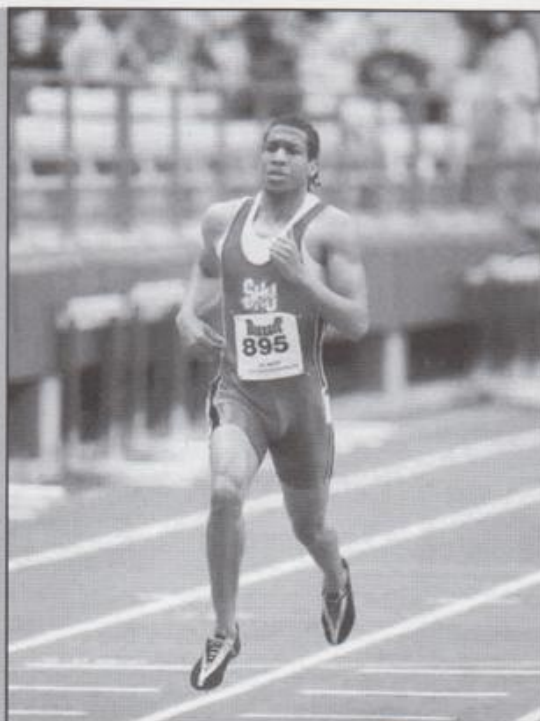

EASTERN COLLEGE ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

Since its foundation 66 years ago, the ECAC has emerged as the nationwide leader in service. The ECAC will administer 113 championships in 35 men's and women's sports for over 121,000 student-athletes and the officiating bureaus will assign more than 5,000 officials in 15 different sports. The Conference has grown significantly from 58 charter members to today having 320 member institutions in Divisions I, II and III, ranging in location from Maine to North Carolina.

Leadership

Inaugural commissioner Asa S. Bushnell molded the organization from its formation in 1938 to his retirement in 1970. George Schiebler succeeded Bushnell as commissioner from 1970-72, followed by Robert M. "Scotty" Whitelaw (1972-89) and Clayton Chapman (1989-98). Current commissioner Phil Buttafuoco assumed chief administrator duties on July 1, 1998. Under Buttafuoco's leadership, the ECAC is committed to becoming the nation's leader in conference services and to setting the standard by which all others are measured.

Location

The ECAC's headquarters, the Asa S. Bushnell Center, is located in Centerville, Massachusetts on Cape Cod. The picturesque Cape is the site of the annual fall convention and honors dinner as more than 300 athletics administrators attend membership committee meetings, professional seminars, and tournament and affiliate meetings.

History

The ECAC was founded as the Central Office for Eastern Intercollegiate Athletics in 1938. In 1983, one of the most significant events in ECAC history occurred as the Eastern Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (EAIW) was consolidated into the ECAC. With the addition of women's sports, the ECAC doubled its number of championships and greatly increased its membership. Through the years the ECAC has been a leader both regionally, and nationally. Comprising more than 32 percent of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) membership, the conference plays an active role in national collegiate athletics policy and legislation. The conference continues to address many of the same issues affecting college athletics in the past while striving to be an industry leader in the 21st century. The ECAC was recently honored with induction to the New England Basketball Hall of Fame for its numerous contributions to the sport of basketball.

Championships

The ECAC administers 113 preseason and postseason events, including the ECAC Collegiate Rowing Series, IC4A cross country and track and field, IFA fencing, EIWA and men's EIGL championships. From 1997 to 2001, the ECAC sponsored conference championships in "endangered" (men's gymnastics, men's water polo) and "emerging" (women's synchronized swimming, women's water polo) sports with funding from the USOC as well as men's wrestling and men's and women's fencing.

Officiating

The ECAC assigns officials in 15 sports in Divisions I, II and III, including baseball, men's and women's basketball, fencing, field hockey, football, men's gymnastics, men's and women's ice hockey, men's and women's lacrosse, men's and women's soccer, softball and wrestling. In addition, the ECAC officiating bureaus provide clinics and workshops, improving the level of officiating and attracting the most qualified collegiate officials. The bureaus assign for both conference and NCAA championships.

Public Relations

The ECAC publicizes the achievements of its member institution's student-athletes through weekly and postseason awards. Annually, the publicity bureau recognizes more than 3,500 student-athletes in the sports of football, field hockey, men's and women's soccer, volleyball, cross-country, ice hockey, men's and women's basketball, baseball, lacrosse and softball. The recognition awards program honors student-athletes, administrators and officials at the fall convention. The promotion and distribution of the prestigious ECAC Lambert Football Poll is another added service by the conference.

Convention and Meetings

The business of the ECAC is conducted at the annual fall convention as well as meetings held each summer, providing the membership opportunities to discuss and vote on conference-wide issues and concerns.

Legislative Services

The ECAC maintains a legislative and compliance service to assist the membership with the application of NCAA and ECAC regulations. The conference sponsors workshops and seminars, processes hardship waivers and facilitates the Collegiate Commissioners Association National Letter of Intent program.

Sponsorships

As a non-profit organization, the ECAC actively pursues relationships with Corporate America to provide support for its programs and services. Through sponsorship, the ECAC enhances championship events for participants while supplementing associated event operation expenses. Conference sponsors may receive, but are not limited to, official access to the membership, television exposure, event signage, event entitlements, tickets and hospitality, and the opportunity to promote volume incentive buying programs to the membership.

Television

ECAC Productions coordinates with institutions, television vendors and broadcast partners to produce and obtain clearances of quality sports programming to promote the conference and its members. Televised sports events include football, men's and women's ice hockey and wrestling. These events are aired through partnerships with regional sports networks including the New England Sports Network (NESN), the Yankee Entertainment Sports Network (YES) and Leafs TV.

Technology

The conference's two Web sites feature real-time management and cutting-edge technology. The nation's leading online officiating system site is a password-protected extranet that allows for real-time access to its membership and officials as changes occur to their schedules. The Conference's main Web site is managed by a custom developed auto-content management system, giving the staff the ability to release conference news as it happens. The site also offers interactive polls and features for the fans. The ECAC is also on the forefront of other Web-based technology including an officials' payment service named OPS.

Internship Program

The prestigious Asa S. Bushnell internship, named after the ECAC's first commissioner and established in 1976, offers students from ECAC institutions hands-on experience in all areas of operation of the nation's largest athletic conference. Former interns proudly represent the ECAC in all fields of the sports industry as directors of athletics, commissioners, broadcasting executives, professional franchise front-office positions, sports information directors and coaches.

Special Events

The ECAC hosts events such as the Eastern College Football Awards Banquet, the ECAC Division I Women's Soccer Classic on Cape Cod, as well as the annual convention and trade show. The ECAC will co-host the 2004 NCAA Women's Frozen Four in Providence and will also host the NCAA Division II Indoor Track and Field Championships at the Reggie Lewis Center in 2004 and 2005.

O.J. Hogans Continues To Set Records at Seton Hall



Seton Hall's O.J. Hogans

O.J. Hogans entered the 2003-04 indoor track season determined to improve upon last year's results. However, after two All-America honors in 2003, a better individual season is hard to imagine. Yet, Hogans anticipates that his senior season at Seton Hall will be his most rewarding.

"I have set several goals for myself coming into this season. I want to run faster than I did last season and I want to stay healthy. I also want to win the 400m title at the NCAA Championship," said Hogans.

At last season's IC4A Indoor Championship, Hogans recorded a track record in the preliminaries of the 400m with a time of 46.39. In the finals, Hogans' 45.86 not only set a meet record but also set an IC4A and school record. He broke the school record six days later at the NCAA Championships, when he finished second. Hogans also ran the anchor leg of the 4x400 relay team that claimed top honors at the IC4A Championship. The squad set a track record in the preliminaries and a meet record in the finals.

During the outdoor season, the Decatur, Georgia, native continued to impress, as he was named Most Outstanding Performer at the BIG EAST Outdoor Championship after setting a stadium record in the 400m in a time of 45.30, a mark that qualified him for the N C A A Regionals.

The success of 2003 has transcended to the early part of this season's slate, as Hogans picked up where he left off last season. After opening the season with the 500m title at the Father Diamond Invitational, Hogans qualified for the IC4As one week later at the Penn State Invitational, where he earned his second consecutive title in the 500m. Later, he finished second in the 200m at the Terrier Classic and placed first in his heat at the New Balance Armory Collegiate Invitational in the 400m. Last week at the BIG EAST Championship, Hogans won the 400m title in a NCAA provisional time of 47.19 and ran the anchor leg on Seton Hall's 4x400m champion relay team.

If anything, the early season has reaffirmed Hogans' belief that his senior season will be his finest with the Pirates. High expectations await at the IC4A and NCAA Championships, but Hogans is up to the challenge.

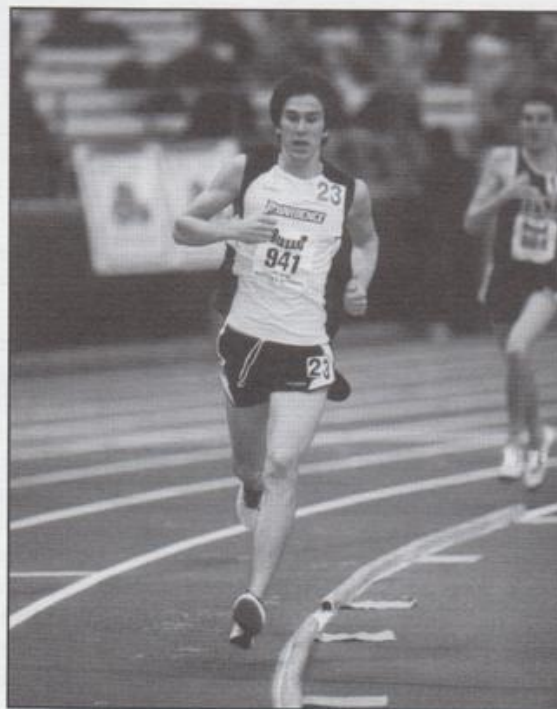

Larry Byrne Earns Nickname As Mr. IC4A

Larry Byrne's illustrious 60-year eastern track odyssey began on a quiet street in the Crown Heights section of his native Brooklyn, where he and other neighborhood kids would gather for fun and games called "foot races."

Little did anyone know this early interest in running would evolve into a career as competitor, coach, official, "guru" of eastern scholastic track, and IC4A Track & Field Administrator.

These monikers best describe the long association Larry Byrne has had with track and field, since taking up the sport seriously as a prep distance runner in 1944 during his "slim youth."

"Larry is a true ambassador of the sport of track and field," said Commissioner of the ECAC, Phil Buttafuoco. "He is an inspirational leader and even after his retirement, continues to be resource and a true friend of the ECAC."

From 1987-2001, Byrne served as Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America (IC4A) Track & Field Administrator, over-seeing men's cross country, indoor and outdoor track & field events for the Eastern College Athletic Conference, which since 1938 has managed its affiliate, the IC4A.

"Larry, in my opinion, knows more about all aspects of track and field than any other individual person alive," said IC4A Track & Field Administrator Steve Bartold, who replaced Byrne and promptly hired him as a game-day official after medical problem forced Byrne to retire his administrator's position. "He is what we would call a 'Track Fanatic.'"

During his formative years, distances were not measured in yards, but in sewers, or man hole covers at regular intervals of about 100 feet or so. The races would be for one, never more than two sewers and Larry often was the victor.

It wasn't until his sophomore year in high school when the running bug manifested itself again, at Van Cortlandt Park, the cross-country "mecca" for New York City high schools, and Eastern colleges. This is where Larry began to appreciate the teamwork and camaraderie that has carried him to a life-long devotion to cross-country, indoor and outdoor track and field.

With the outbreak of the Korean Conflict in 1950, Byrne joined the U. S. Marine Corps. In what turned out to be a military career totaling over 21 years, First Sergeant Byrne retired in 1970, soon after a combat tour in Viet Nam. A civilian career of 18 years followed with Metropolitan Life, in the Property and Services Department in New York City.

During his lengthy stint with the marines, Larry and his wife raised eight children and living on Long Island, he earned the college degree from C. W. Post College in 1968. For the past several years, Byrne has lived in Warwick, R.I., with longtime companion and fellow IC4A championships official Bernice DeMello.

Byrne served as track coach at a Long Island high school for four years, subsequently gravitating into officiating, at both the scholastic and collegiate levels. He became associated with the IC4A as an official in numerous capacities for 10 years, when in August 1987, then ECAC Commissioner Scotty Whitelaw appointed him IC4A Administrator, succeeding retiring Arthur Farnham, who held the position since 1974.



During the 13 years that Larry was a member of the ECAC staff, he served under three Commissioners: Scotty Whitelaw (1987-1989); Chapman (1989-1998) and Phil Buttafuoco (1999-2001).

"He (Byrne) was the glue of the '90s that kept the framework of the IC4A intact," said former ECAC Commissioner Clayton Chapman. "Without question, Larry Byrne, more than any other person in the sport, saved from possible extinction, the glorious life and traditions of the IC4A."

Byrne still devotes countless hours to the world of intercollegiate track, including to serving as color announcer at the Brown Invitational, Dartmouth Relays, Yale Classic, Big East Indoor and Outdoor Championships and National Scholastic Indoor Championship.



He has served as "Recorder of Records" at the USATF Indoor and Outdoor Nationals, NCAA Outdoor Championships, as well as at the Millrose Games, where for 26 years, he has helped select nine competitors from the nation's best scholastic student-athletes for the Boys' Invitational High School One Mile Run.

Larry has collected plenty of hardware during his career, most notably the 2001 IC4A Coaches Association Award, Emery Track and Field Association's "IC4A Man of the Year" Award, the ECAC's 2000 George L. Shiebler Award and the 1987 Jesse Abramson Award, Vita Iis/U. S. Olympic Meet's Executive Council for meritorious service to track and field.

Other top awards presented to Byrne are the *Pathmark Service Award for Outstanding Contributions to High School Track & Field*, Commemorative Plaque from Big East Track Coaches, *Archbishop Molloy - Stanner Games Service Award*, New England College Coaches Association Plaque, Rhode Island High School Track & Field Coaches' Association "Hall of Fame" Award, Collegiate Track & Field Invitational Award and Honorary Carnival Referee of the Penn Relays.

"I have come to know that Larry's work with the IC4A has made my job and others in the future a lot easier in administering this sport to 104 universities and colleges for cross country, indoors and outdoor track & field each year. I thank Larry and Bernice for always being around when I needed them. Larry Byrne is "Mr. IC4A," said Bartold."
