



Fill a medium saucepan 1/2 way with water. Bring to boil. Add 1 cup of shea butter to a glass mason jar.

Turn off stove and place the mason jar into the water. Allow shea butter to melt. Carefully remove mason jar from the water. Pour shea butter into a bowl.

Add 1 tbsp of coconut oil to the bowl. Essential oils: Add 15 drops of cinnamon, 20 drops of vanilla, 10 drops of ginger, 7 drops of orange, and 5 drops of nutmeg.

Whisk together over an ice bath. Refrigerate for 15-20 minutes. Remove and mix with an electric mixer for 5 minutes. Scoop into a small jar with a lid.





pumpkin **SNICKERDOODLES**

Ingredients:

1 cup cold unsalted butter cubed

2/3 cup Pumpkin Puree room temperature

1/2 cup granulated sugar 1/2 cup + 2 thsp dark brown sugar packed

2 large egg yolks room temperature

2 teaspoon vanilla extract 1 2/3 cup all-purpose flour

1 ½ teaspoon pumpkin spice 1 teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon cream of tartar ½ teaspoon kosher salt 1/3 cup granulated sugar for rolling

½ teaspoon ground cinnamon for rolling

Directions:

Preheat the oven to 350 F/180 C. Line two baking trays with parchment paper and set them aside.

Brown the butter in a large pan for 9-11 minutes. You should have about 1 cup of browned butter. Pour into a bowl and set it aside to cool to room temp. Then chill in the fridge until it's cold but NOT solid. Spread pumpkin puree on a plate. Press paper towels into it and soak up the extra liquid. Then scrape into a pile and re-spread it around the plate. Use a new stack of paper towels to keep absorbing the extra liquid, until the pumpkin feels pretty dry like soft playdough, and now measures roughly 1/3 cup. When the butter is cool, whisk in the brown sugar and granulated sugar for 1 minute.

Whisk in the egg yolks, vanilla, and dried pumpkin puree. Fold in the flour, pumpkin spice, salt, cream of tartar, and baking soda until just combined. Set in the fridge for 5 minutes to firm up. Meanwhile, in a small bowl, combine the cinnamon and the sugar.

Scoop the dough into 3 thsp-sized balls and roll each dough ball in the cinnamon sugar. Place on the prepared baking sheet spaced 2-3 inches apart. Bake the cookies one tray at a time for 10-11 minutes or until the edges are golden brown and the middle is puffy and slightly underbaked.

WHAT TO KNOW ABOUT RSV

(NAPSI)—You may remember the old saying, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." It is easily spread from contact with a contaminated surface as well as through the air (when someone infected sneezes or coughs), so anyone at any age can get it.

A Solution

RSV vaccines are now approved and available throughout the U.S. and the cost is covered fully for Medicare beneficiaries. These vaccines can truly protect your health across your lifespan as they are now available for adults aged 60 years or older, as well as for infants through maternal immunization.

It is always a good idea to review your health plan. When contacting Medicare, make certain that you are contacting the actual government agency itself. Only government agencies can use the .gov ending and the best number to use to reach trained Medicare experts is 1-800-633-4227. It's easy to remember—it's 1-800-Medicare.

The National Association of Nutrition and Aging Services Programs (NANASP) created a resource outlining the five things to know about RSV to help get the word out about this important opportunity to protect the health of older adults. It's always a good idea to talk to your pharmacist or healthcare provider about whether you should get the RSV vaccine and keeping things up to date.





Ingredients:

3 1/2 cups (about 2 large) russet potatoes, peeled and diced medium 1 1/2 cups (9oz) cooked honey ham, diced medium*
1/2 cup celery diced small 1/2 cup onion diced small 4 cups (2 15oz cans) chicken broth 5 tablespoons butter 1/4 cup and 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour 2 cups milk 1/4 teaspoon black pepper Salt

Directions:

In a large pot, combine potatoes, ham, celery, onions, and chicken broth.

Bring to a low boil and cook over medium heat until vegetables are fork-tender, 10 to 15 minutes.


In a medium saucepan, melt butter over medium heat and whisk in flour. Cook, stirring constantly until flour is golden, about one minute.

Slowly add in milk, continuing to stir so that no lumps form and cook until mixture is thick, about 5 minutes.

Pour flour and milk mixture into the soup and stir. Add pepper, and salt to taste.

Serve and enjoy.

*If you don't care for honey ham, you can substitute for regular cooked ham.

7 TIPS FOR READYING YOUR OUTDOOR POWER EQUIPMENT FOR WINTER

(NAPSI)—After your lawn gets its last cut before winter, it will be time to put away spring and summer outdoor power equipment, like lawn mowers, leaf blowers, and trimmers. It's also important to ready snow throwers, generators and other small engine equipment for winter use. How and when you prepare your equipment for seasonal changes can save you time and money later.

Readying your equipment for winter needs is important as the weather changes. It's also important to put your fall equipment away correctly. What you do now when you put away your equipment, sets you up for an easier start in the spring.

Here are seven tips to ensure snow throwers will be ready for Winter and Spring:

- #1 Review owner's manuals. Re-familiarize yourself with how to handle equipment safely. Lost manuals can be found online. Save a copy on your computer if possible, so it can be consulted when needed. Be familiar with your equipment, and all its features, including how to turn it off quickly and safely.
- #2 Service all equipment. Before storing spring and summer equipment, clean and service it or take it to a small engine repair shop. Change engine oil and safely dispose of the old oil. Service the air filter, and do other maintenance as directed by the owner's manual. Check winter equipment and see if any maintenance and repairs are required.
- #3 Handle fuel properly. Unused fuel left in gas tanks over the winter can go stale and even damage equipment. Before storing equipment, add fuel stabilizer to the gas tank, then run the equipment to distribute it. Turn the engine off, allow the machine to cool, then restart and run until the gas tank is empty. For winter equipment, buy the recommended type of fuel no more than 30 days before use. Use fuel with no more than 10% ethanol in outdoor power equipment. Use a fuel stabilizer if recommended by the manufacturer. Get more information on safe fueling for outdoor power equipment at https://www.opei.org/programs/ethanol-warning/.
- **#4 Charge batteries.** Remove and fully charge batteries before storing. Don't store batteries on metal shelves or allow them to touch metal objects. Store them on a plastic or wood shelf in a climate-controlled structure.
- **#5 Shelter equipment from winter weather.** Store spring and summer equipment in a clean and dry place such as a garage, barn or shed. Winter equipment should be kept away from the elements, but be easily available for use.
- #6 Prepare, prepare, prepare. Make space in the garage or basement before the weather changes, so there is room to store larger yard items. Remove sticks, debris, dog and kid's toys and other items from your yard that can damage or destroy equipment. Clear the paths used regularly, especially during the winter when snow can "hide" things.
- #7 Have the right weather appropriate extension cord for your generator. Keep heavy duty outdoor-rated extension cords on hand. Ensure the cord is the right length to operate the generator a safe distance from the building. Never operate a generator indoors, in a garage, breezeway or under an open window or near any air intake for a building.
