Hymn of the Month.

Originally sung on Good Friday, O Sacred Head depicts all of Christ's suffering. The text of the hymn dates back to the twelfth or thirteenth centuries. The original author of the text is disputed, but it is often credited to Bernard of Clairvaux, a French abbot and saint. In certain medieval orders. monks would spend hours meditating upon the crucifix. They would mentally divide the body of Christ into parts and meditate on each part respectively. Bernard wrote the text as a seven-part prayer to the suffering of Christ's body on the cross. In the 1600s it was translated into German by Paul Gerhardt, and into English from the German by James Waddell Alexander in the nineteenth century. Alexander's translation has undergone many alterations over the years, so it is nearly impossible to find any two modern hymnal versions in agreement about the text as a whole. The three verses shown in the hymnal are the most common, though some hymnals include a fourth verse.

The hymn is set to the tune of the *Passion Chorale*. This tune started as a secular love song known as *Confused Are All My Feelings, A Tender Maid's The Cause.*" Like many older popular secular tunes, sacred text was set to the popular tunes to make them easily memorable in a time when printing was still in its infancy. It was later set to a funeral text before finally appearing in a harmonized setting in J.S. Bach's St. Matthew *Passion.* The tune and text were first set together in 1656.

O Sacred Head has enjoyed great popularity since its composition; the hymn appears in all modern hymnals, in many languages and translations, and with various numbers of stanzas.


Just as Bernard would meditate on the crucifix, so too does this hymn call us to remember the wounded and broken body of Christ. Deeply devotional, the text makes a very personal application of Christ's atoning death and confesses our gratitude and commitment to Christ as he suffered for us.
