FORTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL TRACK AND FIELD CHAMPIONSHIP MEETING.

The Executive Committee, after its election and pursuant to Article XVI of the Constitution, selected a Referee for the Forty-seventh Annual Track and Field Championship Meeting in the person of Mr. Gustavus T. Kirby of Columbia University, and from the list of officials nominated by him selected those who acted as such when the games were held on Franklin Field, Philadelphia, Pa., on Friday and Saturday, May 25 and 26, 1923, respectively; and the Committee, pursuant to the same Article, selected an Undergraduate Manager for the Meeting in the person of Mr. Richard J. Kearns of University of Pennsylvania, who in turn appointed Mr. Ernest B. Cozens as Graduate Manager to act in co-operation with him.

Pursuant to Article IX of the Constitution, the Executive Committee appointed a Graduate Secretary-Treasurer in the person of Mr.A. Jocelyn

H. Magrath of New York University.

Pursuant to Article IX of the Constitution, the President, immediately after his election, appointed an Advisory Committee, consisting of Mr. Gustavus T. Kirby, Columbia, Chairman; Mr. Arthur H. Eaton, California; Mr. Rupert B. Thomas Jr., Princeton; Mr. Meredith J. House, Leland Stanford, and Mr. A. C. Gilbert, Yale. Upon the death of Mr. Eaton, Mr. Lloyd W. Georgeson became the representative of California.
