Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Chapter X of the Westminster Confession of Faith is entitled "Of Effectual Calling." Jesus in Matthew 22:14 says, "For many are called, but few are chosen." The idea is that through the ministry (proclamation) of the Word (scripture), many people are called, but not everyone who is called accepts Christ and comes to salvation. Effectual calling would mean that from among all who are called there are some in whom the calling is effectual, that is, has the desired effect of resulting in salvation.

Chapter X thus begins, "All those whom God hath predestinated unto life, and those only, He is pleased, in His appointed time, effectually to call, by His Word and Spirit, out of that state of sin and death, in which they are by nature to grace and salvation, by Jesus Christ." Paul presents a very similar idea in Romans 8:30 where he writes, "And those whom He predestined He also called, and those whom He called He also justified, and those whom He justified He also glorified." In 2 Thessalonians 2:13-14 he says, "But we ought always to give thanks to God for you, brothers beloved by the Lord, because God chose you as the first fruits to be saved, through sanctification by the Spirit and belief in the truth. To this He called you through our gospel, so that you may obtain the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ."

The Confession goes on to stress that this effectual call is of God's free and special grace alone. It is nothing that we do. It is because of the Holy Spirit working in us that we are enabled to answer this call and to embrace the grace offered

and conveyed in it. Scripture tells us that it is God, "who saved us and called us to a holy calling, not because of our words but because of His own purpose and grace, which He gave us in Christ Jesus before the ages began..." (2 Timothy 1:9) There are a number of scripture passages that talk about the fact that the natural (unspiritual) person cannot receive the things of the Spirit of God. In order for us to receive the things of the Spirit, the Holy Spirit has to first be working within us. Those who are dead ("in sins") cannot respond to the calling of God unless through God's grace they are first made alive in Christ.

One other interesting point about this chapter has to do with infants and those who are "incapable of being outwardly called by the ministry of the Word." The Confession states that, "elect infants, dying in infancy are regenerated, and saved by Christ, through the Spirit..." The scripture references cited would not be unique for these two groups but would include all who have been born of the Spirit. The question that could be raised would be "what about non-elect infants?" Charles Hodge, one of the great Reformed theologians of the late 19th century, held that all who died in infancy would be saved. The fact that the destiny of infants is included in the Confession is likely a response to the Roman Catholic doctrine of Limbus Infantum, which is the supposed abode of all unbaptized children. According to Louis Berkhof the Roman Catholic understanding is that unbaptized infants remain in Limbus Infantum "without any hope of deliverance, suffering no positive punishment indeed, but excluded from the blessings of heaven." This is not the Reformed or Protestant understanding of the destiny of those who die in infancy. Most would hold to Hodge's view.

The shorter catechism summarizes the idea of effectual calling in question and answer 31. "What is effectual calling?" "Effectual calling is the work of God's Spirit, whereby, convincing us of our sin and misery, enlightening our minds in the knowledge of Christ, and renewing our wills, he doth persuade and enable us to embrace Jesus Christ, freely offered to us in the gospel." One may ask, "How do I know whether I have been effectually called?" I think the answer to that question is fairly easy. Anyone who has embraced Jesus Christ as their savior has been effectually called.

O Word of God Incarnate It is #414 in our hymnal

The prominent theme throughout "O Word of God Incarnate" is one of Light. God and His word is our light, and in turn, as the church we should be a light to all nations and people. When the hymn was originally published for the first time, it bore a subtitle of the quotation "For the commandment is the lamp: and the law is the light; and reproofs of instruction are the way of life." Some hymnals, including our own, share the belief that the hymn is based on Psalm 119 which shares a similar theme of light; "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light for my path." The text was first published in 1867 in an addition to the 1854 Psalms and Hymns. The author of the text is William W. How. The tune, MUNICH, originates from 1593 in Dresden, Germany, and is likely named after the German town of the same name (though spelled München in composer German). Romantic era Mendelssohn adapted the tune for use in his No. 15 Quartet "Cast Thy Burden Upon the Lord" in his sacred oratorio Elijah. This adaptation is the most common tune used for the hymn. In 2015 the Gospel Coalition ranked "O Word of God Incarnate" as "One of the hymns we should sing more often."

William W. How was born in 1823 in Shropshire, England and died in 1897 in Ireland. He studied at Wadham College, Durham University, and most notably, Oxford University. He was ordained into the Church of England in 1847. From 1847 to 1879 he served various congregations before becoming Suffragan Bishop in east London, and later in 1888 Bishop of Wakefield. How's nicknames included both "the poor man's bishop" and "the children's bishop" due to his work in the slums of London and with the factory workers in west Yorkshire. He wrote a number of books about the Oxford Movement, and attempted to reconcile biblical creationism with the theory of evolution. How was the joint editor of both Psalms and Hymns and Church Hymns. He is credited with writing at least 60 hymns, including many for children.

German composer Felix Mendelssohn lived from 1809-1847. He was the son of a banker and the of philosopher grandson famed Moses Mendelssohn. His Jewish family converted to Christianity in the Lutheran denomination. Mendelssohn gave his first public performance at the age of 9, and by 16 had already composed symphonies. Mendelssohn is credited with the Bach revival, bringing the music of long-forgotten Bach back into popularity. At the age of 20 he conducted a performance of Bach's St. Matthew's Passion to great acclaim. In 1843 he founded the Leipzig Conservatory of Music. He traveled widely, notably to Scotland and Italy. His oeuvre includes organ works, symphonies, overtures, and sacred works of oratorios and hymn harmonizations (and his fifth symphony titled "Reformation" which the hymn "A Mighty Fortress is Our God" is used as the melody for the last movement).

#### MAJOR MAINTENANCE FUND

St. Stephen's is very blessed that our church building was fully paid for over 15 years ago. However, our building is aging and with that comes occasional and unexpected major maintenance issues.

For those of you who are not aware, we have had to replace 4 A/C units over the past few months at a total cost of \$27,000. We do have designated funds budgeted every year for routine maintenance; however, this is for basic issues such as plumbing emergencies and lawn maintenance and is not intended to cover such major expenses.

The Session has determined that we need to develop a fund for major maintenance issues. Our goal is to raise \$50,000. We are asking that those members who can make additional gifts consider supporting this effort.
