Feb. 23—Horace Ashenfelter ran the two miles in 9:14.9 to break the only record of the meet as New York University defended its IC4A title.

Ashenfelter's 80 yard victory gave Penn State a double in the distances with Gerry Karver romping to a win in the mile in 4:22.7. These 10 points, plus another three and one half, put Penn State in fourth place behind N.Y.U., 31¹/₂; Yale, 23¹/₄; and Manhattan, 18.

Four of five defending champions were successful in their attempts to repeat. Karver was one and was joined by Joe Clancibella, of Manhattan, winner of the photo-finish 60 in 6.3; Herb Douglas, of Pittsburgh, victor in the broad jump at 24-¹/₄; and Irv Mondschein of N.Y.U., who tied for first with Bill Vessie of Columbia in the high jump at 6-6.

Biggest upset of the evening came in a special two-mile race in which Tommy Quinn, fresh off his A.A.U. mile victory, edged Curtis Stone in 9:11.1. It was Quinn's first major two mile triumph and was achieved by a foot over Stone who has a 9:04.2 performance this year.

Joe Hall of Rhode Island State pulled a big surprise when he captured the 600 in 1:13.2 after favorites Jack Hammack of Army and Jack Tulp of Seton Hall were eliminated in the semi-finals.

Other winners were: 1000 yards Pearman, N.Y.U., 2:16.0; 60 yd. high hurdles, Cook, Yale, 7.5; pole vault, Potochnik, Marquette, 13-4; 35 pound weight, Marsanskis, Maine, 56-11; shot put, Fuchs, Yale, 52-9⁵/₈.

New York, Feb. 28 (AP).—Reggie Pearman of New York University avenged last week's defeat by edging Phil Thigpen of Seton Hall tonight in the 1000-yard run at the IC4A indoor track and field championships.

Pearman, national outdoor 800-meeter champion, had only inches to spare at the finish of the six-and-a-quarter turns around the 160-yard track which he completed in 2:16 flat.

Thigpen, who upset Pearman last week at the same distance in the

National AAU indoor meet, also barely grabbed second place from Tom Comerford of Manhattan, who came on fast in the stretch but couldn't fight his way through between the leaders.

Jerry Connolly of Fordham was fourth, Phil O'Connell of Manhattan fifth and Dave Smith of Georgetown sixth in the eight-man final run before some 12,000 fans in Madison Square Garden.

Pearman started off in seventh place as Comerford took the lead, only to yield it to Thigpen after one lap. Smith took command in the second lap but Pearman moved up steadily and shot in front with three laps to go.

He stayed ahead the rest of the way, although both Thigpen and Comerford made up plenty of ground in the last 100 yards.

Thigpen ran the race under an anonymous protest, his eligibility having been questioned after the preliminaries.

Joe Cianciabella of Manhattan successfully defended his 60-yard dash title in 6.3 seconds as the five men in the finals finished only inches apart.

Bill Brooks of Wesleyan was second, followed by Walt Newman of Dartmouth, Ira Kaplan of NYU and John Schulze of Colgate in that order.

George Cook of Yale won the 60-yard high hurdles in 7.5 seconds, beating George Sylvester of Army by a step as defending champion Warren Halliburton of New York University ran third.

N. Y. U. TRACK TEAM REPEATS FOR TITLE IN I. C. 4-A GAMES

Captures Crown for 6th Time
Since 1929 With 31½ Points
—Yale, 23¼, Is Second

TWO STAR FOR THE VIOLET

Mondschein and Pearman Set
Pace—Ashenfelter Better
Meet Two-Mile Record

Coming through with high inspirational fervor, in some cases against heavy odds, New York University hit the jackpot again in the twenty-seventh annual indoor track and field championships of the Intercollegiate A. A. A. at Madison Square Garden last night.

Paced by the stalwart performances of Irving Mondschein and Reginald Pearman, Coach Emil Von Elling's Violet squad scored in nine of the thirteen events to roll up a total of 31½ points. It was a repeat triumph for N. Y. U. and the sixth time since 1929 that the local school has led the field in the varsity classic.

Yale, a growing power under the regime of Bob Giegengack, was primed to sneak home if the Violets withered under the pressure of the rousing competition among the selected athletes of forty-one colleges. But N. Y. U. held as steady as a rock against the threat.

So the Elis, whose bag of three titles was high for any one school, had to settle for second place at 23¼ points, ahead of Manhattan, 18, Penn State, 13¼, Army, 12¼, Rhode Island State, 11¼, and Fordham, 10.

Four Retain Honors

One of the four 1947 individual champions who repeated, the versatile Mondschein tied with Columbia's Bill Vessie at 6 feet 6 inches in the high jump and also placed third in the broad jump for a personal contribution of seven-and-a-half points to the Violet cause.

Avenging his loss of the national title last week to Phil Thigpen, Pearman turned the tables on his Seton Hall rival by winning a hair-raising decision in the 1,000-yard run. As if this were not enough, big Reggie later returned to the track to anchor N. Y. U.'s mile relay team to third place.

Stanley Lampert, in the shot put, and Armand Osterberg, in the two-mile run, scored seconds for N. Y. U. Warren Halliburton, in the 60-yard high hurdles, and Jim Gilhooley, in the 600-yard run, contributed thirds, and Ira Kaplan, in the 60-yard dash, chipped in with a fourth.

For their efforts, Halliburton and Kaplan rated special praise. Halliburton, 1947 timber-topping champion, had been on the shelf for a month with a leg infection. Kaplan had spent the whole week in bed with the grippe.

Seton Hall Disqualified

Yale's winners were George Cook, a stylish victor in the hurdles in 0:07.5; Sophomore Jim Fuchs, who flung the shot 52 feet 9 $\frac{5}{8}$ inches on his last throw to beat Lampert, and the mile relay team of Richard Burdick, Henry Stoltman, Scott Paradise and Edward Lucke, which was credited with a 3:22.4 triumph when Seton Hall, home first, was disqualified.

Penn State made a sweep of the two distance races, Horace Ashenfelter setting a championship mark of 9:14.9 in the two-mile run after Gerald Karver, outdoor "triple crown" champion, had repeated his 1947 mile triumph in an easy-going 4:22.7.

Manhattan also won two titles. Little Joe Cianciabella, lunging forward at the tape, retained his 60-yard honors and the quartet of John Moran, Arthur Sullivan, Jim Cavanaugh and Ignatius Rienzo came through in 7:58 in the two-mile relay.

The 12,000 spectators were not too sure that the tiny Cianciabella beat big Bill Brooks of Wesleyan to the tape in the dash, but the judges cast their votes for the Jasper flier and the Bulova phototimer, in service officially for the first time, confirmed their decision.

Also crowned as champions were Joe Hall of Rhode Island State, who survived three rounds of cut-throat competition to take the final of the 600-yard run in 1:13.2; Herbert Douglas of Pittsburgh, who repeated in the broad jump with a leap of 24 feet $\frac{1}{4}$ inch and Marquette's Roy Potochnik, who came on alone from the Midwest to clear 13-4 in the pole vault.

George Marsanskis of Maine won the 35-pound weight-throw

title at the Squadron A Armory in the afternoon with a mighty toss of 56 feet 11 inches.

The race of the night was the 1,000. This was a wild-jockeying affair among eight finalists, in which Pearman and Thigpen battled each other and the challenges of the rest of the field from gun to tape. Big Reggie beat little Phil by the width of his chest, in 2:16, but had he been able to break through the fast-closing Tommy Comerford of Manhattan would have taken them both.

Coming off the final turn on the inside, Comerford was trapped. Though he literally ran up the backs of the leaders he could not find room to sneak through. Also close up in the furious finish were Fordham's Jerry Connolly and Phil O'Connell of Manhattan.

Seton Hall, which lost its repeat triumph in the mile relay because the inspectors ruled that Reggie Marshall and George Stafurik, on the first two legs, were ruled guilty of pushing, also may have Thigpen's points thrown out.

Protest Against Thigpen

A protest was filed against the 20-year-old sophomore because, having entered college last summer under a speed-up program, he does not meet the I. C. 4-A requirement of a full calendar year of residence for varsity eligibility.

A quick jump to the fore with two laps to go gave Hall, a rugged little fellow, his 600-yard victory by a three-yard margin over Royce Crimmin of Brown as Gilhooley's stampede down the stretch nipped the Fordham pair of Ennis Gray and Harold McDonnell. George Guida of Villanova had to let this title go by default and Army's Jack Hammack and Seton Hall's Jack Tulp were knocked out in the afternoon semi-finals.

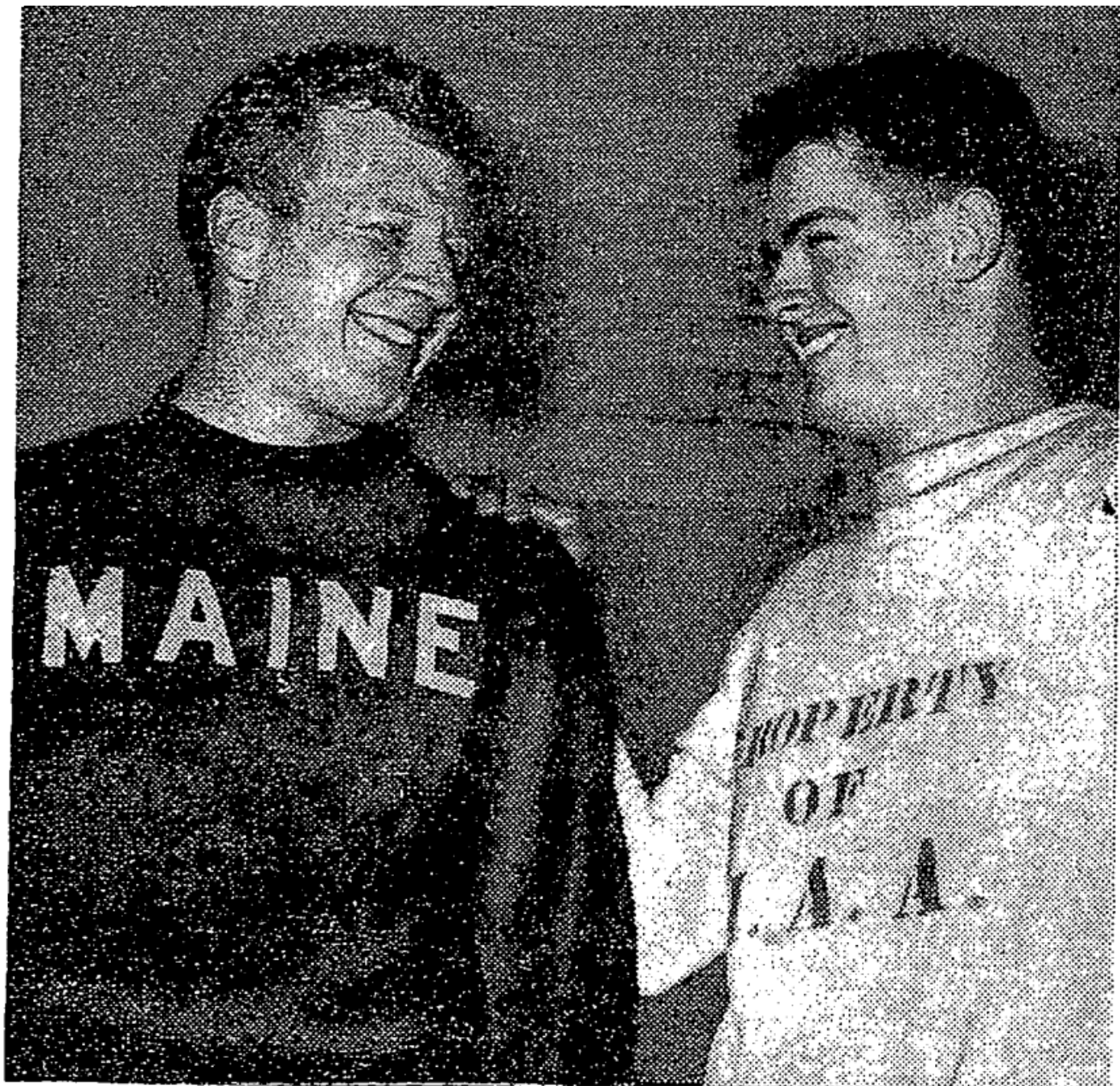
In cracking the I. C. 4-A record of 9:16.2, set by Joe McCluskey of Fordham way back in 1933, Ashenfelter led Osterberg by nearly eighty yards, with Ted Vogel of Tufts a close third in what was a sprint workout for the national marathon champion.

This performance, in a twenty-two-man field, compared favorably with the 9:11.1 returned by Tommy Quinn of the New York A. C. in a photo finish triumph over Curtis Stone, last year's I. C. 4-A champion from Penn State, in the invitation two-mile run.
