THE CUP GOES TO HARVARD

INTERCOLLEGIATE CHAMPIONSHIPS ON BERKELEY OVAL.

YALE WINS SECOND PLACE, PRINCETON
THIRD—EVENTS WELL CONTESTED
AND A WORLD'S RECORD BROKEN.

Harvard fetched a little dog to town yesterday, and went back to Cambridge with the dog and the Intercollegiate Cup in addition. The dog is a tiny fox terrier—an unusually bright-looking little thing—and its name is Mott. He is the Harvard Athletic team's mascot. A few weeks ago Mott appeared at the training table where the Harvard men preparing for the intercollegiate championships were eating their allowance of beef and beans, and the athletes could not drive him away. On second thought some one suggested that the dog be kept for a mascot, and the rest of the team thought this a bright idea. So he was named Mott, for the championship in field and track athletics, which are known still as Mott Haven games.

Feeling quite confident that Harvard would win the championships this year the men on her team brought their dog to this city with them and took him to the Berkeley Oval yesterday afternoon, where the championships of the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes were decided. Mott first inspected carefully the athletes' headquarters where the Harvard men put on their competing clothes. At 2:30 o'clock Mott opened his eyes to the grandeur of the Berkeley Oval. He was led across the field by H. R. Allen, a strapping Harvard athlete, and his presence set the noisy college ball a-rolling in great shape. Some Harvard men in the south grand stand saw him first, and were all animation at once. They began to give their college cry, which the dog seemed to recognize, and when they had finished all of the men in a crowd of nearly 4,000 people were whistling a dog-call. Mott must have thought that something was expected of him, for he pulled at his collar and yelped impatiently. Throughout the contests of the afternoon, whenever a Harvard man was in a contest, other men on the team saw that the little dog was informed of what was going on, and as Harvard's success is, of course, due to Mott, he will go down to posterity as entitled to a conspicuous place in intercollegiate sport.

At any rate, Harvard was victorious, although she did not win without a struggle. Yale was here with her champions and record holders to contest every event. Princeton sent her best men, and Columbia was well represented by men of muscle and grit, so that, while it was believed Harvard would win, this fact was not established until late in the afternoon. The games began at 2:40 o'clock, and by 3 o'clock there were fully 4,500 people on the Oval. There were plenty of college men, so when they were nicely started by Harvard's mascot they kept things booming until 8 o'clock, when the last event, the running broad jump, was concluded by the light of the moon.

Many ladies were present. The south stand blossomed with them, especially with their gowns, which were of crimson or blue or a combination of college colors, and, of course, were very pretty and becoming. A line of carriages stretched along the driveway on the hill overlooking the field, and a number of coaches were drawn up near the field. The weather was oppressively warm for the athletes early in the afternoon, but it became cool later, and did not bother the people on the hill or in the stands at any time.

Several accidents happened to mar the games, and it is remarkable that they were not more serious in their results. While Bowser of Pennsylvania was throwing a sixteen-pound hammer, Oscar Tolley, an employe of the Oval, got in the way of the instrument and it struck him a glance blow on his back between the shoulders. He fell insensible and was carried from the field on a stretcher. No bones were broken, although he was seriously hurt. He had hemorrhages last night.

The two-mile bicycle race brought accidents, as such races usually do when more than four men start in a heat. P. W. Davis of Harvard crowded R. B. Wade of Yale on the turn so the latter struck the sod and took a header. J. S. Riegle, Lehigh; W. W. Weare, Yale; W. Greenleaf, Harvard, and E. R. Lawson, Yale, were following closely, and all went in a pile on the track. Two wheels were broken and Wade was badly shaken up. Referee W. B. Curtis was informed that the offender was Greenleaf and disqualified him, not learning that it was Davis until after the final heat was decided, Davis securing third place, and then it was too late to disqualify the right man. However, as Greenleaf is a better rider than Davis, the other colleges did not complain.

The first event of the day was the 100-yard dash. There were eleven men to compete, but it was a foregone conclusion that either Sherrill of Yale or Cary of Princeton would be the winner. Cary was feeling better than he claimed to be when Sherrill beat him in 10 seconds at the Berkeley Athletic Club games, but notwithstanding this he fell before Sherrill again, the latter winning handily. A breeze blew against the runners on the 100 and 220 yard straightaway courses, so any time for the 100 yards faster than 0:10 1-5 was impossible. The 100-yard dash, as also the 220-yard run, was run in lanes, so that there was no danger of interference.

In the contest with the hammer, Bowser of the University of Pennsylvania withdrew, his entry not having been made in proper time. He threw the hammer several times before withdrawing, one of his throws resulting unfortunately, as stated.

The 220-yard hurdle race resulted in another remarkable performance on the part of J. P. Lee of Harvard. Lee recently made a world's record of 0:25 2-5, and yesterday ran the distance in 0:25 1-4, defeating Herbert Mapes, the well-known hurdler of Columbia. In this event Yale, Harvard, and Columbia men got in heats by themselves, so that the real race did not occur until the final, it being understood between them who was to finish first and second in the trials.

W. C. Downs of Harvard had things all his own way in the quarter-mile run, inasmuch as W. C. Dohm of Princeton did not start in that race. Downs won two heats of the quarter and then met Dohm in the half-mile run, and was defeated, as Dohm was fresh and could hold a hot pace to the end. Downs pushed Dohm the first quarter, and held him until on the last eighth, when Dohm spurted out and won handily.

C. O. Wells of Amherst, who won the mile run last year, captured that event again yesterday. At the start Wells collided with Curtis of Lehigh, the two falling together. It was at first said that Curtis had been spiked in the stomach, but an examination after he had been carried from the field revealed the fact that his wind had been knocked out in the fall, and that he was not seriously injured. Wells, by his fall, was handicapped, but he ran well after he was going again, and at the three-quarter mile had assumed the lead, which he held to the finish.

Points counted 5 for first, 2 for second, and 1 for third. The points made were: Harvard, 32, with 4 firsts, 2 seconds, and 8 thirds; Yale, 29 1-2, with 3 firsts, 1 divided first and second, 4 seconds, and 3 thirds; Princeton, 24, with 3 firsts, 4 seconds, and 1 third; Columbia, 19 1-2, with 2 firsts, a divided first and second, and 3 seconds; Amherst 12, with 2 firsts and 1 second, and Lehigh, College of the City of New-York, and Swarthmore, 1 point each with a third.
