Former Hoya Coaches IC4A Team Champs

NEW YORK, May 31.—IC4A eftovers:

In a sense, Manhattan's team victory in the IC4A track championships here today was a victory for Georgetown. For coaching the Jaspers is George Eastment, a 50-second quarter mile for the Hoyas 22 years ago.

Eastment was elected president of the Intercollegiate Track Coaches Association. Georgetown's Frank Sevigne was chosen for treasurer.

Dick Maiocco of New York U. in the 440, was the only 1951 IC4A champion to repeat. Villanova's Cummin Clancy lost his discus crown to Lafayette's John Ellis, Villanova's John Joe Barry lost his 2-mile title to Georgetown's Charlie Capozzoli, Villanova's Fred Dwyer lost his mile crown to Georgetown's Joe Lapierre, and Cornell's Meredith Gourdine lost his low hurdles title to Army's Larry Johnson, and his broad jumping crown to Princeton's F. Morgan Taylor.

HARMON BROWN a McKinley Tech High of Washington boy, failed to qualify in the high hurdles finals today, but was busy snapping pictures and collecting autographs of the contestants. Harmon graduates from Lafayette next week, and will enter George Washington University's medical school next fall.

With the eastern collegiate track season officially over and the N. C. A. A. meet in Berkeley, Calif., two weeks away, New York area schools have organized an "informal" meet for next weekend at town will send up Carl Joyce nearby Travis Island. Those three Hoyas will also compete in the N. C. A. A. along with Maryland's Morty Cohen in the broad jump and high hurdles, and Al Buehler in the 880. Navy also plans to send javelin tosser Bob Allison and quarter-miler Bill Branson.

DAVE BOLAND, benched for so-called scholastic reasons during the past month, was reinstated by Georgetown authorities in time to run in the 220 and 440 qualifiers here. But hopelessly out of condition, he failed to qualify. He hopes to get back into shape in time for the national AAU championships in Long Beach, Calif., June 20-21.

Another victim of a tough break was Maryland's Jim Johnson. In his last race as a Terp, Johnson, who graduates next month, ran the fastest quarter-mile of his life, 48.4, but it was in the fastest qualifying heat of that event, and he wound up third, out of the picture.

New York area track experts were upset because four Ivy League champions, competing in a 54-team field, failed to get by the qualifying tests.

They are quarter-miler Jim Lingel of Cornell, half-miler Albin Rauch of Princeton, Hammer throwing Joe Chadbourne of Yale, and discus throwing Bob Emery of Penn, all of them previously considered hot Olympic team prospects. **HERB HEFT.**

Capozzoli Beats Wilt, LaPierre Captures Mile

NEW YORK, June 7—Charlie Capozzoli and Joe LaPierre, who won two smashing victories for Georgetown University in the IC4A track championships last weekend, came through with another pair of stunning performances in the New York A. C. games here today.

Capozzoli, perhaps the Hoyas' best hope of making the Olympic team, turned in the most astonishing performance of the day when he soundly whipped Fred Wilt by 25 yards in a 2-mile handicap race.

Capozzoli's Time Is 9:13.6

Both were running from scratch and finished second and third behind Gordon McKenzie of New York Pioneer Club, who had a 70-yard head start.

Capozzoli's time was 9:13.6, nearly four seconds faster than his winning IC4A winning time a week ago. After running shoulder to shoulder with Wilt for the first mile, Cappy sprinted away from him and cut 40 yards off McKenzie's head start by the time they crossed the finish line. Wilt is generally considered America's No. 1 hope in the Olympic 5000 meter race.

LaPierre repeated his IC4A mile triumph over Villanova's Fred Dkyer in a handicap one mile race. Both were running from scratch, and LaPierre's mediocre 4:17.1 was attributed to gusts of winds that crossed the clay track during that race.

In the 880 yard scratch event, Georgetown's Carl Joyce finished fifth in 1:58.6. Joyce took the lead for a while at the start but rapidly lost ground as Reg took over the pace to win the gig Pearman of the Pioneer Club event in 1:55 flat.

A couple of Navy Olympic team members who chose to remain in the East rather than compete in the Armed Forces championships at Long Beach, Calif., today, took first and second place in the hammer throw.

Maiocco Wins 440

They are Lieut. Sam Felton, generally rated the Nation's best in that event, and Tom Bane. Felton throw the ball and chain 176 feet 4½ inches, nearly 10 feet below his best of the spring. Bane was second at 174 feet 4½ inches. Both had trouble staying in the ring because of the heavy winds.

Dick Maiocco, the IC4A 440 champion, won the special 440 yard scratch event in 48 seconds flat to finish ahead of Vernon

Dixon of Manhattan College by one tenth of second.

Horace and Bill Ashenfelter made the two mile steeplechase event a family affair when Horace clocked in at 10:22.4 about 75 yards in front of his brother.

The 400-meter hurdle event was gifted to Albin Rauch, jr., of Princeton, who was declared the winner after Ralph Taylor of the New York A. C. was disqualified for running out of his lane. Taylor was originally announced as the winner after completing the distance in 53 seconds flat, which would have established a new meet record had not the violation occurred.

Rauch's Record Not Allowed

Although Rauch's time of 54 seconds even still bettered the mark set by Jack Irwin of Princeton in 1936 it was not allowed by the officials.

Lindy Reminino, the IC4A 220-yard champion, from Manhattan won the 100-yard handicap in .98.

John Ellis, jr., IC4A champion from Lafayette College, threw the discus 168 feet 6½ inches to break a mark of 168 4½ inches set by Yale's Vic Frank at this same site in 1950.

World Champion Jim Fuchs of the New York A. C. heaved the shot 58 feet 2 inches to win the shot put.
