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POST LEADERSHIP INFORMATION SHEET

Here is a concise, powerful summary of the key responsibilities for each post-level officer in The American Legion, along with a reality check for those considering these leadership roles. These are not ceremonial titles—they are working roles that require dedication, follow-through, and a willingness to grow.

POST COMMANDER

The Commander is the chief executive of the Post, responsible for the overall direction, leadership, and coordination of all Post activities. They preside over meetings, supervise officers, approve disbursements, and ensure that programs are initiated and completed in alignment with Legion goals. The Commander establishes the tone for the year and bears the responsibility for the Post's success or failure. This role is for those prepared to lead from the front—don't take on this position unless you are ready to inspire others, make decisions, and accept the outcomes of your term.

FIRST VICE COMMANDER

This officer is the primary driver of membership and retention—without growth, the Post withers. The First Vice Commander partners with the Commander, steps in during absences, and is expected to understand ceremonial protocol and effectively run meetings when called upon. This role isn't merely a backup; it involves hands-on work that keeps the Legion alive and engaged.

SECOND VICE COMMANDER

Focused on morale and engagement, the Second Vice Commander creates a vibrant social calendar and ensures that patriotic observances and community presence remain strong. They strive to make meetings enjoyable and meaningful while boosting member participation. If you're not prepared to hustle behind the scenes and energize activities, this role might not be for you.

ADJUTANT

The Adjutant serves as the administrative backbone of the Post, managing records, correspondence, meeting minutes, and membership files. This role ensures continuity between commanders and demands meticulous attention to detail. It is a workload-heavy position that often feels thankless, yet it remains absolutely vital. If you merely wish to attend meetings, consider looking elsewhere; the Adjutant is essential for keeping the Post operational.

FINANCE OFFICER

Entrusted with the Post's funds, the Finance Officer oversees the budget, deposits, reporting, and disbursements. Accuracy and integrity are non-negotiable. This role is essential for sustaining the Post's operations, programs, and reputation. If you cannot be prompt, precise, and accountable—then do not consider this position.

CHAPLAIN

The Chaplain provides spiritual and moral leadership, often leading prayers, supporting grieving families, and guiding the Post through ceremonies and dedications. They ensure harmony and uphold the Legion's core values. This role demands compassion, presence, and deep respect for tradition. If you're uncomfortable serving others during their most vulnerable moments, reconsider.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS

Responsible for order, ceremony, and proper protocol, the Sergeant-at-Arms sets up meetings, leads the color guard, and ensures that flag etiquette is observed. They also assist in welcoming new members and maintaining decorum. This role is hands-on and physically engaged for someone who understands the significance of symbolism and tradition.

SERVICE OFFICER

The Post Service Officer serves as a vital resource for Veterans and their families, linking them to the benefits, support, and resources they have earned. This position is not merely honorary; it demands commitment, follow-through, and a solid understanding of VA systems and The American Legion's support network. If you cannot dedicate the time to be responsive, this role may not be suitable for you.

HISTORIAN

The Historian preserves the legacy of the Post by documenting achievements, events, and notable moments. This role ensures that future generations understand the Post's contributions and values. If you have a passion for storytelling and records management, this position will reward your efforts. But make no mistake—it's not merely scrapbooking. It's about safeguarding memory.

POST EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE (E-BOARD MEMBER)

Executive Committee members serve as the governing body between Post meetings and are collectively responsible for overseeing the management and direction of all Post affairs. Their core responsibilities include authorizing expenditures, reviewing financial practices, hiring necessary staff, hearing committee reports, and making key operational decisions. They act as stewards of the Post's well-being and future—not merely by casting votes, but by actively participating in planning, guidance, and accountability. This role is not for anyone seeking a passive seat at the table. If you aren't willing to show up regularly, challenge ideas constructively, and help make difficult decisions that impact your fellow Veterans and the community—don't volunteer. Executive Committee work requires a balance of leadership, responsibility, and a genuine commitment to the success of the Post.

These leadership roles drive *every* American Legion Post. They are not for show but for those prepared to step up, dig in, and serve purposefully. If you're merely seeking a title, keep walking. If you're ready to work—welcome aboard.
