**STRAWBERRY
Sugar Lip Scrub**

Ingredients:

- 6 Tablespoons Granulated Sugar
- 3 Tablespoons Olive Oil
- 1 Strawberry - Puréed
- 1/8 Teaspoon Lemon Juice
- 1/2 Teaspoon Honey
- 2 Drops Vitamin E Oil

To Make:

First, you want to purée the strawberry with the lemon juice and set aside. You can use a food processor or blender to do that. In a little mixing bowl, combine the sugar and olive oil. Stir until well blended. Add in the puréed strawberry and honey and mix well. Add the vitamin E oil and mix until well incorporated. Transfer to an airtight container(s) and store in the refrigerator up to one week.

**Blueberry
Coffee Cake**



Ingredients:

STREUSEL:

- 1/2 cup flour
- 1/2 cup packed brown sugar
- 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 4 tbsp butter, melted

GLAZE:

- 3/4 cup powdered sugar
- 1-2 tbsp milk

COFFEE CAKE:

1/2 cup sugar, 6 tbsp salted butter, room temperature, 1/4 cup sour cream, 1/4 cup milk, 1 egg, 1 tsp vanilla extract, 1 1/4 tsp baking powder, 1 cup all-purpose flour, and 1 1/4 cups blueberries

Instructions:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Prepare 9 inch cake pan with a circle of parchment paper in bottom and grease the sides. To prepare streusel, add flour, brown sugar, cinnamon and melted butter to a medium sized bowl and mix with a fork until all ingredients are incorporated. Set aside.

To make the cake batter, beat sugar and butter until light in color and fluffy, 3-4 minutes. Add sour cream and milk and mix until well incorporated. Add egg and vanilla extract and mix until smooth. Combine flour and baking powder in a separate bowl.

Add dry ingredients to batter and mix until smooth. Spread half of the cake batter into the bottom of the cake pan. Top batter with about half of the streusel mixture, then half of the blueberries. Spread remaining cake batter over streusel. Sprinkle remaining streusel and blueberries over the top of the cake batter.

Bake for 34-36 minutes. Remove cake and cool in the pan for about 20 minutes and move to cooling rack. To make glaze, combine powdered sugar and milk in a small bowl and whisk until smooth. Drizzle the glaze over the coffee cake and sprinkle a few more blueberries over top.

Slow Cooker **BBQ Chicken Sandwich**

Ingredients:

CHICKEN:

2 1/2 lbs chicken breasts or
 1 1/2 cups BBQ sauce
 1/2 sweet onion sliced
 1 tablespoon smoked paprika
 1 tablespoon garlic powder
 1 teaspoon kosher salt
 1 tablespoon brown sugar
 1 teaspoon dried oregano
 6 buns or sandwich rolls
 3 tablespoon butter softened

SLAW:

3 cups coleslaw
 1/2 cup mayonnaise
 1 chipotle pepper, diced in
 adobo sauce
 1 tablespoon lime juice
 Salt and pepper to taste

Directions:

In a small bowl mix paprika, garlic powder salt, brown sugar, oregano, and mix until combined

Add sliced onions to the slow cooker and place the chicken on top. Sprinkle the seasonings on the chicken. Pour bbq sauce over the chicken. Cover and cook on high 3-4 hours or low 5-6 hours.

In a small bowl add the mayo, chipotle, and lime juice whisk until combined, and set aside. Remove chicken to a cutting board and shred with two forks. Place chicken back into the slow cooker and stir to coat with the sauce.

Spread the softened butter over the buns. Heat a skillet or griddle to medium-high heat, add the buns butter side down into the skillet. Cook 2-3 minutes or until golden brown.

In a small bowl add the mayonnaise, chipotle pepper, and lime juice and mix until combined.

In a medium bowl add the cabbage, cilantro, and dressing and mix until combined. Add salt and pepper to taste. Add to sandwich.

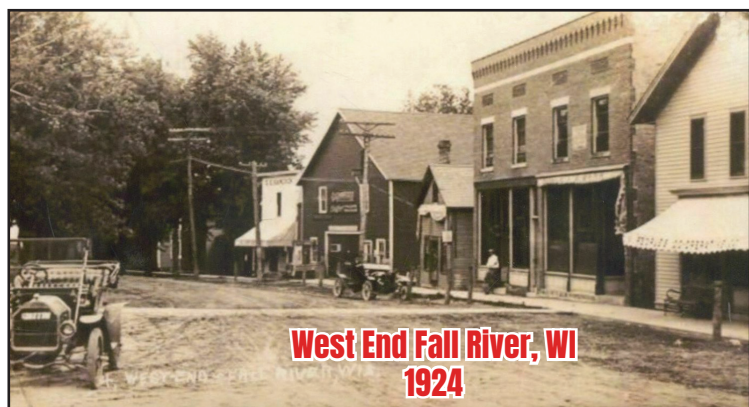

WAYS TO KEEP YOUR PET SAFE IN THE HEAT

Watch out for heatstroke. Symptoms of heatstroke include excessive panting, drooling, lethargy, fever, vomiting, seizures, and collapse. If you think your dog or cat is suffering from heatstroke, call your veterinarian right away. Very young and senior dogs as well as breeds with flatter faces -- such as pugs, shih tzus, pekingese, bulldogs, boxers and Persian cats -- are especially vulnerable.

Give your pet extra water. On hot days, be sure to refill your pet's water bowl more often or add more bowls of water throughout your home.

Have several ways for your pet to cool off. Leave a fan on where your pet can sit in front of it, add some ice cubes to their water or give them a cool treat, like a Kong stuffed with wet food or peanut butter then frozen. You can also keep the blinds/curtains closed to limit the sun from heating up your space.

Never leave your pet alone inside a car. Even with the windows cracked, the inside of a car can reach 120 degrees in a matter of minutes on a warm day. Leaving the air conditioning on is no guarantee your pet will be safe.

Take your walks in the morning or evening. Intense midday heat can overwhelm your dog during a walk. Try to take your pet for a walk during the cooler morning or evening hours. Depending on the humidity, you may have to keep the walk shorter than normal.

Don't leave your dog alone outside for more than a few minutes. Even in the shade, a dog exposed to extreme heat and humidity is at risk for heatstroke.

Avoid hot sidewalks. Remember, your pet's paws are bare skin which can be easily burned by hot pavement, blacktop and sand.

Brush your pet regularly. A clean, untangled coat can help ward off summer skin problems and help your dog stay cool. You can trim your dog's coat, but it's not recommended to shave it down to the skin because their hair protects them from getting sunburnt.

Check your vehicle for leaking coolant. The DCHS says dogs are attracted to the sweet taste of coolant., and even a small amount can make your dog sick or cause death. If you believe your dog may have ingested coolant, take them to the vet immediately. helping the environment.

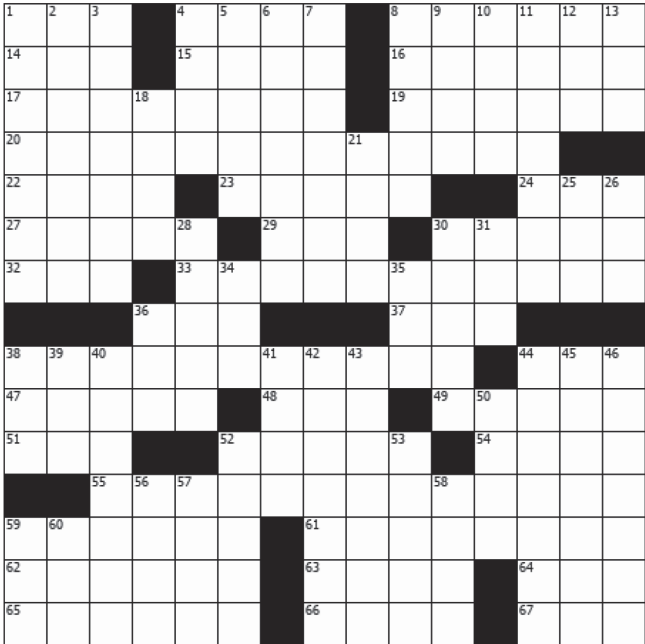

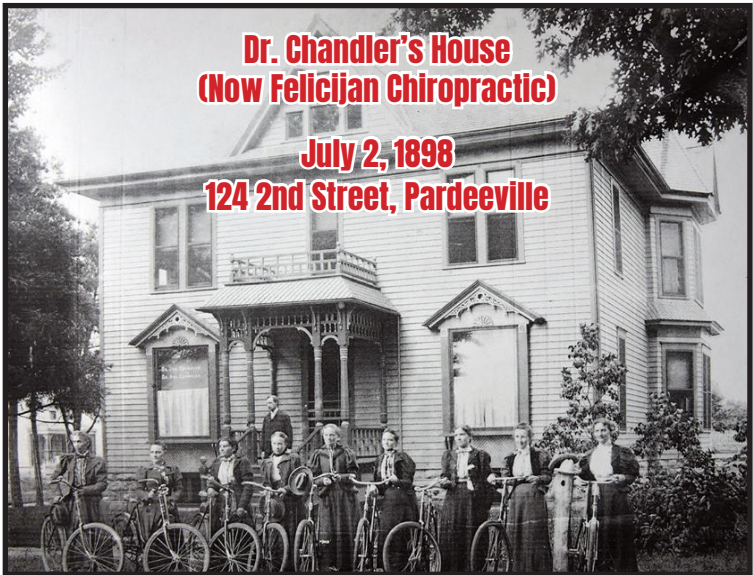

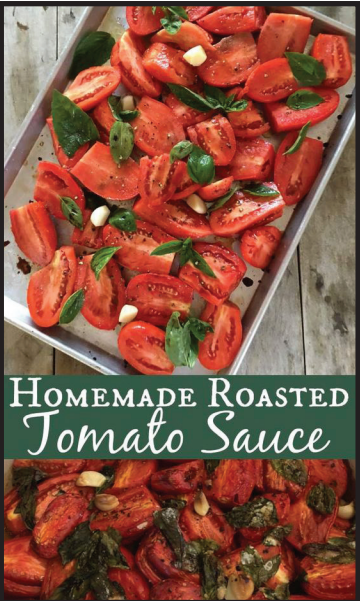

Homemade Roasted Tomato Sauce

Ingredients:

- 10 cups fresh tomatoes, quartered
- 3-4 TBSP oil
- 2 TBS balsamic vinegar
- Garlic to taste, 5-6 cloves
- 1/4 cup tightly packed fresh basil
- 1 tsp coarse sea salt
- 1/2 tsp freshly ground pepper

Directions:

Preheat oven to 425 degrees.

Wash tomatoes and cut them in half (or quarters for large tomatoes) - leave cherry tomatoes whole. Put tomatoes on a cookie sheet.

Peel garlic cloves and place them whole on the tomatoes. Tear fresh basil into small pieces, add to the cookie sheet.

Add salt & pepper. Drizzle oil and vinegar over everything.

Bake for 1 - 1 1/2 hours.

After they have roasted, let the tomatoes cool a bit. Put them in a blender and blend until smooth.

Season with more salt & pepper to taste.

Enjoy on your favorite pasta.
