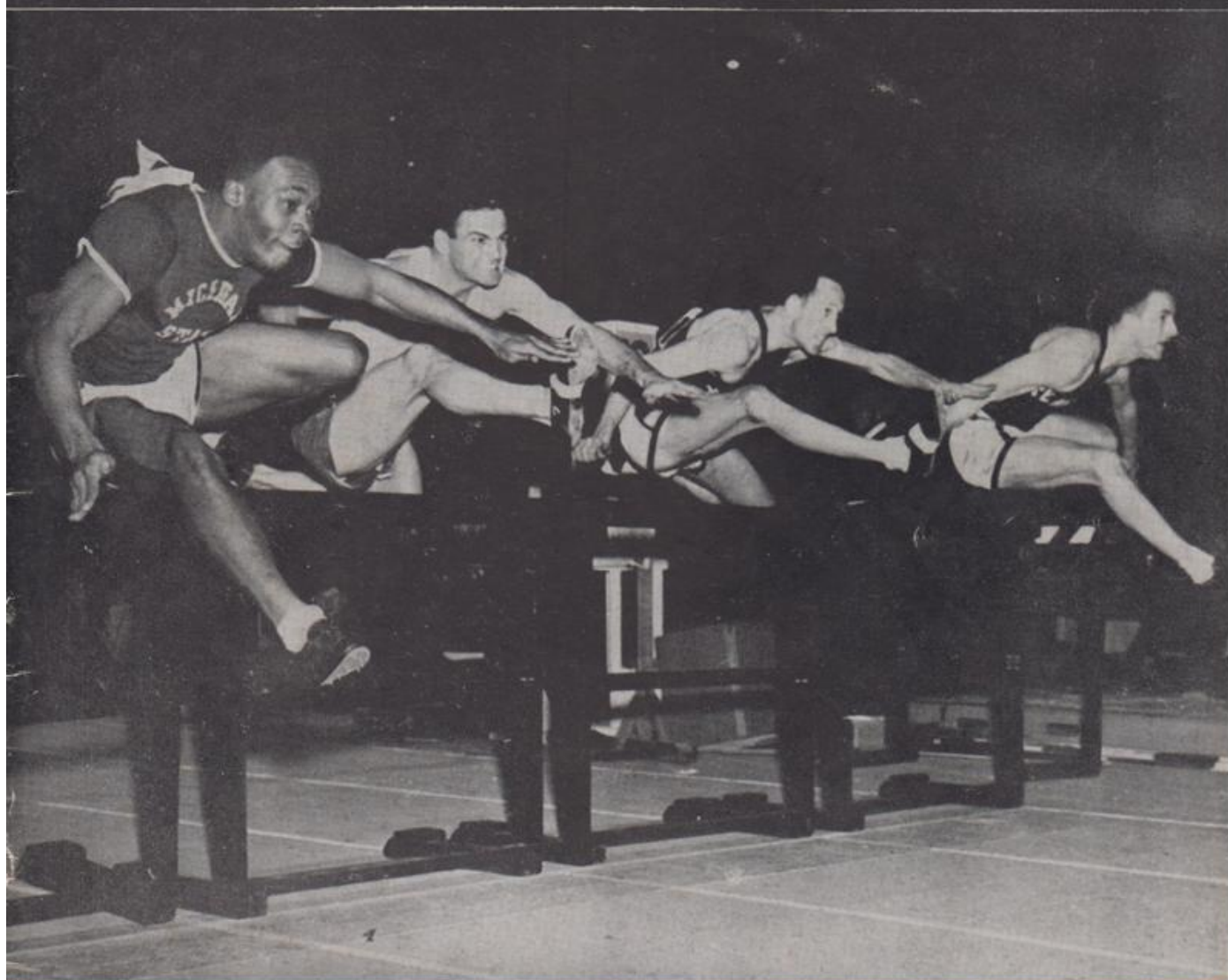

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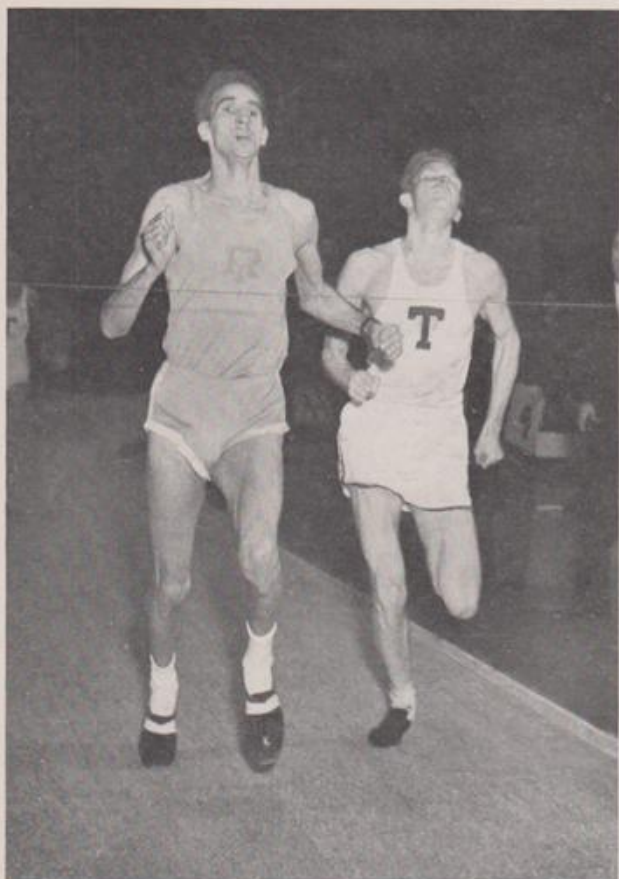

I.C.A.A.A. INVITATION RACES PRODUCED UPSETS

TWO miles! That's top fashion—next to those merry rhubarbs—this hectic indoor track and field season of 1950.

If there was any question, it was eliminated when Asa Bushnell decided it would be his super-special invitation number at the IC4A Championships here at the Garden tonight. It's a grand production bringing together such an assortment of endurance champions as Fred Wilt, Curtis Stone, Horace Ashenfelter, Johnny Joe Barry, Viljo Heino and John Twomey.

You can almost always determine which events were major attractions at varying stages during the past two decades merely by noting what non-varsity specials the intercollegiate people have up on to lure record-conscious customers to their varsity shows. It is an infallible guide unless you run into a season when Bushnell was merely having fun with a race cooked up in his slumbers.

First of Bushnell's dream races came in 1939, when he tossed in Glenn Cunningham against Don Lash. Added to the event were a couple of fill-ins by name of J. Gregory Rice and Tommy Deckard of Indiana.

At the time, Glenn's 4:04.4, run on Dartmouth's elongated plank track in 1938, still stood as the fastest mile in history. Syd Wooderson's outdoor mark was a mere 4:06.4 and Gunder Hagg's 4:01.4 still was six years away. Lash held the indoor double-mile standard of 8:58, unreeled in Boston in 1937.

The Cunningham-Lash dream gallop failed to produce anything close to a new mark, going in 9:11.8. But it provided one of the wildest distance-running finishes seen anywhere. Lash, an Indiana State patrolman at the time, let the Kansas Iron Horse hang in behind a moderate pace. As a result, Glenn had plenty of kick left and got the jump on Don on the bell lap, winning by four feet. Rice, newcomer from Notre Dame, destined to become America's distance boss the following year, finished inches behind the Indiana alumnus.

In 1944, the playful Bushnell took Les Eisenhart, national 1000-yard king from Ohio State; Gil Dodds, mile big wig of the day, and Ollie Hunter, national three-mile king and Notre Dame successor of Rice. He pushed them into the mile to see what would happen. Dodds, the electrical rabbit, ran down in the final quarter, but held off Hunter in 4:10.2.

Nineteen forty-seven saw the ICs give Dodds a crack at the two-mile record. The parson had been making a shambles of his one-mile opposition and Bushnell figured the change might be stimulating. Gil had run 8:53.6 chasing Rice in



1942. Although the Boston strong-boy romped in this particular '47 production, whipping Tommy Quinn and Forest Efav, his clocking was a mere 9:10.1.

The following season, the gilding feature sent Quinn, eight-furlong titlist, up to the two miles against Stone, the three-mile king. Tommy outkicked Curt by a foot in 9:11.1, with Efav and Twomey getting third and fourth.

A year ago a savory hash was served up by mixing the top available half-milers, milers and two-milers in the Louis Zamperini Invitation Mile. Europe's top miler,

Willi Slykhuys of Holland, beaten only by Don Gehrmann, scratched shortly before the race because of an Achilles tendon injury. Twomey did likewise because of a foot infection. But that still left Sweden's Ingvar Bengtsson and Erik Ahlden, France's Marcel Hansenne and the FBI's Wilt.

Bengtsson waved goodbye in the final 220, winning by seven yards in 4:10.2. Wilt, starting belatedly after the Svenska half-miler, passed Hansenne to grab second.

The half-mile in 1928, first of the IC4A specials, saw Lloyd Hahn steam to a new world record of 1:51.4 on the eight-lap banked track at the 168th Street Armory. It was even faster than the outdoor mark. It lasted as the hot-house standard until Long John Woodruff strode 1:47.7 on the giant Dartmouth strip in 1940.

Russell Chapman took a shot at Hahn's mark in '29, on the same oval Lloyd scratched up. He came within a tenth second of hitting the same figures, too.

In 1945, Jim Rafferty took a photo mile decision in 4:16.4 from Forest Efav. The great Hagg, fresh off a slow boat from Sweden, ran fifth and last. His time was all of 4:31.

Next season Leslie MacMitchell ran 4:16 flat whipping Hansenne in the mile. Quinn and Efav were third and fourth.

This year's two mile not only follows the trend of the times, but also could turn into the wildest dream come true for the IC4A czar. It may result in a new world's record.

America never has come up with three such terrific distance runners at the same time as Wilt, Stone and Ashenfelter. Ireland's John Joe Barry and Finland's Viljo Heino, also might have something to say about any possible records. They should be pretty well acclimated to indoor conditions by now. And as for Twomey, you never can tell about him. The Illinois graduate flabbergasted everybody when he won the national outdoor 1500-meter crown last summer.

All out for the two mile!

STREAMLINING THE I.C.A.A.A. MILE

Afternoon Heats Arranged With Stop-watch Qualifying in 600 and 1,000

IN the seventeen years that the Intercollegiate A. A. A. has been running its indoor track and field championships in Madison Square Garden the membership has grown by fifty per cent to sixty-six colleges and the Garden track has remained an inflexible twelve feet wide at its widest.

These facts have presented an increasingly pressing problem to the elder statesmen on the IC4A Games Committee, to the IC4A membership as a whole and the coaches. You could not, on the one hand, guarantee a truly run race with twenty to thirty starters in the mile, for instance, where it was necessary, under the restrictive conditions imposed by a small track, to start the field in three or more lines. A fellow who drew a spot in the last line might just as well go take his shower when Two-Gun Joe Orpen fired his gun. As for the 600 and 1000-yard races you could not begin with a field of thirty to forty starters and arrive at a streamlined final of six or eight men by running qualifying heats in which all the heat winners and all the second place men moved up.

The best track brains were applied to this problem, and last year came up with one solution. The field of milers, even though each college is limited to two starters, was so large that it was decided to split the entry into three sections. All the best milers, based on known performances, were seeded into the third and last section. The first five in each section were timed, and the final IC4A placing was made on comparative times. It was natural that the five leaders in the top seeded third section became the first five in the final order of finish.

As for the huge fields in the 600 and the 1000, even with each college member restricted to two starters, the problem was solved by running not only heats but also semi-finals to arrive at a six-man 600-yard final and an eight-man 1000-yard final.

Thinking those solutions over after the 1949 championships, the coaches and the Games Committee were not satisfied with them. Splitting a championship race into three sections had been the way the sponsors of schoolboy meets had solved the same problem. It was not a perfect solution.

Bob Giegengack, of Yale, president of the IC4A coaches association, and his colleagues on a special committee came up with another idea this year. It is a revolutionary one. Instead of running three sections in the mile, why not



qualifying heats in the mile in the afternoon and a streamlined final of, say, eight or nine at night? Never in the 75-year history of the IC4A—the country's oldest track organization—or in the A.A.U. had heats been run in a mile race. The coaches agreed that mile heats at 1:50 p.m. and a final at 9:40 would be preferable to a three-section final decided on a time basis. It placed the championship on a man-to-man racing basis. Spectators would know who the IC4A mile champion was without waiting for the timers to come out of their huddle.

The Games Committee approved the coaches' suggestion. Today, therefore, in the twenty-ninth annual Intercollegiate you will see a mile race for which all the runners qualified in heats some eight hours before. It adds a bit of a burden on the shoulders of the runners themselves. But not much. Most of the topnotch milers in past IC4A meets have doubled up by running the anchor half-mile leg on the two-mile relay about an hour or less after the mile. Under the new plan of mile heats, a mile finalist will not be able to double up in the relay. This is fine. It will give others a chance to run in the Intercollegiate.

Now we return to the problem of the 600 and the 1000. The coaches decided that three 600s and three 1000s in one day were too taxing for the college runner. The final became a race of endurance rather than of speed. The solution to this problem was more difficult, because it meant a break from a basic IC4A principle. This was that no heat winner should ever be barred from advancing to the next round of heats or to a final.

But the coaches came up with a drastic proposal, forced by the conditions of that inflexibly fixed Garden indoor track. They would do away with semi-finals, in the 600 and 1000 only, by qualifying the six fastest men in the 600-yard trials, and the eight fastest men in the 1000-yard trials regardless of places won.

Qualifying on the watch is unprecedented in track, except, in some instances, where the fastest second or third man has been involved. But qualifying on the watch is the basic procedure in swimming. But in track we have always felt that man-to-man racing was the thing, not racing against the watch. The IC4A is adopting the watch-qualifying method only in the 600 and 1000. It may work out fine. But we'll keep our fingers crossed.

CHARTING THE INTERCOLLEGIATES

SHOULD word ever get around among the horse-playing set about the greater fun there is to be had trying to pick a winner in the Intercollegiates, Asa Bushnell would have to call in the Pinkertons to protect the squatter rights of the Old School Ties.

I've had a deep and abiding affection for this particular track for twenty-five of its twenty-nine years. At the Twenty-Second Engineers Armory, at the Kingsbridge Armory and now at Madison Square Garden, where its spectacular 1934 debut was distinguished by the bifocal track, the elevating winch, the metric system and Gus Kirby on a ladder, the IC4A carnival has been the spiked-shoe show of the year for me.

Outside of the knock-down, drag-out battle for individual and team titles that always have made the Intercollegiates a richly rewarding spectacle, the varsity jamboree has speculative appeal that puts it in the class of the pennant races and the Kentucky Derby.

Predicting the order of finish, from first place all the way down to fifth, has become the habit and most stimulating challenge of the year to every regular writer on the track beat. (Jesse Abramson, our esteemed colleague from that paper on 41st Street undoubtedly will claim to have invented this custom, perhaps with justice.)

At any rate, charting the Intercollegiates is a disease and, for better or worse, we all have it. And believe me, once you become addicted to the "dope" habit, you can't and don't want to break it.

No indignity is humiliating enough to deter the expert who throws himself into the spirit of the thing. A few years back, one of our leading newspapers emblazoned over its prominently-displayed IC4A form chart the following.

"Dope Picks N. Y. U." . . . by L. . . . B. . . .

Was L. B. perturbed at this unflattering personal description? Not at all.

"Did you see the splash they gave me," he chortled, in great glee, at the meet that night.

From the first gun of the indoor season down to the last pre-IC4A finish, the evidence is painstakingly assembled. Out-of-town newspapers, procured at great pains, are scanned for obscure



results, the opinions of coaches and neutral observers are solicited and precedents are carefully weighed.

Finally, all the grist is put into the mill, the wheels go round and out it comes—The Form Chart.

Smart selectors, having spun the wheel, will go off to a movie and let luck determine their fate.

Others, who probably go in for "body english" when they bowl or shoot pool, conscientiously head toward the Hotel Biltmore, where coaches and IC4A officials assemble on Friday night to iron out last-minute details, and promptly are plunged into utter confusion.

"Jones is a cinch to take the mile," asserts Coach A, whose plug never has (and probably never will) broken 4:30.

"I hope you didn't pick Brown," confides Coach B, who has the sprint favorite. "He's got a bad pull."

"Did you hear about Green? He flung it 60 feet last Wednesday," whispers Coach C, referring to some totally unknown weight thrower.

Under the relentless pressure, the firmest convictions quail. So armed with this new misinformation, the harried expert dashes to the nearest phone to make revisions in his tout sheet until the head of the copy desk puts an end to the foolishness by growling:

"If you want this blank thing to get the blank in the blank paper leave it the blank alone!"

So it gets in the paper, only slightly revised, and, you hope, only slightly wrong.

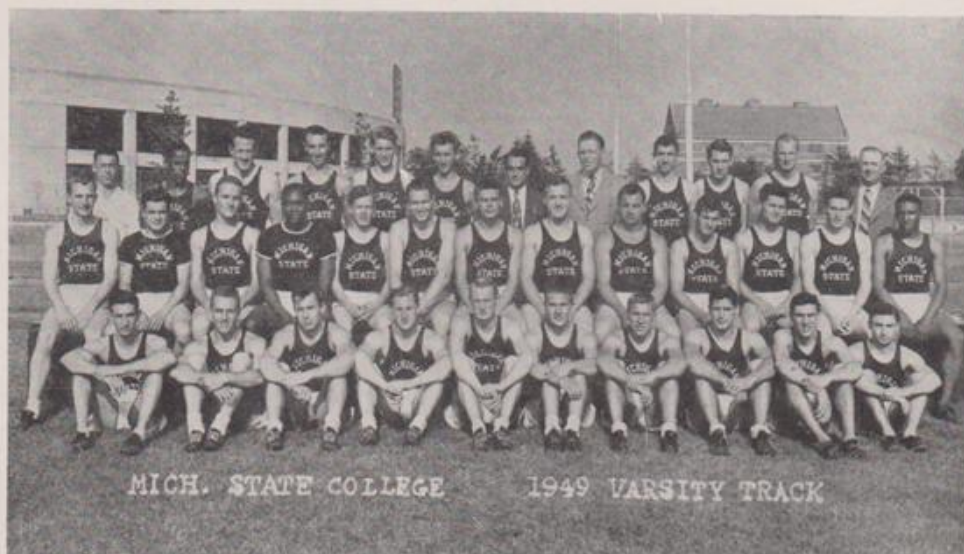
And now, "They're off!" in those wonderfully thrilling Intercollegiate contests and the real fun begins.

A boy in blue slams into the tape in the 600 and three men in the press box jump up, screaming "I had him!" while three others, glum, keep silent.

Then the broad jump results are announced and, upstairs as you cringe, you catch the winner's accusing eye. You didn't "have him" and well you know, if he weren't an IC4A athlete and a gentleman, he would shout, "Ya, ya, ya! Yabumya!"

But if you can take it, and you learn how to, it's one of life's great pleasures to chart the Intercollegiates. Hard as it is, you even manage to call 'em right now and then.

For tonight's best bet, and he'll break a record, too, I give you: Jim Fuchs of Yale.

COLLEGE CHAMPIONS POINT FOR 1952 OLYMPICS

WITH cables arriving from Finland on almost a weekly basis telling of the work going on at Helsinki in preparation for the 1952 Olympic Games, this annual indoor championship meet of the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America appears to be an excellent time to do a little dreaming about the XV Olympiad.

Since no less than 20 IC4A products formed approximately one-third of the U.S. team that walked off with 11 championships and a big edge in the unofficial team score at London in 1948, it is reasonable to assume that several of the athletes who will wear the stars and stripes emblem in 1952 are performing here tonight. And whoever they may be, it is in order to point out that they have a special task to perform. The 1948 Games marked the first time when an IC4A athlete failed to win an individual Olympic crown since the international competition was revived at Athens in 1896.

Yale's superb pair of hardware heavers, Jim Fuchs and Vic Frank, along with Villanova's diminutive Browning Ross are the only 1948 Olympians in tonight's championships. Although all three are seniors, chances are good that they will remain active to bid for the 1952 team.

Fuchs was the third place man in the U.S. sweep of the shot put at London, but since then has become the all-time world's best in his event. This 23-year-old Chicagoan has staked claims to every listed universal shot put record.

Ross, who runs any distance from 440 yards to 10 miles, cast his lot with the steeplechasers and wound up seventh in the final. Frank, unable to hit his peak form, failed to make the discus final.

Of the remaining athletes on hand tonight, two are so outstanding in their outdoor events that they rate more than consideration as Olympians. If there were such a thing as pre-Olympic betting similar to the Kentucky Derby's Winter book, Seton Hall's Andy Stanfield would be the sprint favorite and Cornell's Charley Moore would head the 400-meter hurdlers.

Winner of his first major sprint crown in this meet last year, Stanfield is today's "world's fastest human." A 21-year-old junior, this effortless speedster should be at his peak for the Helsinki invasion. Outdoors last Summer, Andy racked up twin triumphs in the IC4A and National AAU championships and then went abroad to beat Europe's best.

Already the holder of the IC4A outdoor 220-yard record, Stanfield has the speed necessary to make the sprint records book resemble his family's album.



Moore's case is almost identical. Fourth in this meet's 600 last year, Charley started off the outdoor campaign with a record-breaking hurdles victory in the Penn Relays. For a windup, this offspring of a former timber-topping titlist annexed the NCAA 440-yard crown and swept the National AAU senior and junior 400-meter hurdles title.

Like Stanfield, Charley also is a junior. Barring the unforeseen, he should succeed Roy Cochran as the Olympic 400-meter hurdles champion and wipe out the Californian's record of 51.1 seconds.

Both of these standouts have teammates who rate Olympic consideration. Cornell offers Bob Mealey and Meredith Gourdine. The promising Setonians are Charley Slade and Phil Thigpen. Mealey and Thigpen bid for our 1948 team. Bob fell in the 800-meter semi-final and Phil lacked the endurance to qualify in the steeplechase final.

The title-defending Michigan State squad has its share of standouts. Both Fred Johnson and Jesse Thomas loom as broad jumping luminaries, Horace Smith's hurdling speed rates consideration, Warren Druetzler and Jack Dianetti are middle-distance threats and Bill Mack has potentialities for the distance events.

While Stanfield appears to be the only sprinter worthy of a limb-sitting job, the hurdles in addition to Smith offer Penn State's Jim Gehrdes and Dartmouth's Pete McCreary. The mile field has a trio of possibilities in Yale's George Wade, Penn's Tom Kirwan and Princeton's Ronnie Wittreich.

Manhattan's Bill Lucas, Tuft's Fred Schoeffler and Dick Church of Syracuse are two-milers who may develop as 5,000-meter prospects.

While another outdoor campaign will have to roll around for a true line on field event possibilities, those already mentioned are by no means the only hopefuls. Although an injury has cost him several gold medals this Winter, Dick Phillips of Brown still is the high jumper to watch. The vaulters do leave a little to be desired but several of the young huskies who threw the 35-pound weight this afternoon can be counted on to develop as hammer throwers.

Last but far from least is the medley relay for freshmen. Here is an event that always gives advance tips on future stars.

The crop is plentiful. The IC4A should have little trouble reestablishing its custom of supplying an individual Olympic winner and maintaining its high percentage of U.S. team members.

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RESUME OF PAST I.C.A.A.A.A. INVITATION RACES

Winners of past special invitation races sponsored by the I.C.A.A. at the Indoor Championships follow:

1928 (Eight-Lap Banked Track in 102nd Engineers Armory)—Lloyd Hahn raced 880 yards in 1:51.4, eclipsing all records, indoors and out.

1931 (Same Track)—Russell Chapman ran 880 yards in 1:51.5.

1939 (Madison Square Garden)—Glenn Cunningham, in his only major two-mile race, defeated Don Lash, Greg Rice and Tommy Deckard in 9:11.8.

1944—Gil Dodds, tying up badly in last quarter, ran 4:10.2 mile, defeating Ollie Hunter, national three-mile champion, and Les Eisenhart, national 1000-yard champion.

1945—Gunder Hagg, fifty hours off the boat after 23-day freighter voyage from Sweden, ran 4:31 and finished last in mile race won by Jim Rafferty by half a foot from Forest Efaw in 4:16.4.

1946—Leslie MacMitchell, who never had lost an I.C.A.A. mile or cross-country race, defeated Marcel Hansenne, of France, by twelve yards in 4:16 mile. Tommy Quinn, third; Efaw, fourth.

1947—Dodds, having won four straight mile races, moved up to the two-mile for a 9:10.1 victory over Quinn and Efaw. Dodds, in 1942, had run 8:53.6 and 8:53.7 behind Rice; he never broke nine minutes by himself.

Eddie Walsh, Manhattan graduate, won 1000 in 2:13.8, with Leslie MacMitchell beaten a foot and Sweden's Rune Gustafsson fifth.

1948—Tommy Quinn, fresh from his first National A.A.U. mile victory, upset Curtis Stone, newly crowned A.A.U. three-mile champion, by one foot in 9:11.1 two-mile. Efaw, third; John Twomey, fourth.

1949—Ingvar Bengtsson of Sweden won the Third Louis S. Zamperini Invitation mile in 4:10.2. Fred Wilt of the New York A.C. was second; Francis Marcel Hansenne, third; and Erik Ahlden of Sweden, fourth.

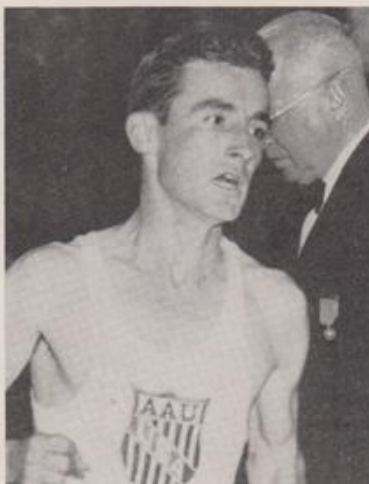

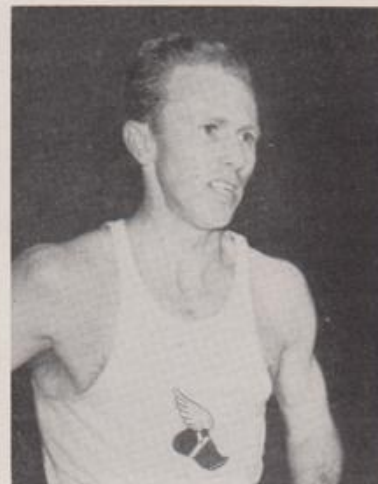

75TH ANNIVERSARY OF I.C.A.A.A. TO BE CELEBRATED IN 1951

The I.C.A.A.A.A. will celebrate its seventy-fifth anniversary in 1951 and the Executive Committee is already making plans to celebrate the occasion with suitable ceremonies particularly during the 1951 outdoor track and field championships.

The organization was an outgrowth of a special two-mile run open to the athletes from the eleven colleges competing in the Saratoga Rowing Regatta of 1873. The interest in these running events became so great that in 1875 the I.C.A.A.A.A. was born and the inaugural meet conducted in connection with the crew events was held on July 20-21 at Saratoga, New York.

Amherst, Bowdoin, Brown, C.C.N.Y., Columbia, Cornell, Dartmouth, Harvard, Princeton, Trinity, Union, Wesleyan, Williams and Yale were the charter members of the Association. They were all represented along with the University of Pennsylvania in the first outdoor meet. Oddly enough the events included two walking races, baseball throw, and a mile run and mile walk for graduates. Four years later they added a bicycle race and a tug-of-war contest.

The 50th anniversary meet was held on May 28-29, 1926 at Harvard.

The 75th anniversary committee appointed by President William J. Bingham, Harvard, is made up of Chairman H. Jamison Swarts, Pennsylvania; Gustavus T. Kirby, Columbia; Thomas F. Lennon, Pennsylvania; S. de J. Osborne, Harvard; George L. Shiebler, Eastern College Athletic Conference; and Earl R. Yeomans, Temple.
