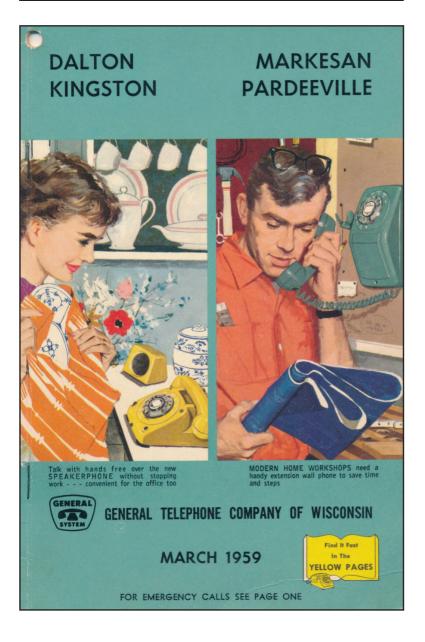

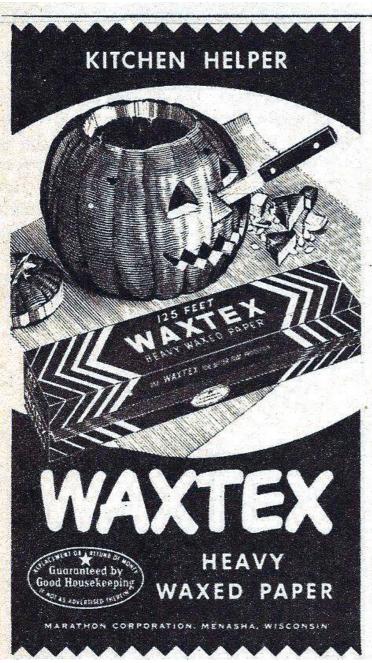

Ingredients:

Kosher salt
6 medium orange bell peppers
8 ounces elbow macaroni
1 1/4 cups half-and-half
8 ounces cream cheese(at
room temperature)
4 ounces mild Cheddar, shredded (about 1 1/2 cups)

Directions:

Bring a large pot of generously salted water to a boil. Fill a large bowl with ice water. Cut the tops off the peppers and reserve. Remove the seeds and membranes. Put the peppers and the tops in the boiling water and cook until just tender, 2 to 3 minutes. Plunge the peppers into the ice bath.

Once cool, remove them and use a sharp knife to carve a jack-olantern face into one side of each pepper.

Return the water to a boil, add the macaroni and cook until al dente, about 6 minutes. Reserve 1 cup of the pasta water and drain (don't rinse the pasta).

Heat the half-and-half in a large saucepan over medium heat until it just comes to a simmer. Continue simmering until reduced to about 3/4 cup, about 10 minutes. Add the cream cheese and stir until melted. Whisk in the Cheddar until all the cheese is melted and the sauce is smooth. Off the heat, add the macaroni to the saucepan and stir to combine.

Stir in some of the reserved pasta water to thin the sauce if needed. Season with salt if needed.

Let sit for 10 minutes, then divide the mac and cheese among the peppers and cap each with a pepper top.

- 4 cups sugar 1/2 cup coconut oil
- 2 Tbsp. olive oil
- 2 Tbsp. Castile soap
- Zest of 2-3 oranges
- 2 tsp. orange juice
- 30 drops sweet orange oil essential oil
- 15 drops vanilla
- essential oil

To Make:

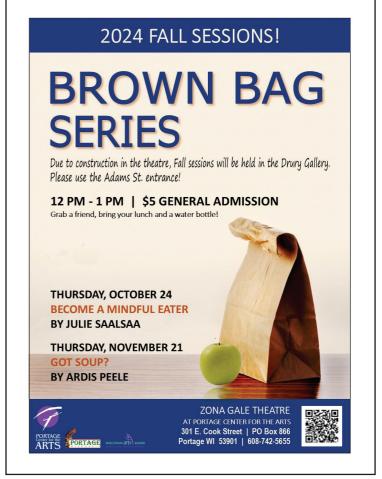
Combine half the sugar and coconut oil and work together. If you're using unrefined coconut oil this might take a little longer than if you're using fractionated coconut oil.

Add in olive oil, orange juice, orange zest and Castile soap. Mix well.

Add the other half of the sugar and mix well to combine.

Combine the essential oils and mix well.

Store in an airtight container in a cool, dark place.

<u>Ingredients:</u>

2/3 cup butter
1/4 cup vegetable oil
1 cup granulated sugar
1/3 cup brown sugar
2/3 cup cocoa powder
2 egg cold
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup all purpose flour
15 Oreos Extra 5 for topping

Directions:

Preheat the oven to 350F then line an 8×8 inch baking pan with parchment paper and set aside.

In a microwave-safe bowl melt the butter, oil, and both sugars, together in 30-second intervals mixing in between every time.

Once fully melted microwave for another 1 minute and stir vigorously to allow the sugar to melt fully. Using a hand mixer or stand mixer here is best.

Whisk in the eggs one at a time then add in the vanilla. You want the batter to pull from the bowl a little bit.

Add in the flour, cocoa powder, and salt and fold just until combined.

Pour half of the batter into the parchment paper-lined baking pan and spread evenly.

Place the Oreos in the center of the batter (see photo) then top with the rest of the brownie batter and spread to cover.

Top with the 5 crushed Oreos and bake in the preheated oven for 30 minutes.

Allow the brownies to cool down fully on a wire rack before slicing into them for the perfect square crinkle top slice every time.

Vitamin A: Vitamin A helps in saliva production, which is beneficial to your overall oral health. Saliva functions in breaking down foods and cleans bacteria between teeth. The vitamin is found in orange-colored fruits and vegetables, fish and eggs. Vitamin A tablets and gummies are widely available and also keep eyes and skin healthy.

Vitamin C: Vitamin C helps your gums as well as your teeth, keeping connective tissues in the gums strong to hold teeth in place while deficiencies in vitamin C can be the cause of bleeding gums and gum disease. Chewable or liquid forms of vitamin C are erosive, however, and can cause the loss of enamel if taken in excess, though they're safe at the recommended dosage. Vitamin C is present in many fruits and vegetables.

Vitamin D: Vitamin D protects against oral health conditions such as gingival inflammation, cavities and gum disease, as it plays a significant role in tooth mineralization. Like calcium, vitamin D can be found in fish or vitamin D-fortified foods like milk and cereal, but for convenience, it is available in supplement form.

Zinc: Zinc can eliminate cavity-causing bacteria and control demineralization. The vitamin can also help with gum diseases such as gingivitis and other common periodontal problems. A bonus is that zinc helps fight bad breath.



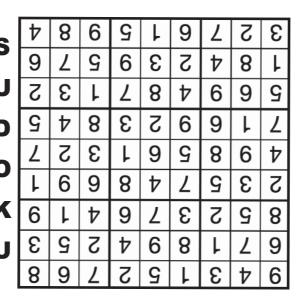

Let the fudge cool at room temperature for approximately 2 hours

Then remove by lifting by the parchment paper.

EASY TIPS TO REDUCE FOOD WASTE IN YOUR CHILD'S LUNCH BOX



1.Get your children's input on what they like. Avoid "wish packing" foods that your child won't eat at home as these foods will likely be discarded at school. If clementines and turkey wraps are their thing, pack those. It is challenging to find the sweet spot between good nutrition and your child's preferences.

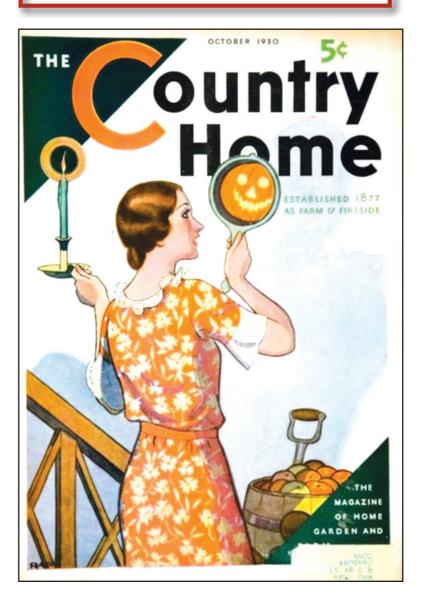
2.Cut up fruits and veggies so they are easy to eat.Most fruits and vegetables are naturally low in fat, sodium, and calories. None have cholesterol. They provide many essential nutrients, including potassium, dietary fiber, folate, vitamin A, and vitamin C.

3.Make lunch fun. For example, add dips for cut veggies, make meat or cheese pinwheels and include dressing to add to a "shake and serve" salad.

4.Make sure to get the portions right for kids of dif- ferent ages and sizes. USDA's MyPlate provides simpleto-use nutrition guidelines for allocating portions among
food groups, such as one-quarter of the meal as lean protein (e.g., beans, fish, lean meats, and nuts), one-quarter
grains (preferably whole grain), and fruit and vegetables
for the remaining half of the lunch.

5.Aim for "zero-waste lunches" by using reusable water bottles, containers, and snack bags, compostable cutlery, and bento-style lunch boxes, which separate foods into different compartments to offer variety while providing portion control.

6.Always keep food safety in mind. Some practices can reduce both food safety risks and food waste, such as using insulated lunch bags or boxes to keep fresh foods fresh and including reusable cold packs.

To properly measure brown sugar, firmly pack it into your measuring cup. As the cup fills, press the brown sugar down firmly with a spoon and your fingers. Level it off with a butter knife or spatula.

When a recipe requires a floured pan for chocolate cake, replace it with cocoa powder.
