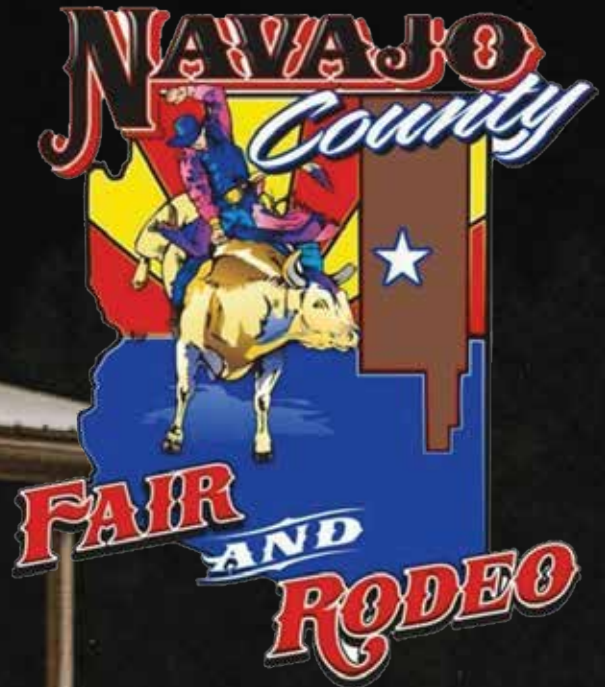

Navajo County Fair, Inc. will be celebrating the 94th anniversary of the Navajo County Fair & Rodeo September 10-13, 2025. The first Navajo County Fair was held in Taylor in 1926. In 1931, the County Supervisors decided to move the county fair to Holbrook due to it being the county seat and its central location in the county. The fairgrounds and other facilities were built as a permanent location for the county fair and other events.

There have been a few changes over the years. The Navajo County Fair and Fairgrounds are now supported by the Navajo County Board of Supervisors, maintained by the Navajo County Facilities Management Department, and controlled by Navajo County Fair, Inc. It is the 18-member board of directors of Navajo County Fair, Inc. and a core of volunteers and sponsors who make the Navajo County Fair a success. Navajo County Fair, Inc. takes considerable pride in maintaining a traditional down-home county fair.

Let the festivities begin Wednesday night with opening ceremonies. The Navajo County Fair proudly presents High Lonesome and Main Street on the Midway Stage. We welcome back Frazier Shows of America carnival with their amazing rides. Frazier Shows is the largest state fair quality carnival in Navajo County. This year's entertainment will include the Demolition Derby on Thursday night, followed by a live concert featuring Dylan Wheeler. Friday and Saturday night will be the GCPRA Rodeo with top stock contractor Rocking B Rodeo Co., Pro Rodeo Barrel Man Kyle "Hashtag" Lamon, Tomas Garzilazo, PRCA Rodeo Announcer Jody Carper, and a live video scoreboard with instant replays will make for a fantastic rodeo! Jon Wolfe will follow the rodeo live on the Main Stage Friday night, and the Saturday night rodeo will be followed by a live concert featuring Josh Ward. Other entertainment and events during the fair include the Little Buckaroo Rodeo, Open Class Exhibits and Demonstrations, Jr. Livestock Show and Auction. Don't forget to enjoy the 4-H Horse Show. GET TO KNOW YOUR RODEO CONTRACT PERSONNEL

Growing up, my brother and I were a dynamic rodeo duo. We competed in all the timed events during junior and high school rodeos. But rodeo wasn't just about competing; it was about narrating the thrilling action. Even as a kid, I was drawn to the role of the announcer. Whether we were playing "rodeo" in our backyard, or I was taking the mic at local gatherings, announcing seemed to come naturally to me. Others took notice, and in 1991, right out of high school, I was asked to announce the local high school rodeo. That was the moment that set me on my path.

From there, I found myself hired to announce junior and amateur rodeos all across the Lone Star State of Texas and even into the vast landscapes of New Mexico. After college, I decided to chase my calf roping dreams and swiftly earned my PRCA card. I roamed the pro rodeo circuit for several years, crisscrossing the country from coast to coast. It was during my spring journey through California that I met the love of my life, Kelli. Fate had its way, and I eventually relocated to the Golden State, concluding my tie-down roping career with a California Circuit finals qualification in 2003.

It was then that I shifted my focus back to my other passion: announcing rodeos. I set out to obtain my PRCA Announcer card and make rodeo announcing my full-time profession. In 2005, Kelli and I tied the knot, and we've been fortunate to build our lives together while traveling to rodeos ever since.

I've been honored to be selected nine times by the PRCA to announce the National Finals Steer Roping, and I've had the privilege of announcing the Ram National Circuit Finals twice. Throughout my career, I've announced many fantastic rodeos across the United States and Canada, sharing my passion for rodeo with fans far and wide.

Tomas, a native of Mexico City, was introduced at an early age to his family heritage and tradition of "La Charrería" which is a skill performed through the generations only by the Mexican Charro. Charros take extreme pride in their highly developed horsemanship and roping abilities. Tomas, third generation Charro, has devoted his life to sharing Mexico's National Sport La Charrería with the World and along with his family they travels all over the country all year long performing and showcasing his Hispanic Heritage and keeping alive the Western legacy.

A lifetime of preparation, performances and competition continue to require total self-discipline, patience and commitment by Tomas to training and mastering the artistry of La Charrería. Incorporating a display of refined horsemanship while demonstrating maguey rope artistry in his performances bring audiences to their feet applauding in appreciation of his skills. Tomas devotes countless hours to his horses who with their athletic ability and intelligence willingly execute maneuvers when asked by their friend. It is a rare and honorable experience to witness these partnership performances.

His awards are many including the 4X PRCA Specialty Act of the Year and most recently he won the TV talent show the 'Go Big Show' season 1 featured on TBS channel. He also got honored to receive la Espuela de Oro «the golden spur» one of the highest distinction by the Mexican and US Charrería Association recognizing his career and for being a voice and Ambassador of his tradition and Mexican National Sport.

Tomas Garzilazo's proficiency as a skilled horseman and rope artist defines him as one of the finest Charros presenting La Charrería today.

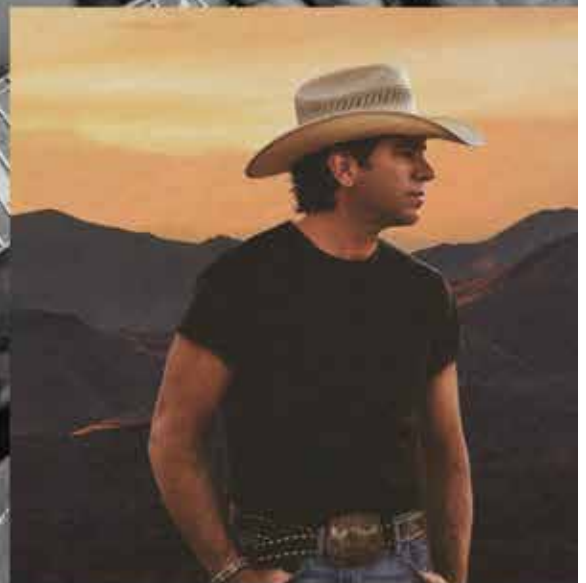

ENTRY INFORMATION & RULES

1. Use the entry form provided in this fair book at the end of Departments A-L to enter your exhibits.
2. The entry form must be in the fair office/postmarked on or before Friday, August 29, 2025 to avoid late fees.
3. Send entry forms to: Navajo County Fair, Inc., 404 E Hopi Drive, Holbrook, AZ 86025
4. You may copy the entry form in the book or obtain additional copies from the fair office, your local Chamber of Commerce, your local library, our website – www.navajocountyfair.net – or our Facebook page – Navajo County Fair & Rodeo.
5. Entry fees are \$1.00 per entry/exhibit.
6. Some departments and/or divisions may have different fees so please review carefully.
7. **After the August 29, 2025, deadline, late entry fees will apply – late entry fees are \$5 per page in addition to the \$1 per entry.**
8. Use the fair book to find your entry category.
9. Please fill out your entry form using:
 - Department Letter
 - Division Number
 - Class Number
 - Age Group Number

Any animals that are dangerous, uncontrollable, or exhibiting signs of disease and/or parasite infection will be immediately removed from the fairgrounds.

Age group numbers are as follows for Departments A – L unless otherwise specified. Check each department carefully.

1. Child, 5-11 years
 2. Youth, 12 – 18 years
 3. Adult, 19-59 years
 4. Senior, 60+ years
 5. People with disabilities
10. Exhibitors must describe their entries on the entry form.
 11. Each exhibitor must complete a separate entry form.
 12. No nicknames or multiple names are allowed on the entry form.
 13. Group entries need only one name on the entry form.
 14. Each exhibitor may enter as many different classes as desired. Some classes do allow multiple entries, but others do not. **Please check each class carefully for this requirement.**
 15. Exhibitors are responsible for the correct information on the entry forms and entry tags. Incorrect information may result in disqualification. Entries with improper division or identification and incomplete entry forms will NOT be accepted nor judged and entry fees will be forfeited. **NO EXCEPTIONS.**
 16. **Entry is limited to Navajo County residents.**
 17. Every effort will be made to protect and care for all exhibits but in no case will Navajo County Fair, Inc., including its' officers, volunteers, agents, and/or employees, be responsible for any damage or loss which may occur. All eggs become the property of Navajo County Fair, Inc.

EXHIBIT DROP OFF TIMES & LOCATIONS

1. Exhibitors will be responsible for transportation of exhibits to and from the fair.
2. Deliver exhibits to the Navajo County Fairgrounds, 404 E Hopi Drive, Holbrook, AZ on **Sunday, September 7, 2025, from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m.** or **Monday, September 8, 2025, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.**
3. The actual exhibit will be labeled/identified on forms furnished at the time of check-in.

THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION IS FOR DROP-OFF AT CHAMBER LOCATIONS ONLY

1. If you cannot deliver your entries to Holbrook, you can drop them off at the following locations **no later than 2 pm on Monday, September 8, 2024, ONLY.** (Floriculture, baked goods, scarecrows, animals, group exhibits, and 4-H projects are not included)

 - Snowflake/Taylor Chamber of Commerce
 - Winslow Chamber of Commerce
2. Please clearly label each exhibit on the back with your name, age, address, and phone number.
3. Please include a copy of your entry form with your exhibits. The original copy of entry forms and fees must be mailed or dropped off at the fair office on or before the due date. No exceptions.
4. Entries dropped off at Chamber locations WILL NOT be returned there. Exhibitors are responsible for picking up their entries at the fairgrounds at the designated times.

EXHIBIT PICK UP TIMES & LOCATIONS

1. No exhibits will be removed from the Navajo County Fairgrounds prior to 7 a.m. on Sunday September 14, 2025. **Those disregarding this rule will forfeit all ribbons and monies earned.**
2. Open class exhibits will be released Sunday, September 14, 2025, from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m.
3. All entries must be picked up during the designated times. Due to lack of storage, items not picked up by the deadline will be charged a \$25 handling fee and a \$1 per day storage fee. Items not collected within 30 days will be donated or removed by the fairgrounds.

PREMIUM AWARDS

1. All exhibits must be prepared to conform to the special regulations of the department, division, and class. See special rules for each. **All exhibits will be judged on the Danish System of judging. The Danish system is a method of evaluation where a product or process is evaluated against a set of standards and recognition is awarded on the degree to which the standard has been met by each competitor. In Danish System judging, the exhibitors are not judged against each other. In a true Danish system, the standard of excellence is the same for everyone regardless of age/experience.**
2. Premiums are as follows, unless otherwise designated:
 - a. 1st Place..... \$5
 - b. 2nd Place \$3
 - c. 3rd Place.....\$2
 - d. Special Awards
 - i. Best of Class.....\$5 – one may be awarded per class
 - ii. Best of Show.....\$5 – one may be awarded per division
 - iii. Best of Fair.....\$10 – Outstanding/State Fair Quality
3. Judges may award first, second, or third place ribbons per class plus special placing.
4. Special awards available are Best of Class, Best of Show, and Best of Fair. Only one (1) premium payment for special awards will be awarded.
5. **The judge's decisions are final.**
6. The Navajo County Fair, Inc. Board will, in all cases, be the final authority in matters pertaining to commercial and non-competitive exhibits. No obscene entries will be allowed.
7. Premium checks will be mailed to each exhibitor. It is the responsibility of each exhibitor to furnish a correct mailing address. If the address is not legible or correct, the fair office is not responsible for those checks that are returned. Checks that are returned to the fair office will be destroyed after thirty (30) days. **No new checks will be issued.**
8. Only one premium will be mailed to the designated name on the entry form of a **group exhibit.**
9. The deadline for reporting any error(s) in premiums paid is thirty (30) days from the check date. After that time, no changes will be made. All checks must be cashed within ninety (90) days from the check date. **No new checks will be issued.**
10. If exhibitors find it hard to comply with the rules and regulations, it is advised not to enter.

1. ALL livestock is due on Tuesday, September 9, 2025, between 5 p.m. and 8 p.m.
2. All animals **MUST** remain on the fairgrounds until check-out on Sunday, September 14, 2025. Check-out times are from 7 a.m. – 10 a.m. Ribbons and premiums will be forfeited if animals are removed without approval from the superintendent.
3. All animals entered in this section are required to have the following: **Premise ID (beef cattle excluded) and Seasonal Pass from the Arizona Department of Agriculture must be presented at the time of check-in/weigh-in.** Each pass/certificate must have the specific exhibitor's name listed on the pass/certificate for the animal(s) they intend to show.
4. Transportation, care, and feeding will be the responsibility of the exhibitor.
5. The exhibitor is responsible for providing bedding, feeders, and water containers. Water and electricity are available. If the animals are in concrete floor stalls, they must be stalled on bedding.
6. Morning feeding and initial verified stall cleaning will be completed by 9 a.m. each day and maintained throughout the day. All stalls will be randomly inspected by the department superintendent. The superintendent will immediately notify exhibitors of improper care and will need to be rectified in a timely manner. After the initial warning, if the stall has not been rectified with the corresponding superintendent, exhibitor will be charged a fee of \$25 assessed to the exhibitor's animal per pen per day. Any exhibitor who is fined will also still be required to clean their pen.
7. All exhibitors are responsible for cleaning (raking/washing) out their pens when they check out. Any exhibitor who is not present or who has not made prior arrangements to have their stall cleaned, will be assessed a \$100 cleaning fee.



8. Animals showing evidence of disease and/or parasite infestation will be dismissed from the fairgrounds immediately.
9. Any dangerous or uncontrollable animals will be immediately removed from the fairgrounds.

3. All poultry must be banded with a numbered leg band. Rabbits must have a permanent legible tattoo in the left ear. Cavy must have permanent cavy tag in left ear.
4. This show will follow standards similar to and/or established by national organizations, such as the American Rabbit Breeders Association (ARBA) for all rabbit and cavy exhibits; the American Poultry Association (APA) and the American Bantam Association (ABA) for all poultry exhibits. All prizes will be awarded strictly in accordance with nationally accepted standards, such as: the ARBA Standard of Perfection (SOP), the APA SOP, and the ABA SOP. The judge's decision(s) will be final.
5. All animals must be bona fide property of the exhibitor, bill of sale, inspection paperwork, and Certificate of Veterinary Inspection are some of the forms accepted as proof of ownership.

Claire is beyond grateful for the opportunity to represent Navajo County Fair and Rodeo as your 2025 Teen Queen.

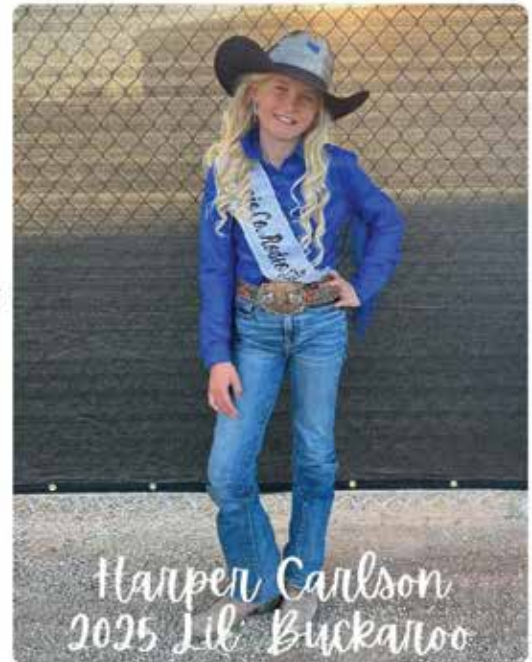

4-H Youth Development is part of the University of Arizona Cooperative Extension and the office for Navajo County is located at 748 N 3rd Street, at the north end of the Navajo County Fairgrounds.

4-H is open to all youth between the ages of 5 and 18, regardless of race, color, national origin, gender, religion, age, disability, sexual orientation, political beliefs, and marital or family status as determined by the following eligibility age criteria.

4-H age is determined by the age of a member at 11:59 p.m. on December 31 of the current 4-H year (October 1 through September 30).

Members ages 5-7 join Arizona Clover Kids 4-H program and members ages 8-18 join the regular 4-H club program. Youth cannot have passed their nineteenth birthday on December 31 of the current 4-H year.

Our goals are to develop leadership and responsibility while learning to live and work with others. Through 4-H you will acquire knowledge and skills to explore future careers, and you will achieve a great deal of satisfaction from your work and accomplishments. Most of all 4-H strives to help develop a positive self-image and good citizenship. Our motto is "To Make the Best Better". There are many ways to become involved in 4-H. One way to become involved is through membership in a club program. Many projects are available. 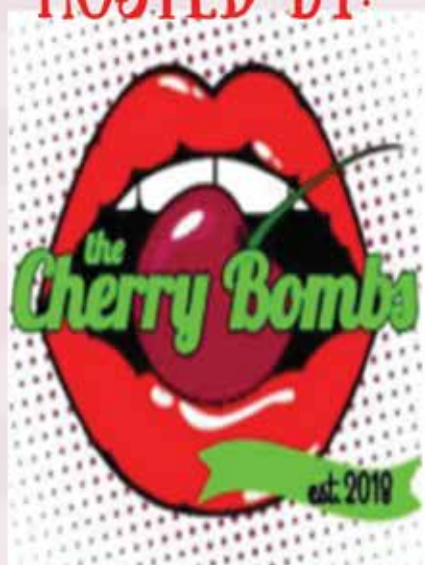

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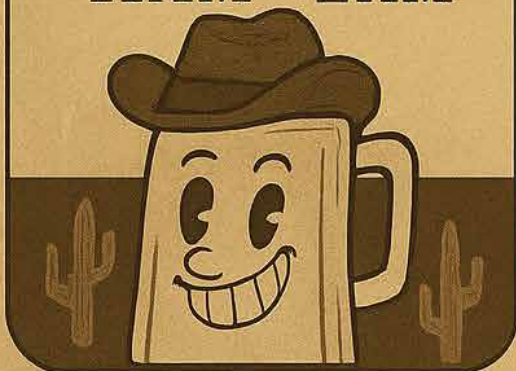
