43rd IC4A Indoor Championships Madison Square Garden, New York, NY March 7, 1964

New York, March 7--Wendell Mottley continued to supply the individual fireworks and Villanova continued to win the team titles in the 43rd IC4A indoor meet. Mottley equalled George Kerr's listed indoor record of 1 09.3 for 600 yards just seven and-a-half hours after running a 1·10 1 heat, and Villanova squeaked through to a one-point team victory (their third in a row) over surprising Manhattan

Mottley was shooting for 1 09.0 or better He actually missed his chance in the heat, where he passed the 440 mark in 49.2 and had plenty left, but eased off in the last 100 yards. In the final, Wendell hit the quarter in 49.5, and drove hard through the gun lap, but tired visibly in the final 30 yards. Still, it was quite a day's work, bringing Yale (Stack, Luck, Mottley) its sixth straight in this event. Bill Boyle, second in a respectable 1:10 8, wasn't even close

John Uelses raised Rolando Cruz' meet record a quarter of an inch as he took the vault at 16'12". Cruz, who won this meet the last two years, was shunted to fourth at 15'6' behind Army's Dick Plymale and Navy's Mike Brown.

In fact, Villanova's only first-place winner was Tom Sullivan, who started the mile in a surprise switch from the 2-mile relay team, and won easily in 4.11 8 It marked the first time since 1955 that the winning team had scored only one first place.

Two other favored Wildcats had trouble. Noel Carroll, recovering from a deep charley horse, was outsmarted by Tom Bauer of Villanova in a tactical 2 11.8 thousand. Bauer took the lead at the quarter and opened up an eight yard spread, good enough to hold off Carroll's somewhat lame kick by a yard. And Vic Zwolak, who figured to win the two mile easily, ran only third behind Joe Lynch's 8:59 0 and Bill Straub's 9:04.1. Lynch followed Zwolak's pace for most of the way, then outkicked the other two easily over the last quarter mile

Seton Hall's two mile relay team lowered their own meet record to 7.33.4, right fast for a team which had a run a heat only two hours earlier. In the mile relay, Morgan State ran 3.16 3 to tie the meet record set by Villanova last year.

Six of the ten scorers in the two weight events came through with personal records Behind Gary Gubner's winning $61'9\frac{3}{4}''$ in the shot put, made with a burn knee, came career bests by Carl Wallin (59'3'), Tom Gage (55'8''), and Bob Steigerwald (55' $1\frac{1}{4}''$) And in the 35-pound weight throw, John Connors of Manhattan, who'd never bettered 60 feet before, won with $61'5\frac{1}{2}''$ and had other tosses of 61'5'' and 61'0' Behind him were Bill Gleeson, with $60'\frac{1}{4}''$, favored Bill Corsetti with 59'11'', Gage with another personal best at 59'2'', and George Levendis of Yale with a lifetime best of $58'9\frac{3}{4}''$.

Harvard's rail-thin sophomore high jumper, Chris Pardee, raised his Harvard record to 6'9" as he won the event by an inch from Hep champion John Hartnett. Nobody else did better than 6'4". Mike Cole of Maryland took the broad jump easily with a 24'7' leap—John Bethea of Morgan State topped a good hurdles field in 7-4, and Sam Perry scored handily over a suddenly revived Bob Mattis in the dash

Coach Bob Gilligan's Boston College track team demonstrated last Saturday night that all good things must come to an end. New York City, which has been a Mecca to various Eagle units in recent years, shed its milk and honey image for the tracksters, who could salvage only moral victories in the IC4A meet at Madison Square Garden.

Entered in three events, the Eagles registered two third place finishes along with a fifth slot result, but were each time eclipsed by superior performances of their foes.

Bob Gilvey finished fifth in the 600 yd. race. The winner, Yale's Wendell Mottley, set a world record, with a time of 1:09.3. The freshman medley team of Brian McNamara, Chuck Zaikowski, Joe Kopka and Bill Norris placed an impressive third, behind Georgetown and the alwayspowerful Manhattan College Jaspers. BC Anchorman Norris' 4:18 time bettered his Hoya counterpart, Bill McDermott, former high school national two-mile champ.

In a field event, Hank Keller secured third place in the broad jump. Maryland's Mike Cole hurtled himself 24' 7½" for the win. Kelleher distinguished himself by taming highly-touted Aggri Awori of Harvard as well as Midshipman Dick Bliss, who, until Saturday, had recorded the east coast's second best broad jump of 23' 7½".
