
Ray Rogers



Ray Rogers is part of the new breed of Houston philanthropy. He doesn't fit the traditional image, but Hugh Roy Cullen would have liked him.

Rogers deals in neither land nor oil. He deals in music, at the Club Bojangles on a street corner in Old Market Square. His hair is long and I've never seen him in a suit or tie. He's a successful young businessman, but he doesn't look the part. He's much more at home behind a guitar than a desk. And like Cullen, he has a heart as big as the Texas myth.

For years Rogers has known Father McGinnis, a kind little priest who has no church or diocese. He finds his congregation in the streets, kids who are hooked on hard drugs and looking for help, kids who are trapped and seeking escape. For many, Father McGinnis is that escape. But the one thing he needs and doesn't have is money.

Enter Ray Rogers.

He told me, "When I first started performing, I used to sit around and pick

the guitar with Father McGinnis, just listen to him. I used to tell myself, if I ever make it big, I'm gonna help that man"

Rogers didn't forget his promise, even after touring the country with Liza Minnelli, performing on nationwide television, designing and opening his own club in Houston.

He donates the Bojangles, one of the most successful clubs in Houston, to stage benefits for the little priest. Other bands drop in to give of their talent, and the music winds down the night toward morning. And Father McGinnis can continue his work, because a downtown nightclub will stand with him, even when others won't.
