Our District giving held steady at 78% of the total apportionment ask – next year I know we can break over 80%. I believe in us! I am grateful for your continued support of the ministries of the United Methodist Church here in the Iowa Annual Conference and throughout our global denomination. We're approaching the season of Lent. Most of us know about Lent — it lasts 40 days, leads to Easter, and suggests giving up something. But there's more to remember about this very special season.

40 days

For most Christians, including United Methodists, Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. This time period on a calendar lasts 46 days, but United Methodists and many other protestant denominations don't count Sundays in Lent. Each Sunday represents a "mini-Easter." On each Lord's Day in Lent, while Lenten fasts continue, the reverent spirit of Lent is tempered with joyful anticipation of the Resurrection.

The forty days of Lent represent the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, fasting and enduring the temptations of Satan in preparation for his ministry. It's a time of self-examination and reflection. United Methodists are encouraged to focus on relationship with God, growing as disciples, and extending ourselves, often choosing to give up something or to volunteer and give of ourselves for others. Lent is a perfect time to add a Lenten spiritual discipline, such as reading a daily devotional or praying through a Lenten calendar (like the one Pastor Jenn gave us) to draw ourselves nearer to God.

Ash Wednesday

The first day of Lent is marked by Ash Wednesday. There are instances in the Old Testament where people used ashes to symbolize penance, mourning, and humiliation. United Methodists first adopted an official ritual for Ash Wednesday that involves the use of ashes in the 1992 Book of Worship. Ashes demonstrate an awareness of mortality and an intent to repent. The ashes used for Ash Wednesday often come from burnt palms from the previous year's Palm Sunday. Through the service of ashes on the first day of Lent, we come before God recognizing our humanity, repenting of our sin, and remembering who we are and who we can be.

Fasting

For ancient Hebrews, fasting was a form of penance and humility before God. Early Christians also fasted to remember Jesus' 40-day fast before his public ministry. John Wesley fasted regularly, calling it one of the "acts of piety," along with praying and studying the Bible. Although the United Methodist church doesn't require fasting during Lent, it is often encouraged. Every mealtime or any time you feel hunger pangs, use that time for praying instead of eating. It's an opportunity to focus on your spiritual hunger instead of your physical hunger. If you can't or don't want to fast from food, choose something else that consumes your focus. Determine a period of time each day or week to abstain from or restrict certain types of food like chocolate or pizza, TV, social media, shopping, gossip, laziness, or anything else you normally "covet."

The Color Purple

The first color used for Christian liturgical vestments was white, the color of the Resurrection. By the Middle Ages, other colors had been adopted. Purple, the color of kings, was quickly associated with Christ. The red-toned purple of Lent reminds us of the color of blood and symbolizes the Lord's Passion.

Almsgiving

Lent emphasizes the Christian call to almsgiving or caring for others. Jesus gave special attention to the poor. Although this should be an ongoing focus of our, it is especially relevant during Lent.
