TWELFTH ANNUAL INDOOR CHAMPIONSHIP ATHLETIC MEETING

The Twelfth Indoor Meeting was held for the second time at the 258th Field Artillery Regiment Armory in the Brons, New York City, on March 4, 1933. From the standpoint of the number of spectators, probably no day in the year could be more unfortunate, because it was the first day of the so-called "Bank Holiday," with the result that, while the advance sale of tickets had been normal, there were several thousand less spectators at the meet than the previous year.

After a year's experience with the armory, it was possible to improve many of the provisions having to do with the handling of spectators and the convenience of athletes. Great care was taken to keep the floor clear from athletes who had finished their events and others who had no duties to perform and in this respect the floor was probably the clearest of any Indoor Meet.

Plans had been laid providing for scientifically designed curves after the manner of railroad curves, but the difficulty of procuring the armory for making the necessary changes compelled a postponement of their installation. The track was the same as that used last year. This year is the last year of the distances measured in yards. The meet next year will be with events measured in metric distances.

A marked innovation and one that immediately proved its value was the taking of slow motion pictures and the timing of the races by the Kirby Camera Timer. The first important test was the 70-yard hurdles, where four men finished within 8 inches of each other and all six finished within a foot and a half

of the winner, which in the experience of a great many of the older officials, was the closest race ever seen in this coun-The judges postponed their final decision until they could have an opportunity to see the pictures and announced only a temporary decision. The necessity for having sufficient light over the finish line to take these pictures from the gallery proved to be an unexpected advantage for the spectators. The finish of every race was so brightly illuminated that it was readily possible for all spectators to see the finish clearly. This was the first meet in which official motion pictures were taken indoors. Experiments had been tried at several meets and the details workd out so that when it came to the Intercollegiate Meet the pictures were highly successful.

The difficulty in handling the admission of spectators to the armory was completely avoided by the use of three entrance doors and an increased number of guards and ticket takers and sellers.

Spectators have become used to the breaking of records. This year four out of twelve records were replaced. The first one to go was in the 70-yard dash, where Richard Bell, of M. I. T., lowered the record which had stood for ten years from 7.1 seconds to 7 seconds flat though the Electric Timer did not agree with the announced time. Joseph P. Mc-Cluskey, of Fordham, as is his habit, again reduced the two-mile run from 9 minutes 17.6 seconds to 9 minutes 16.2 seconds. The University of Pennsylvania One Mile Relay Team, running true to expectations, lowered the relay record from 3 minutes 17.8 seconds to 3 minutes 17 second flat. The record had previously been held by both Pennsylvania and New York University. Only one field event succumbed and that was in the pole vault, where Wirt L. Thompson, of Yale, and Keith S. Brown, of Yale, tied for first place with 13 feet 934 inches.

70 YARD HURDLES

The final of this race was of the kind to sorely distress any group of judges, the like of which has seldom, if ever, been seen. The first four men were certainly not more than inches apart and fifth and sixth men were practically even and not more than a foot and a half behind the winner. George S. Lockwood, of Yale, the expected and final winner, was the only place which did not furnish good grounds for debate. The race was won in 8.8 seconds, which seems to be the customary time for the finals, this having been the time in six out of ten of the races. After long debate, the judges announced that no final decision would be made until the films of the finish had been inspected. They gave a temporary decision, but after viewing the pictures, this decision was changed as to the places after first.

TWO MILE RUN

The two mile run was the only race that furnished a procession. Joseph P. McCluskey, of Fordham, twice holder of the Indoor record and two time winner of the Outdoor Meet, ran his own race undisturbed and unconcerned to finish in the new record time of 9 minutes 16.2 seconds. The nearest man to him, John J. Ryan, of Manhattan, was just a quarter of a lap behind with George H. Barker, of N. Y. U., 50 yards to the rear and Arthur Foote, of Harvard, and Frank J. Lepreau, of Dartmouth, spaced 30 and 10 yards apart. This was one of the few races in the Intercollegiate Meets where a number of men were lapped, but the winner's time is the explanation for it.

This race gave promise of being a sensational finish between Pennsylvania and New York University. Pennsylvania ran with three of the men who had broken the record in 1931 and with William A. Carr a vastly improved man since that time. New York University had two of the men who broke the record last year and two who were as good as those replaced. Most unfortunately a few yards after the start of the race the N. Y. U.



first man dropped his baton, stopped and fumbled around for it until N. Y. U.'s chances were completely obliterated. From start to finish Pennsylvania's team slowly and uniformly increased their lead to win by 20 yards over Harvard. Manhattan, in third position, was 28 yards behind, followed by Yale and Holy Cross by 1 yard and 25 yards respectively.

TWO MILE RELAY

This event unexpectedly furnished the sensational race of the evening. Both Princeton and Columbia were known to have good teams. Columbia started the third relay with a lead of about 20 yards with William A. Patterson leading William R. Bonthron. Bonthron, using rare good judgment in pace, little more than held his own for the first lap, then gradually drew up on Patterson until about the end of the back stretch he was right at Patterson's shoulder. From that point on, running wide around the turn, he gradually drew ahead to win by 5 yards. Manhattan in third, Boston in fourth and Yale in fifth place were respectively 31, 35 and 77 yards behind. This was the second fastest two mile relay run at the Meet.
