Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In last month's Witness article we learned that God in His love, mercy and grace did not leave us to perish in the estate of sin and misery, but entered into a covenant of grace with us to deliver us from our sorry state by means of a Redeemer. Chapter 8 of the Westminster Confession is titled "Of Christ the Mediator." In my mind this title does not do the chapter justice. Chapter 8 discusses much more than merely Christ as mediator; it really takes a much broader look at Christ looking at who He is as fully God and fully man, His offices of prophet, priest and king, and the work that He has done.

1 Timothy 2:5-6 says, "For there is one God, and there is one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself as a ransom for all, which is the testimony given at the proper time." These passages clearly state that Christ Jesus is the mediator between God and people and that He is the only mediator. It also tells us what Christ has done for us. He gave Himself as a ransom for us. In other words, He bought us, and paid the price we should have paid for our sins, i.e. death. The Westminster Catechism uses the word Redeemer a lot. It is important for us to understand that in the Old Testament it was the redeemer or more specifically the kinsman-redeemer who paid the ransom price to buy someone out of slavery.

Question 21 of the catechism asks, "Who is the Redeemer of God's elect?" The answer is, "The only Redeemer of God's elect is the Lord Jesus Christ, who, being the eternal Son of God, became man, and so was, and continueth to be, God and man in two

distinct natures, and one person, forever." The themes of this answer are discussed in chapter 8 and are essential elements of the Christian faith. It deals with the two natures of Christ, His divinity and His humanity.

Our Lord Jesus Christ is God. This is a belief which only Christians hold. All other religions deny the deity of Christ and yet it is the clear teaching of scripture. John 1:1 says, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." In John 8:58 Jesus Himself makes this claim, "Jesus said to them, 'Truly, truly, I say to you, before Abraham was, I am.""

Regarding Jesus' humanity, no one will deny that Jesus was a man. How then do we understand that the eternal God became a man, as John 1:14 clearly claims, "And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us." This is often referred to as the incarnation and is an important part of both the Apostles' Creed and the Nicene Creed. Question 22 of the Westminster Confession asks, "How did Christ, being the Son of God, become man?" The answer is, "Christ, the Son of God, became man, by taking to himself a true body, and a reasonable soul, being conceived by the power of the Holy Ghost, in the womb of the Virgin Mary, and born of her, yet without sin." It is a story most of us are very familiar with and which we celebrate every year at Christmas.

Chapter 8 covers much more information about Christ and His work than we have time to discuss. but let me briefly point out how Christ fulfils what are known as the offices of prophet, priest and king.

He acts as a prophet in that He speaks to us on behalf of God. He reveals to us, by His Word and Spirit, God's will for us and the way of salvation. As priest He intercedes for us before God. In the Old Testament part of the function of a priest was to offer sacrifices to God to atone for the sins of the people. Christ did this not by offering the sacrifices of sheep and goats but by offering Himself as a sacrifice for our sins. All other sacrifices were imperfect, but Christ was the perfect sacrifice. Answer 26 of the Westminster Catechism gives a great summation of how Christ executes the office of King. "Christ executeth the office of a king, in subduing us to Himself, in ruling and defending us, and in restraining and conquering all His and our enemies."

In the fact that Christ is our mediator we indeed have much to be thankful for. There is only one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus, and because of Christ's mediation we have peace with God, our sins have been forgiven, and we have the hope of eternal life.

#### **August Session Minutes**

**Financial Report**: HVAC system operating in sanctuary with only 2 of 4 compressors: Estimate repair by Spencer to repair and replace 2 units: \$9,335; to replace entire units: \$16,475. Motion made and seconded to approve expenditure of \$9,335. Funds to come from Maintenance Reserve Fund. Termites found in NE corner of sanctuary. Presto Pest offered 2 options: 1) to treat just the area for \$600; 2) to treat the church for \$5,400; Motion made and seconded to opt for option 1 and investigate the issue of the whole church treatment plan. Though actually new business, discussion was had to investigate landscaping upgrade to north and east side of church.

Leaning on the Everlasting Arms
It is #575 in our hymnal.

The music for "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms" was composed by Anthony J. Showalter, and the text was written by Elisha (E.A.) Hoffman. The hymn was inspired directly from a scripture verse, Deuteronomy 33:27, which says "The eternal God is your refuge, and underneath are the everlasting arms." This verse was written by Showalter on two letters to two friends who had both lost their wives at the same time. As Showalter reflected upon this verse, he wrote the music and refrain for "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms." He then approached Hoffman and asked him to write the text for the stanzas. The hymn was first published in 1887 in The Glad Evangel for Revival, Camp, and Evangelistic Meetings, for which Showalter was an editor. This hymn is unique in that it can only be sung to one tune, which Showalter composed specifically for this hymn. (Often, hymns can be sung to a number of tunes; for example, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" can be sung to three different tunes: CORONATION, DIADEM, and MILES LANE.) The hymn is sung in unison text until the refrain at which point the tenor and bass voices repeat "Leaning on Jesus" during the soprano and alto lines' sustained notes. This hymn, appropriate for any liturgical season, speaks on assurance of knowing that God will protect us and, in knowing that, our fears should be removed. This hymn has been widely used in popular culture, having been included in many television and movie soundtracks including: House of Cards, The Simpsons, Law and Order: SVU, and True Grit (on which 25% of the orchestral score is based).

Anthony J. Showalter was an American gospel music composer, teacher and publisher. He was born in Cherry Grove, Virginia in 1858 and lived in Chattanooga, Tennessee until his death in 1924. Showalter was trained in the Ruebush-Kieffer School of Music and was teaching in shape notesinging schools by age fourteen. In 1884, he formed the Showalter Music Company of Dalton, Georgia.

He was also an elder of the First Presbyterian Church in Dalton. Showalter authored several rudimentary books on music theory and a book on harmony and song composition. These were widely used in singing schools across the South.

Elisha Hoffman was the son of an evangelical minister and lived from 1839-1929. He grew up singing sacred hymns and songs both in church and in the home with his parents. He graduated from Union Seminary in Pennsylvania and was ordained as a Presbyterian minister in 1868. As a minister, he was appointed to the circuit in Napoleon, Ohio in 1872. He worked with the Evangelical Association's publishing arm in Cleveland for eleven years. He served in many chapels and churches in Cleveland and in Grafton in the 1880s, among them Bethel Home for Sailors and Seamen, Chestnut Ridge Union Chapel, Grace Congregational Church and Rockport Congregational Church. In his lifetime he composed more than 2,000 hymns. He edited 50 song books including Pentecostal Hymns No. 1 and The Evergreen, 1873. About hymns, Hoffman said:

"a hymn is 'a lyric poem, reverently and devotionally conceived, which is designed to be sung and which expresses the worshipper's attitude toward God or God's purposes in human life. It should be simple and metrical in form, genuinely emotional, poetic and literary in style, spiritual in quality, and in its ideas so direct and so immediately apparent as to unify a congregation while singing it."


