# IC4A Still Villanova, Dulong

New York — (AP) — Art Dulong of Holy Cross has one more goal before closing out his collegiate cross-country career.

The 21-year-old senior from Randolph, Mass., is taking dead aim on the NCAA championship to be held next week on the same 6-mile Van Cortlandt Park course over which Dulong yesterday regained the IC4A title. The 24:06.8 gives him 1-2-1 in three IC4A varsity tries, and he also won as a frosh.

Meanwhile the rest of the cross-country world faced an uphill race to overhaul Villanova, defending NCAA cham-

pion and an easy 60-138 victory yesterday over the Harvard team that was expected to make the NCAAs a tough battle.

Villanova took 2-5-6-21-30, with that fifth man (and only American of the five) Olympian Marty Liquori who was a late entry after a long convalescence from a leg ailment.

Penn State was third with 154 points.

Another Villanova import, England's Phil Banning, won the 3-mile freshman race by 22 seconds although William & Mary was team champion. Ron Stonitsch of C. W. Post,

repeat winner Saturday in the NCAA College-Division 6-mile, also retained his IC4A college-division crown with Binghamton native Bill Donahue's Lafayette 2-3 unable to best Lehigh for team title.

Among Upstate collegians, Don Anderson of Cornell was 18th in the big race and Skip Meno of Colgate 7th in college division. Binghamtonian Karl Thornton, Penn soph who never ran cross-country till this fall, was 31st among 159 finishes behind Dulong, after taking 11th in the Heptagonal championships at Van Cortlandt last Friday.

# Liquori 'Gets Going' Late For Villanova's Wildcats

NEW YORK — Marty Liquori, the number one world miler of 1969, has been plagued with all kinds of foot ailments the last four months. He still hasn't fully conquered the arch trouble which put him out of action midway through his European summer trip with the U.S. international team and has seen only limited action this cross-country season.

He's been treating the harrier campaign as sort of a lark, an interim period before hitting the boards for the more glamorous indoor season.

Halfway through yesterday's 61st Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America (IC4A), championships at Van Cortlandt Park, the lark came to an end for Liquori and he went to work.

WHEN VILLANOVA teammates Andy O'Reilly and Bill McLoughlin ran into trouble, Liquori suddenly found himself in about 80th place and fifth man on the Villanova team, with the Wildcats' bid for a fourth straight IC4A team title in big jeopardy.

Coach Jim (Jumbo) Elliott thereupon, yelled "get going" to his prize pupil and the junior ace from Cedar Grove, N.J. got going.

Shifting into high gear, he forgot his foot problems and charged past legions of tiring rivals. He zoomed up feared Cemetery Hill and by the five-mile race's finish line had moved into 30th place and saved the day for Villanova.

After it was all over, he brushed it all off. "I'm happy the cross-country season is going to be over next week. This sport really isn't the thing for me."

HE HOPES TO conclude his harrier efforts by leading Villanova to a repeat title in next Monday's NCAA six-mile title

race at Van Cortlandt Park.

Holy Cross University senior Art Dulong completed one of the greatest harrier records in IC4A history by taking the University Division individual title with a near-record 24:06.8 clocking.

He set the IC4A mark of 24:04.4 as a sophomore but then lost the 1968 title as Georgetown's Steve Stageberg splashed to a 60-yard decision on one of the rainiest days of the year.

Donal Walsh, a Villanova sophomore from Cork, Ireland, chased Dulong home in 24:29.0 and started the Wildcats' title drive. Soph Davey Wright, an Englishman, ran fifth; junior Chris Mason, another Englishman, was sixth, and Irishman Desmond McCormack 21st.

Liquori, the only U.S. citizen on the Wildcats' scoring team, completed the team's low winning total of 60 points.

HARVARD, WHICH contributed the third place finisher in senior Keith Colburn, was a distant runner-up with 138 points.

Penn State (154), St. John's (163), Connecticut (176), and Pennsylvania (201) were next in line in the 35-team, 185-man field.

First New Jersey finisher was St. John's senior Don Rowe of Freehold, who nabbed 11th place in 25:10. Just one place ahead of him was his roommate and teammate, Terry McQuade.

Metropolitan Intercollegiate champion Edward Walsh of Manhattan settled for 12th place with NYU's Olympic 800-meter man Byron Dyce, 16th.

LANDING 23RD place in 25:31 in his first IC4A varsity assignment was University of Maryland sophomore Russ Taintor of Brick Township, N.J., Russ had been number two man on the Maryland squad most of the fall behind

Charles Schrader, but Schrader was pushed back into 41st place yesterday. The Terrapin team, Atlantic Coast Conference kingpin, ran 12th.

Manhattan College sophomore Gary Beach, former Red Bank (N.J.) Catholic ace, ran 81st in 25:44. He was fifth man home for the Jaspers, but the Kelly Green team was only 11th, one spot past the qualifying limit for the NCAA run.

Concluding their varsity careers for Rutgers were two ex-Jersey Shore schoolboy stars, Ed Shattuck of Lakehurst and Tom Bazley of Long Branch. Shattuck ran 134th in 27:54 and right on his heels in 135th was Bazley in 17:56.

All University Division varsity placings were later declared "unofficial" pending an audit of the cards handed in by the runners and then fed into the Manhattan College computer. Some coaches were claiming their runners were handed the wrong cards at the finish line.

## Frosh Race

Villanova provided the individual winner in the University Division three-mile freshman race, Phil Banning, who romped home in 14:52.4 with 120 yards to spare on Penn State's Jim Allahand. Banning is an Englishman with 4:02 credentials for the mile.

Team honors, however, went to William and Mary, bolstered by a stable of New Jersey imports. The Virginia team had a low total of 76 points with Penn (110), Penn State (111), and Harvard (122) next in line. Villanova settled for eighth place.

First Jersey frosh finisher was Princeton's Bob Bazley, a Long Branch High School graduate and younger brother of Rutgers' Tom.

Bob landed a strong fifth place in 15:20.0 and was only six seconds out of second. He's just getting back into full health after a late spring bout of mononucleosis put him out of action.

Bob's ex-Long Branch High teammate, Tony Donohoe, ran 52nd in 16:13 for Maryland. Two ex-Christian Brothers Academy athletes at Manhattan, Tom Kearsley (16:015) and Joel Freidbaum (18:50), ran 44 and 135th, respectively.

# W&M Frosh Win IC4A X-Country Crown Easily

NEW YORK (AP)—William and Mary's well-balanced yearlings won the freshman division of the 81st IC4A cross country championships here Monday with a low team score of 76 points over the Van Cortland Park course.

The Indian freshmen finished well ahead of second-place Penn, which had 110 points, and third-place Penn State, with 111. Trailing were Harvard, 122; Massachusetts, 154; and Maryland, 202.

Villanova's Philip Banning won the 152 freshman race in 14 minutes, 52.4 seconds over the three-mile course in Van Cortland Park, but the Wildcats' freshman team trailed far behind the leaders.

W&M's Randy Fields won ninth place in 15:24. Other W&M freshmen who placed were Wayne McBride, 11th, 15:28; Tim Turner, 13th, 15:31; Irvin Lyerly, 18th, 15:36; and Jay Gsell, 31st, 15:51.

The Indians did not enter a full team in the concurrent var-

sity competition over a five-mile course, W&M's top runner, previously unbeaten Howell Michael, led after one mile but faded and wound up 20th in 25:25.

Michael, the NCAA District III, Southern Conference and Virginia state collegiate champ-

ion, competes here next week in the NCAA championships.

Artie Dulong of Holy Cross regained the title he lost last year when he breezed to a 100-yard victory in the varsity competition.

The 21-year-old senior from Randolph, Mass., who took the

lead after two miles, covered the five-mile course in 24:06.8 in 47 degrees, sunny weather in romping past Donal Walsh, a Villanova sophomore from Cork, Ireland.

Dulong's time, however, was 2.4 seconds off the meet record he established in winning the event in 1967.

Last year the Holy Cross harrier was second to Steve Stageberg of Georgetown, who won in 24:32.4.

Ron Stonitsch of Post College, who won the NCAA college division title Saturday in four inches of snow in Chicago, repeated in the college division race on Monday. The 20-year-old junior hit the tape a solid 150 yards in front of the field in 25:03.3.

Lehigh won the team crown with 36 points while St. Joseph's of Philadelphia was second with 97.

Dulong, undefeated this season in six dual meets and also a repeat winner in the New England Intercollegiate, jumped in front of the field of 185 early.

Walsh came on briefly, but the Crusader pulled away with three miles to go. Walsh finished in 24:29.

Villanova won the team title for the fourth straight year with 60 points.

Also accounting for the Wildcats' points were a pair of Englishmen, Dave Wright and Chris Mason, fifth and sixth, respectively; Desmond McCormack, another Irishman who was 21st, and U.S. Olympian Marty Liquori, who was 30th.

Harvard, the Octagonal champion, was a distant runnerup in the team battle with 138 points. Penn State was third with 154 followed by St. John's 163, Connecticut 176.

# Dulong Wins IC4As; Anderson 18th

NEW YORK (AP) — Art Dulong of Holy Cross has one more goal to accomplish before closing out his collegiate cross country career. The 21-year-old senior from Randolph, Mass., is taking dead aim on the NCAA Championship to be held here next week.

Dulong regained the IC4A title Monday in 24:06.8, just 2.4 seconds off the meet standard he set two years ago as a sophomore.

"I've been having some good days and some bad days this season," said Dulong after he crossed the finish line 100 yards ahead of Donal Walsh of Villanova. "Today was one of those bad ones, even though I won.

"My legs were heavy during most of the race and I heard someone holler to me that I was close to my own record. However, there was nothing I could do about it because I was really dragging."

Dulong, who was runnerup last year, admitted that winning the NCAA Championship was

the goal he set for himself two months ago. The NCAA next Monday will be run over the same course Dulong won on Monday.

"All it will take is one of those good days," concluded the 5-foot-10, 140-pounder who was undefeated in six dual meets and who also won the New England Intercollegiate Championship for a second straight year.

Villanova had no trouble winning the team championship for the fourth straight year. Jumbo Jim Elliot's Wildcats piled up 60 points to rout Harvard, which had been expected to make a close battle. The Heptagonal winners were a distant second with 138.

The Wildcats are defending NCAA champions also.

In college division competition, Ron Sonitsch of Post College successfully defended his title in 25:03.3. Lehigh won the team title easily with 36 points, far ahead of second place St. Joseph's of Philadelphia, which had 98.

NEW YORK — Jon Anderson, Cornell junior from Eugene, Ore., did very well in the 5-mile IC4A cross country race in Van Cortlandt Park, New York City, Monday, finishing 18th in 25:24.

Anderson was the fourth best of the Ivy Leaguers. He helped the Big Red capture 20th place.

Other Red scorers were: 68, Don Alexander, 26:31; 124 Tom Baker 27:40; 145, Bruce Earle, 28:20; 147 Ralph Adams, 28:24; Phil Ritson, who had won some earlier races for the team, dropped out in the early going.

Anderson qualified for the Nationals which will be run at 6 miles in New York next Monday.

The Cornell Frosh showing was a little disappointing to Coach Jack Warner. Cornell's best was Tim Cahill, 66th in 16:26. for three miles. Bob Hamlin was 81st in 16:40. Phil Banning of Villanova won in 14:52. The top Ivy finisher was Bob Childs of Penn, fourth in 15:18. William and Mary won with 76 points and Penn was second with 110.

# Mount Competes In Match

Mt. St. Mary's cross country team competed in its first Inter Collegiate 4-A Championship match Monday in New York, achieving a respectable 11th place team rank in the varsity division and 10th place in the freshman division.

The Mount just joined the IC 4-A conference this year. The conference includes most eastern colleges and ranks them in two divisions, college and university.

Competing in the college division, the Mount earned its 11th place rank with a score of 313 points in the five mile varsity race.

The team runners with their time and places were: Bill Lyons, placing 26th with a time of 26:51; John Nicoletti, 50th, 27:37; Dick Rasmussen, 81st, 28:28; Paul Coombe, 96th; 28:57; and Gary Heim, 109th, 29:40.

The varsity team title was taken by Lehigh University with 36 points. Ron Stonitsch of C. W. Post College came in first with a time of 25:03. There were 128 runners who finished the race.

The Mount's freshman team took 10th place with 234 points in the three - mile freshman race which was won by Westchester State College with 54 points. First place went to Dan Moynihan of Wesleyan College.

Runners for Mt. St. Mary's in this race were: Steve Hanlon, 10th place with a time of 15:48; Chet Bieganski, 56, 16:34; Tom Sulewski, 64, 16:42; Tom Curley, 79, 16:59; and Larry Noel, 95, 17:33.

## Lehigh wins IC4A college run

NEW YORK—Lehigh won the IC4A college varsity cross country championship here yesterday, scoring just 36 points.

Delaware finished 14th in the field of 33 teams that competed at Cortland Park here.

Ron Stonitsch of C. W. Post was the individual champion, running the five-mile course in 25:03.3. Blue Hen runner Dick

Kile was the first Delaware runner to finish, placing 56th with a time of 27:49.

ALSO running for the Hens were Pete Sukalo (66th), Bill Webster (70th), DeWitt Henry

(87th) and the injured John Burke (108th).

Trailing Lehigh, like Delaware a member of the Middle Atlantic Conference, were St. Joseph's (Pa.), 98 points; Lafayette, 107; West Chester, 113, and

Springfield (Mass.) 156. Delaware had 334.

**IN the freshman meet, Delaware** didn't enter the team event, but had three runners competing. Bob Mueller led the Hens, finishing sixth in 15:42 for the three-mile run. Frank Whittington and Mark McKinney also ran for the Hens.

Individual winner was Dan Moynihan of Wesleyan, timed in 15:04.7. West Chester won the team title, scoring 54 points to 109 for runner-up Lafayette.

**IN the University Major division,** Villanova scored 60 points to win the varsity meet for the fourth straight year. Art Dulong of Holy Cross triumphed in the individual scoring, running the distance in 24:06.8 to remain unbeaten in 1969. His time was 2.4 seconds off the meet record he set in 1967.

Phil Banning of Villanova won in 14:52.4 and William & Mary scored a leading 76 points in the major university freshman meet.



# State Harriers 3rd in IC4As

Penn State tallied 154 points and finished a strong third in the 61st annual IC4A Cross Country Championship race at Van Cortlandt Park in New York City yesterday.

It was the best finish for a Nittany Lion team since 1961 when it placed second.

Greg Fredericks, Lion sophomore, paced Coach Harry Groves' team to its fine finish by placing ninth. His time for the five-mile grind was 25:09. He won the IC4A frosh title a year ago with a clocking of 14:49 in the rain.

As expected, Villanova captured team honors with a score of 60. The individual winner was Art Dulong of Holy Cross. His time was 24:06.8. Donal Walsh of Villanova, second to Fredericks last November, was runner-up once again in 24:29.

William & Mary scored 76 points and won the frosh crown.

Penn (110) and Penn State (111) finished 2-3 and received trophies. The Lion varsity also returned last night with a trophy.

"Our boys are learning that cross country is a team sport," Groves said. "We train that way and the boys ran it that way. The fact that we stuck together and stayed together was important. We had four guys finish 12 seconds apart."

Ralph Kissel of the Lions finished 33rd at 25:45. Teammate Matt Chadwick was 38th at 25:50, Jim Dixon 44th at 25:56 and Jerry Henderson 45th at 25:57.

Jeff Deardorff of Penn State placed 63rd and Glenn Brewer wound up 98th. There were 159 starters in the varsity race. Twenty-two schools entered full teams while 12 others had individual entries.

Penn State, which finished the dual meet season with a 5-2 record, is expected to enter a seven-man team in the NCAA meet at the same course next Monday. One of the losses was to Georgetown. The Hoyas placed eighth yesterday.

In the frosh event, Phil Banning of Villanova was victorious in 14:52.4.

At the mile and a quarter mark, Jim Allahand of the Nittany Lions was 50th. Allahand came on strong like Gang Busters and wound up second in 15:14. Teammate Dan Supulski placed third. His time was 15:15.

Other point-getters for the Lions were Bruce McLanahan (20th), John Fullmer (27th) and Jim McClure (69th). Steve Miller (100th) and Bill Crieger (11th) also ran for the Lion Cubs. The frosh race attracted 137 entries from 20 full teams

and individual entries from nine other schools.

"The races were conducted under ideal weather conditions," Groves said.

"In the varsity event," he concluded, "we had a shot for second because Harvard had a weak fifth man. But we were pleased with our guys. We had the potential to finish in the top five if they put everything together."

# Delaware Trails In College Group

Delaware finished 14th in the college division with 334 points. Lehigh won the title with 36. St. Joseph's had 98 points for second place with Lafayette third at 107.

Dick Kile led the Blue Hens' contingent with a 27:49 clocking for 56th place over the five-mile Van Cortlandt Park course. Other Hen finishers were Pete Sukalo, 66th, Bill Webster, 70th, De Witt Henry, 87th, and John Burke, 107th.

C. W. Post's Ron Stonitsch was the winner in 25:03.3.

Delaware didn't enter a team in the freshman meet but had three runners competing. Bob Mueller was sixth in 15:42 over three miles with Frank Whittington and Mark McKinney also running.
