

FORTIETH INTERCOLLEGIATE CHAMPIONSHIPS

CORNELL UNIVERSITY won the fortieth annual track and field championship meeting of the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America, held on Franklin Field, Philadelphia, Pa., May 28 and 29, 1915, with 45½ points.

Thus Cornell secured the first leg on the new championship cup.

Harvard was second with 26 points, Yale third with 25, while Pennsylvania and Princeton tied for fourth with 21 points each. The other teams scored as follows: Dartmouth, 14; Michigan, 14; Columbia, 10; Maine, 9; Pennsylvania State College, 6; Johns Hopkins, 1½; Mass. Institute of Technology, 1; Bowdoin, 1.

Two intercollegiate records were broken. In the running high jump Wesley Oler, of Yale, cleared the bar at 6 feet 4½ inches, breaking the previous record of 6 feet 3¼ inches made by T. Moffit, of Pennsylvania, at Cambridge, Mass., June 1, 1907. A. W. Richards, of Cornell, who finished second, also broke the previous record with a jump of 6 feet 3½ inches. Oler's jump likewise created a new collegiate record, displacing the mark of 6 feet 4 inches made by W. B. Page, of Pennsylvania, in 1886, twenty-nine years earlier. In the hammer throw, H. P. Bailey, of the University of Maine, made a new intercollegiate mark of 165 feet ¾ inch. This bettered the record of J. R. DeWitt, of Princeton, made at New York on May 31, 1902.

One record was equaled, that being in the 440 yards dash in which J. E. Meredith, of Pennsylvania, did 48 seconds flat, the same time made by C. D. Reidpath, of Syracuse, on June 1, 1912. It should be noted, however, that this year for the first time the intercollegiate rules provided that the track be measured twelve inches from the pole instead of eighteen inches as heretofore. The new measurement compelled all the runners in the 440 yards, 880 yards, mile and two-mile events to run slightly further than under the old system of measurement. Another change in the rules of competition was that in the field events the number of trials in both the preliminaries and finals was increased from three to six, with the provision that they be taken in series of two each.

Ideal weather conditions favored the athletes on both days. Although it was warm on the day of the finals, threatening weather kept down the attendance to about 7,000. The meet was held on Franklin Field, through the courtesy of the University of Pennsylvania, and was managed by J. Hamilton Cheston.

100 YARDS DASH

H. L. Smith, of the University of Michigan, won the 100 yards dash in 10 seconds flat. He won his preliminary heat in 10½ seconds and was second to E. A. Teschner, of Harvard, in the first semi-final heat, which was also run in 10½ seconds. Outside of the final there was only one heat run in 10 seconds, that being the first preliminary, which was won by Teschner. In the final Smith beat Teschner by about a yard, the Harvard man finishing ahead of H. H. Ingersoll, of Cornell, by only a few inches. Less than a foot also separated H. I. Treadway, of Yale, and J. L. Foley, of Harvard, who were fourth and fifth. H. E. O'Brien, of Michigan, who was sixth, failed to score by about two feet. D. F. Lippincott, of Pennsylvania, pulled a tendon in his preliminary heat and was obliged to drop out of competition.

After winning the 100 yards dash, H. L. Smith, of Michigan, won the 220 yards dash in 22 seconds. The Michigan man led all the way and had an advantage of a yard and a half at the finish. As in the 100 yards, Teschner, of Harvard, was second; H. I. Treadway, of Yale, was third, about a yard back of Teschner, with J. E. Lockwood and J. C. Patterson, both of Pennsylvania, fourth and fifth. J. L. Foley, of Harvard, started in the final heat, but did not finish. The fastest heat in this event was the first preliminary, which J. C. Patterson, of Pennsylvania, won in $21\frac{4}{5}$ seconds.

440 YARDS DASH

J. E. Meredith, of Pennsylvania, won the 440 yards dash and equaled the intercollegiate record of 48 seconds, established by C. D. Reidpath, of Syracuse, on the same track in 1912. W. Willcox, of Harvard, was second about four yards back and two yards ahead of V. M. Wilkie, of Yale. H. J. Richardson, of Princeton, was fourth and E. C. Riley, of Dartmouth, fifth. The race started at the head of the 220 yards course and finished at the head of the back stretch, thus giving only one turn. Meredith did not take the lead until the runners had gone 200 yards; then he went to the front and led the remainder of the way. The first and third preliminary heats, won by W. D. Crim, of Cornell, and F. Lagay, of Dartmouth, were run in 51 seconds. W. Willcox, of Harvard, won the second heat in $49\frac{4}{5}$ seconds.

880 YARDS RUN

After winning the 440 yards dash, Meredith, of Pennsylvania, won the half mile run in 1 minute $54\frac{2}{5}$ seconds. It was the first time since 1884 that any runner had ever won both these events in a single meet and the only time it has ever been accomplished since preliminary heats were run in both. There was 1 hour 10 minutes between the two races. In this race Meredith did not set the pace after the first 200 yards. He relinquished it to Speiden, of Cornell, who led until the last 220 yards, when Meredith sprinted and the two men ran neck and neck until 100 yards from the tape, when Meredith took the lead, which he increased to about five yards at the finish. M. J. Hayes, of Princeton, was third, F. W. Capper, of Harvard, fourth and S. M. Cooley, of Princeton, fifth. Both of the preliminary heats were fast, M. J. Hayes, of Princeton, winning the first in 1 minute 58 seconds and L. V. Windnagle, of Cornell, the second in 1 minute $57\frac{3}{5}$ seconds.

ONE MILE RUN

I. D. Mackenzie, of Princeton, won the mile in 4 minutes $22\frac{4}{5}$ seconds. There were twenty-five starters. The pacemakers changed several times during the first quarter, Hartman, of Pennsylvania, leading at this point in $60\frac{1}{5}$ seconds. Barr, of Princeton, led at the half mile, followed closely by Windnagle, of Cornell, and Mackenzie, of Princeton, the time being $2.10\frac{4}{5}$. Tucker, of Dartmouth, took command on the third lap, which he finished with a lead of ten yards in $3.20\frac{4}{5}$. The race between Mackenzie and Windnagle did not develop until the last 200 yards of the final quarter, when both passed Tucker. Windnagle took the lead and held it until 50 yards from the finish, when Mackenzie's sprint took him over the line a winner by a yard and a half. H. L. Carroll, of Michigan, was third, S. K. Atha, of Princeton, fourth and H. E. Irish, of Cornell, fifth. C. L. Speiden, of Cornell, who won this event in 1914, did not start, saving himself for the half mile.

D. F. Potter, of Cornell, won the two mile run in 9 minutes $27\frac{1}{5}$ seconds. J. W. Overton, of Yale, acted as pacemaker and led the field for the first five laps with Potter and J. S. Hoffmire, of Cornell, close up. During the sixth lap Potter succeeded in passing Overton and gradually increased his lead until he finished thirty yards ahead of Overton. Hoffmire made up a good deal of ground on the last lap and was only ten yards back of Overton at the finish. H. Holden, of Yale, was fourth and F. L. Cook, of the M. I. T., fifth.

R. B. Ferguson, of the University of Pennsylvania, won the 120 yards hurdles in $15\frac{2}{5}$ seconds. Cornell scored three places, with F. H. Starr, who was second, L. E. Gubb fourth and A. L. Lukens fifth. E. P. Hammitt, of Pennsylvania State College, was third. The first three preliminary heats were run in $15\frac{1}{5}$ seconds, the fourth in $15\frac{3}{5}$ seconds and the fifth in $16\frac{1}{5}$ seconds. Both of the semi-final heats, won by L. E. Gubb, of Cornell, and R. B. Ferguson, of Pennsylvania, were run in $15\frac{3}{5}$ seconds. In the final heat Ferguson began to draw away from his competitors at about the fourth hurdle, but he had a lead of hardly two feet at the finish. Starr was half a yard ahead of Hammitt, who just beat out Gubb. Lukens was distanced, having tripped over the fourth hurdle. However, he finished the race.

Although he did not win any of the preliminary heats and had to run over with the second and third men to get into the semi-finals, A. W. Stewart, of Princeton, improved so much with each heat that he won the final heat in $24\frac{2}{5}$ seconds. H. St. J. Smith, of Harvard, was second, D. M. Brown, of Pennsylvania, State College, third, F. L. Brady, of Columbia, fourth, and R. L. Crawford, of Princeton, fifth. Only one of the preliminary heats was run in better than 25 seconds, that being the third, which Brady, of Columbia, won in $24\frac{4}{5}$ seconds. R. B. Ferguson, of Pennsylvania, who won the low hurdles in 1914, tripped and fell over the first hurdle in his preliminary heat. He recovered himself and managed to finish third. He was obliged to run over almost immediately with the second and third men to qualify for the semi-finals, and could not qualify.

Wesley M. Oler, of Yale, won the running high jump with a leap of 6 feet $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches. This broke the intercollegiate record of 6 feet $3\frac{1}{4}$ inches made by T. Moffit, of Pennsylvania, at Cambridge, June 1, 1907, and was also half an inch better than the collegiate record of 6 feet 4 inches made by W. Byrd Page, of Pennsylvania, in 1886, just twenty-nine years earlier. A. W. Richards, of Cornell, was second with 6 feet $3\frac{1}{4}$ inches, also breaking the previous intercollegiate mark. J. O. Johnstone, of Harvard, was third with 6 feet $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch, D. A. McLaren, of Cornell, and G. C. Connolly, of Johns Hopkins, tied for fourth with 5 feet $11\frac{3}{8}$ inches.

The competition between Oler and Richards for first place was exceptionally keen. Oler failed on his first two trials at 6 feet $\frac{1}{2}$ inch, but cleared it on his third trial. Richards missed this height on his first attempt only. Both men cleared 6 feet $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches on their first trial. When the bar was put up to 6 feet $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches, Oler cleared it on his second attempt, Richards on the third. The bar was then raised to 6 feet $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches. Oler missed on the first attempt, but cleared it the second time. Richards missed on each of his three trials. Oler then tried three times at 6 feet $5\frac{1}{4}$ inches, but failed each time.

POLE VAULT

The pole vault resulted in a triple tie between M. L. Greeley, of Harvard, F. K. Foss, of Cornell, and L. Carter, of Yale, at 12 feet. These three men, with K. C. Curtis, of Syracuse, J. A. Baker, of Princeton, and H. E. Wilson, all qualified for the finals by clearing 12 feet in the preliminaries. But in the finals Greeley, Foss and Carter were the only ones who could again clear 12 feet. Baker took fourth with 11 feet 6 inches and Wilson fifth with 11 feet. Curtis withdrew on account of a strained tendon. In the finals Greeley and Carter cleared every height on their first attempt until 12 feet was reached. This Carter cleared on his first attempt after one balk, while Greeley had two tries and one balk before he was successful. Foss failed twice at 11 feet 9 inches before getting over, but cleared 12 feet on his first attempt. All three men failed at 12 feet 3 inches.

RUNNING BROAD JUMP

H. T. Worthington, of Dartmouth, won the running broad jump with 23 feet $9\frac{1}{4}$ inches, nearly a foot better than his nearest competitor, S. E. Graham, of Columbia, who was second with 22 feet $9\frac{5}{8}$ inches. Curiously enough, all five point winners made their best jumps in the preliminaries. Worthington made his winning jump on his sixth trial in the preliminaries. It is worthy of note that in his twelve jumps in the preliminaries and the finals Worthington did not foul once. His twelve jumps in their order were 22.10 $\frac{1}{4}$, 22.11 $\frac{1}{2}$, 23.03 $\frac{1}{2}$, 23.02 $\frac{1}{4}$, 23.04 $\frac{3}{4}$, 23.09 $\frac{3}{4}$, 22.05 $\frac{3}{4}$, 23.03 $\frac{3}{8}$, 22.08 $\frac{1}{8}$, 22.08 $\frac{7}{8}$, 22.02 $\frac{5}{8}$, 22.04. French, of Maine, who was third with 22 feet $7\frac{1}{4}$ inches, also did not foul in his twelve jumps. A. W. Richards, of Cornell, who was fourth with 22 feet 6 inches, jumped but once in the finals. M. L. Frederick, of Dartmouth, was fifth with 22 feet 3 inches.
