New York, March 5 -- Four meet records fell tonight at the 39th annual IC4A Championships as Villanova edged Yale in a thrilling team struggle that wasn't decided until the final event -- the mile relay.

The team title was in doubt right down to the last leg of the mile relay but Villanova won the crown when Yale anchorman Dave Bain fell. That brought Villanova's point total to 27 points with Yale second with 23 1/5.

NEW YORK, March 5—Joe Marchiony, a 21-year-old pre-medical student from Manhattan, erased the oldest IC4A indoor record on the books when he won the shot put with a toss of 57 feet—the best of his career.

The old record was 56-6 set back in 1941 by Al Blozis of Georgetown, killed in action in World War II.

Bill Johnson of Maryland captured the 60-yard high hurdles. Johnson's time was 7.4 seconds, automatically a record since this is the first year the IC4A used five hurdles instead of the traditional four.

Marchiony, a bespectacled giant of 240 pounds got off his winning put on his fourth qualifying toss after just missing on his third try.

Keith Nance of Army was second with a 53-8 mark and Jim Hart of Navy was third with a 52-10 effort.

John Lawlor of Boston University, a 24-year-old senior from Dublin, Ireland, opened the meet with a record of 63

feet, $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch in the 35-pound weight throw.

Lawlor made his decisive throw on his fourth and final toss in the preliminary round. Dick Chadwick of Pitt was second to Lawlor with a toss of 56 feet, 9 inches, scoring the first points ever produced by an athlete from the Pittsburgh school in the IC4A weight throw. Henry (Jud) Sage of Navy was third at 56 feet, 2 inches.

In the other afternoon final, Jack Buckley of Villanova won the broad jump at 23 feet, 9 $\frac{1}{4}$ inches, defeating Phil Chappell of Army by an inch. Bob Reed of Pennsylvania was third at 23 feet, 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches.

Ron Gregory of Notre Dame captured the mile in 4:13.1, hitting the tape 22 yards in front of Bob Vinton of Georgetown.
