This past year we have been remiss on including a theme of the day. All of us have some part of our collection or knowledge, which we can share with the club. Displays are welcome at all meetings, and we as officers will make theme of the day suggestions for the coming year. The learning and sharing of knowledge is one of the primary purposes the club was established for; and is central to our non-profit status.

Adam Keene, Daimian Frye, Soner Sen, Jim Blodgett, Kayla Trail (our 2020 scholarship winner), Eric Gudmunsen, and Brian Chaney (Greg's brother visiting from Georgia). Our

newsletter editor Jim Halloran from Oregon was also attending with us today. Welcome everyone!

Treasurer's Report: by Tom Brown

A. General Fund: \$12,489.00

B. Scholarship Fund: \$4900.65

C. BITW Fund: \$8824.40

Income tax (Federal & State) has been submitted on time this year. Annual Report to

Secretary of State (OR) has been submitted ahead of schedule with the appropriate

fee. May be the 1st year since becoming a non-profit without incurring a penalty.

PNTC Treasurer Tom Brown explained to the membership the difference between a Non-Profit and an Unincorporated Association. The major difference is in the area of liability: The boards of directors, officers, members, and employees of the Non-Profit corporation, as a general rule, are not liable for the debts of the Non-Profit corporation. The creditors don't take the personally owned property of the members. In an Unincorporated Association, the decision makers for the association (its officers) are generally liable for the debts of the association, and the members of the association may also be personally liable.

Announcements:

A. If not done already, please pay your 2021 dues today so Steve can get your new

name tags done in reasonable time.

B. Don't forget to pay 2% for all sales of tools.

Old Business:

- A. BITW update: Conrad Berthold. We have 40 people registered for BITW so far.
 - We need 175 to break even. If you haven't registered, please do so asap so that we can get our numbers up. BITW registration sheets are available on the PNTC website. If we end up cancelling the 2021 BITW you will have your registration money refunded.
- B. We will decide at the June meeting at Bill's if we will be having BITW this year or not. If we don't, then we will lose the hotel deposit. Bill has already secured a contract for BITW in Oregon in 2022.
- C. If we cancel BITW for 2021, the current favor (just completed!) will appear at BITW 2022.
- D. If we cancel BITW for 2021, then there will be a meeting at Bill's this August

New Business:

- A. Flea Market in June at Bill's. Tools are for sale the moment they hit the tables! What about food? An announcement on that subject will be made online soon.
- B. BITW favors: PNTC Treasurer Tom Brown made the following statement to the membership; BITW favors are an organizational asset-they are the property of the PNTC membership. NO individual or committee has the right to sell them without first obtaining the approval of the membership at a PNTC business meeting.
 - 1. A motion was made to allow the selling of past BITW favors exclusively to club members in attendance at club meetings at market value. The motion was seconded. The attending membership in Seattle voted on the motion and approved it. This motion will have to be made, seconded, and voted on at the next club meeting in Oregon.
 - 2. An Amendment to the motion prior was made about offering past BITW favors to be sold at discount prices: If the membership decides to offer any past BITW favors at a discounted price, then they must first be offered to attending members at a club meeting. Any remaining favors must then be offered at the discounted price to the attending members of 4 more consecutive meetings. Afterwards, any remaining past BITW favors can then be sold to club members

at the agreed upon discounted price outside of club functions. The amendment approved The amendment will have to be made, seconded, and voted on at the next club meeting in Oregon.

Scholarship Report: Annamarie Schmidt

Theme of the Day:

Al Smith displayed 2 moulding planes from a lot of 5 he purchased at a David Stanley auction. One of them was stamped "John Rodgers". Rodgers was an English plane maker producing planes from 1740-1765. The other one had an "E F" stamped on it-possibly signifying the initials of Rodger's apprentice Edward Flanahan. Both planes shared similar design characteristics.

Jim Gillis brought in 2 fine examples of the Lee's Stop Chamfer Plane manufactured circa 1883-1885 by Horace Thurston in Rhode Island. This plane is referenced in Roger Smith's book "Patented Transitional & Metallic Planes In America" vol.1 (p95-98). According to Jim's research, company documents weren't too good, so he wasn't sure of the exact dates of their manufacture. He also shared that no two planes like this that show up are exactly alike. The two planes Jim brought had a number of design differences between them. (Secretary's note: After the last of these planes were manufactured in Rhode Island, Stanley introduced their version, the #72 chamfer plane the following year in 1886).

Thank you Al and Jim for sharing these amazing survivors from a bygone era with us!
