FIRST ANNUAL INDOOR GAMES

OR the first time in its history the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America held an indoor meet in Madison Square Garden on Saturday night, March 6, 1915. The purpose of the meet was not to settle any championship, but rather to bring together the athletes of the various colleges of the Association in friendly competition. The program was restricted to events of a team or relay character and all at odd distances. There were six relay races for teams of five men each.

An odd feature of the meet, but one which aroused much interest, was the addition of three field events, the shot put, pole vault and high jump, for teams of five men. The individual performances of each team were averaged and the team with the best average adjudged the winner. The meet was well attended in spite of the fact that New York that night was in the grip of one of the worst blizzards that had visited it in years. Romeyn Berry, of Cornell, managed the meet. After the games a buffet luncheon was served to competing and former athletes and the officials. The results of the meet follow:


