Our Member Spotlight this month is Tiger Jaw, a company that manufactures and sells a variety of easy-to-use ratcheting hand shears, loppers and pruners world-wide. At a recent 3i Show in

Dodge City, Kansas, the company connected with the GPTMC and was interested in being a part of its Great Plains regional network to access manufacturing resources to assist their company.

One of the resources that the company was interested in accessing was a new tool design for their Cedar Lopper, a successful product that helped move the company forward during the pandemic. The GPTMC was able to connect them with an engineer at the KSU Technology Development Institute (TDI) to begin developing options for a new design of the product.



In addition to design assistance, Tiger Jaw is looking to find potential manufacturers in the region that are capable of producing their products. The owners of the company see the impacts that they supply chain has on companies and would like to have more local and regional suppliers and manufacturers to work with. "Through strategic planning and ensuring our product inventory amounts stay high, we have been able to navigate through supply chain issues and will continue to plan and be flexible with future orders should we encounter delays. Our goal is to have our product completely manufactured locally to avoid these issues." - Kevin Stafford, Owner.



The owners of Tiger Jaw have been involved with the industry for 25 years, and are very passionate about their products and business. Through close relationships with their customers, they continue to discover and meet their needs through innovative features on their tools that provide more leverage and less fatigue, which is beneficial for users that suffer from arthritis or carpal tunnel. SBA T.H.R.I.V.E. Program



The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) is hosting a T.H.R.I.V.E Emerging Leaders program. The program stands for Train. Hope, Rise, Innovate, Venture, and Elevate, and is

a training series designed for executive-level individuals interested in accelerating the growth of their existing business. Individuals will be engaged with in-person coaching, self-paced instruction with demonstrations, hybrid models of virtual and classroom learning, customized micro-sessions, and more.

The sessions will take place with the SBA Wichita District Office July 2022 to mid-December 2022. Although this training is not intended for startups or individuals in the process of starting a business, it is open for eligible business owners of any industry that have:

- Annual revenues of at least \$250,000
- Been in business for at least 3 years
- At least one employee other than the business owner

Microfactory Concept Takes Root in Hays, Kansas

As mentioned in a previous newsletter, the GPTMC and K-State TDI partnered in 2021 to submit a "Great Plains Microfactory Network" submission to the EDA's BBBRC program. The submission did not advance to Phase 2, but one of the coalition communities, Grow Hays, still wanted to turn this idea into a reality for Hays, KS.

The organization worked with GPTMC and TDI for guidance in continuing the microfactory process and what would be needed to make this project a success. Grow Hays applied for and successfully received a **Building a Stronger Economy (BASE) Grant** through the Kansas Dept. of Commerce to build a microfactory in Hays. Construction is set to begin in Fall 2022.

Congratulations Grow Hays for bringing this concept to life. The GPTMC looks forward to watching the microfactory grow manufacturing and entrepreneurs in Hays, Kansas!
